Support

Background: Senate Bill 26 would automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults enrolled in SNAP.

Written Comments: The Baltimore Jewish Council represents The Associated: Jewish Federation of Baltimore and all of its agencies. This includes Jewish Community Services (JCS), which provides social services to low-income Marylanders.

Maryland has one of the highest rates of deep poverty in the country, with almost 50% of those living in poverty being considered as living in deep poverty. Based on 2021 data from the Census Bureau, this legislation would help over 60,000 uninsured Marylanders get the health coverage they need, including 23,000 Black Marylanders and 28,000 Latinos.

Other states have already adopted programs like the one proposed in SB26. In fact, more than 30,000 uninsured children in <u>Louisiana</u> and 90,000 uninsured children in <u>South Carolina</u> have been enrolled in Medicaid based on SNAP receipt, without needing to complete paperwork.

In short, this legislation would dramatically reduce the number of uninsured Marylanders while improving health equity. For these reasons, the Baltimore Jewish Councils asks for a favorable report on SB26.

Senate Bill 26 allows for direct certification and enrollment in public benefit programs, specifically the Maryland Medical Assistance Program and Maryland Children's Health Program based on SNAP eligibility, SNAP enrollment based on SSI eligibility, and utility assistance based on SNAP, TANF, SSI, or VA benefits. It also increases the income limit for energy assistance.

The Maryland Food Bank estimates that 1 in 3 Marylanders are at risk of facing food insecurity. Food insecurity means a lack of consistent access to healthy and nutritious food on any given day. Some communities and populations are at a higher risk of food insecurity, including communities of color, older adults, and families with children. There are food insecure Marylanders in every corner of the state.

Public benefit programs are an absolutely essential means for low-income Marylanders to support their families. The Maryland Food Bank alone processed and submitted over 1,100 SNAP applications in FY 22 through our SNAP Outreach Program, and while that is a sliver of the total applications processed across the state, we can attribute almost 1 million meals to our efforts. With the pandemic-era SNAP Emergency Allotments ending, we are bracing for an increase – potentially significantly – in calls for food assistance. Capturing Marylanders who qualify for benefits such as SNAP but might not yet be enrolled will be crucial to easing this burden not only on the Food Bank and our network of community partners but on the most vulnerable of our neighbors who are food-insecure.

Marylanders who live at or below the Federal Poverty Line and qualify for assistance benefit programs are already at risk of economic and financial instability. Those who are food-insecure specifically are rarely hungry in a vacuum and generally have other needs, such as affordable housing or accessible medical care. Ensuring those Marylanders can access the social safety net programs they need and deserve are critical for supporting their families and eventual economic mobility.

For these reasons, the Maryland Food Bank respectfully requests a favorable report on SB 26.

No Kid Hungry Maryland writes in support of SB 26 which will streamline access to benefits based on already-verified eligibility information which is a critical step in reducing the administrative burden on individuals and the state.

Through the No Kid Hungry Maryland campaign, we work with partners, lawmakers, educators, and businesses to identify and eliminate the barriers that may prevent children and families from accessing healthy and nutritious meals. Approximately, 1 in 8 children in Maryland could face hunger this year, and programs like SNAP and school meals play a critical role in reducing food insecurity for children and Maryland families.

The policy outlined in SB 26 is proven and effective. Using technology and enrollment data across programs is cost saving, improves efficiency, and removes barriers for families tasked to provide very detailed personal financial and household information several times for multiple programs. The Express Lane Eligibility Program is evidence-based, would reduce Maryland's administrative costs of public benefit programs, and is a proven concept already in use in other states, such as South Carolina and Louisiana.

Implementing an Express Lane Eligibility Program for Medicaid based on SNAP income data is a smart decision especially in anticipation of the unwinding of Medicaid when the Public Health Emergency ends. Additionally, enrolling SSI recipients into SNAP based on their income information removes another burden on applicant and case workers determining eligibility. Lowincome families and children would also benefit from the information sharing between SNAP, TANF, SSI, and VA benefits for express lane enrollment in fuel and utility assistance programs.

Again, we strongly support SB 26, which would streamline eligibility determinations by data sharing, increase retention of those eligible for public benefit programs, and has the potential to save Maryland social service agencies millions of dollars.

Good afternoon, Chair Griffith and Committee,

I am Cindy Carter Co-Founder of the Critical Medical Needs Program and Executive Director of Cancer Support Foundation. I am speaking in favor of SB26.

For 18 years now I have been working with the state agencies that provide grants for services. We have been working with some of the most vulnerable residents in the state.

Our clients are rarely in need of just one service, but usually require many such as food, medical assistance or energy assistance to name just three. To get the help they need they are required to work with multiple agencies each having their own application. The applications ask for the same basic information require working with one poor customer service experience after another.

So, to get the services they require they need to find where to go, understand the application and successfully get through the process. Each one of these journeys have the client work with different agencies who lack customer service leaving the customer on their own and have pretty much created a closed door to getting the services.

To compound a bad situation, rarely are our clients even referred to other grants like the Energy Assistance. All of these grants have been operated in silos and clients are unable to get through each system to get another service.

Some of our clients have been able to get food stamps, since there are groups that are working with families to get them into food stamps. They are not even told about the Energy Assistance grant or have tried themselves and not been successful in getting through the process. Only about 23% of the total number of eligible residents are able to get into the Energy Assistance Program in Maryland.

The system does not work well and has not for all the years I have been working with them. Our clients are fighting for their lives and do not have the energy to yet try to get through another closed door to services that they need to survive. Try doing the online application or call an office for assistance and you will understand why the denial rate is so high for this grant

The four areas of assistance that this bill lists as pathways into Energy Assistance just make common sense. As a former accountant I can only imagine the administrative costs savings of this data sharing to issue multiple grants that the client is eligible for and in great need of to survive.

I have been down here for many years now about the issues with getting Energy Assistance Grants. The situation is not better. This law seems to be a very effective solution that respects the need for proper documentation and verification of the client's situation.

I am asking for a favorable report on SB 26 to provide categorical eligibility for Energy Assistance Grants.

This bill would automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults enrolled in SNAP. The staff of Centers for Independent Living support hundreds of people with disabilities around the state to apply for SNAP, it would increase the efficiency greatly if this application also enrolled individuals in Medicaid. The individuals we support are often dissuaded from applying for public assistance or insurance because of the amount of paperwork and documentation needed. My name is JD Robinson. I am the Program Coordinator for SNAP of Maryland Hunger Solutions, a statewide, nonpartisan, nonprofit organization working to end hunger in Maryland by improving participation in the federal nutrition programs. Maryland Hunger Solutions strongly supports Senate Bill 26 – Maryland Medical Assistance Program, Maryland Children's Health Program, and Social Services Programs – Eligibility and Enrollment.

This bill has several key provisions, including: automatically granting Medicaid eligibility to children and adults enrolled in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); eliminating the paperwork currently required for SNAP recipients in Maryland to renew their Medicaid benefits; automatically enrolling seniors into SNAP if they qualify for Supplemental Security Income (SSI); streamlining utility assistance enrollment; and expanding access to electricity assistance for low-income families.

Based on <u>Census Bureau data for 2021</u>, automatically granting Medicaid eligibility to SNAP recipients would help over 60,000 uninsured Marylanders get the health coverage they need, including 23,000 Black Marylanders and 28,000 Latinos. In this way, the bill would not only dramatically reduce the number of Maryland residents without healthcare coverage but also advance health equity. Likewise, eliminating the Medicaid re-enrollment requirement for SNAP recipients (which would impact over half a million Maryland residents) and automatically enrolling seniors qualified for SSI in SNAP would reduce the time burden associated with filling out multiple applications, increase access to Medicaid and SNAP, and generate administrative cost savings for state.

Our on-the-ground experience as an authorized SNAP outreach agency for the state of Maryland has given us a unique perspective on this issue. The increased demand for additional assistance programs such as energy and healthcare is reflected in the number of callers on our toll-free hotline requesting referrals or information for these programs. Of the 400-500 calls we field per month, nearly a quarter ask for information on energy, heat, or medical assistance. We believe that providing streamlined pathways to these programs will improve the health and nutrition of thousands of Marylanders.

In conclusion, we urge a favorable report for SB 26. Thank you for your time.

Thank you for this opportunity to submit written testimony concerning an important priority of the **Montgomery County Women's Democratic Club** (WDC) for the 2023 legislative session. WDC is one of the largest and most active Democratic clubs in our county with hundreds of politically active members, including many elected officials.

WDC urges the passage of SB0026. Marylanders who are eligible for safety-net services currently must complete multiple applications annually, including an annual renewal, which are reviewed by different agencies. Because of this complicated, inefficient paperwork system many Marylanders are not receiving or renewing Medicaid and other safety-net benefits. As an example, similar documents are needed for Medicaid enrollment and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Based on Census Bureau data for 2021, 65,000 Maryland residents who receive SNAP are uninsured - nearly one in five uninsured Marylanders. These residents would automatically be enrolled in Medicaid if this bill were enacted. Streamlining and creating one eligibility process would allow additional families to be served with little to no administrative cost increases and would prevent families from losing benefits due to needless, duplicative paperwork requirements.

Specifically, this bill would:

- Implement Express Lane Eligibility to automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults whom SNAP has already found to have very low income.
- Streamline the process for receiving help by automatically enrolling someone for utility assistance if they qualify for SNAP, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), SSI, or means-tested veteran's benefits.
- Support seniors by automatically enrolling them for SNAP if they qualify for Supplemental Security Income (SSI).
- Increase the EUSP eligibility income limit to 200% FPL (Federal Poverty Level), matching other basic assistance programs offered by the Department of Human Services for lowincome families.

Passage of this bill would be of particular benefit to women and children who are at greatest risk of living in poverty. Streamlining safety-net services will help Maryland families cover their needs and will ensure they don't miss out on important services.

We ask for your support for SB0026 and strongly urge a favorable Committee report.

On behalf of the members of the Health Facilities Association of Maryland (HFAM), we appreciate the opportunity to express our support for Senate Bill 26.

HFAM represents skilled nursing centers and assisted living communities in Maryland, as well as associate businesses that offer products and services to healthcare providers. Our skilled nursing members provide the majority of long-term and post-acute care to Marylanders in need and can be found in nearly every jurisdiction of the state.

Senate Bill 26 requires the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) to establish an Express Lane Eligibility Program by January 1, 2025 and to enroll individuals, based on certain eligibility. Specifically, under this legislation, MDH will establish a fast-track eligibility lane to ensure that Medicaid-qualified individuals and families in Maryland have expeditious access to much-needed services related to healthcare and nutrition, with a focus on providing restaurant and heat-and-go meals to Marylanders most in need. The Department will coordinate the proposed policies of this legislation with counties, pay the costs of such county coordination, and file for federal waivers to establish such an Express Lane Eligibility Program to the extent that a waiver is needed.

According to Feeding America, 100 percent of U.S. counties have some level of food insecurity. Such food insecurity is experienced by many different racial and ethnic groups, and by every age cohort. Sadly, children are most often the victims of food insecurity.

In my personal experience, before the pandemic, it was common for families with loved ones in a skilled nursing and rehabilitation center to eat meals in the center as part of free or discounted meal programs. Unfortunately, in many cases, those programs are less prevalent in our setting due to infectious disease prevention protocols.

People are healthier and children learn better when they have consistent access to healthcare and food. Maryland has the financial resources to take this important step forward, and such a proactive approach will likely lower healthcare and public assistance costs in future years.

For these reasons, we respectfully request a favorable report from the Committee on Senate Bill 26.

Streamlining the Application Process for Safety Net Programs Will Increase Participation and Benefit More Eligible Marylanders

Position Statement Supporting Senate Bill 26

Submitted to the Senate Finance Committee

Thousands of low-income Marylanders rely on safety net programs to meet their health, food, energy and basic needs. Their ability to apply for and receive these benefits is not only beneficial to them personally but also to Maryland's economy. However, many Marylanders do not receive the benefits of these effective anti-poverty tools even if they are eligible. The Maryland Center on Economic Policy supports Senate Bill 26 because it will ultimately ensure more eligible Marylanders receive the benefits they need.

Maryland families eligible for social safety programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Cash Assistance (TAC), Medicaid, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI), have to fill out multiple applications annually across difference agencies to obtain benefits. This can be a tedious and burdensome process often resulting in loss of qualified benefits or inability to renew. This duplicative and complicated process means that often qualified beneficiaries of these social safety programs are failing to apply for, or renew Medicaid or energy assistance benefits¹.

SB 26 will create an Express Lane Eligibility that will automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults whom SNAP has already found to be low-income. It will automatically enroll Marylanders who qualify for SNAP, TAC, SSI, or means-tested utility assistance for veterans, and support seniors by automatically enrolling them for SNAP if they qualify for SSI. This bill will also increase the Electric Universal Service Program (EUSP) eligibility income limit from 175% to 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, matching other basic assistance programs offered by the Department of Human Services for low-income families.

It is important to ensure all eligible Marylanders receive the safety net benefits they need because they can have a significant impact on people's lives. Of the 30 percent share of income that households spend on housing, 20 percent is spent on energy costs alone.² Receiving energy assistance can often determine if a family maintains housing, has enough to eat or even remains healthy. This is why it is important that families who qualify are able to apply and that the process is simple and not lengthy or cumbersome.

In Maryland, households at 175% of the federal poverty level – with income below \$38,000 for a family of three, for example – spent an average or 14% of their income on energy costs, but with the help of Maryland

Energy Assistance Program (MEAP) and EUSP benefits their net energy burden (the percent of income spent on energy costs) fell to 9% during 2020. For households up to 200 percent of the poverty level, the average gross energy burden was 12%, while households between 176% and 200% of the FPL had an energy burden of 7%.

Thousands of Maryland's low-income children also remain uninsured even though they qualify for Medicaid and CHIP. Adopting Express Lane Eligibility will increase healthcare access for eligible children by expediting and simplifying the application process by relying on findings from other eligibility determinations. ELE has also proven to reduce administrative burdens and increase savings to the agencies that administer the programs.³

At a time of high inflation and energy costs, low-income Marylanders need support in order to meet their needs and care for those who depend on them. Ensuring that the application process for safety net benefits is smooth and less complicated would guarantee that most qualified Marylanders do not miss out on these resources.

For these reasons, the Maryland Center on Economic Policy respectfully requests that the Finance Committee make a favorable report on Senate Bill 26.

Equity Impact Analysis: Senate Bill 26

Bill summary

Senate Bill 26 ensures that more Marylanders who qualify for safety net programs – such as Medicaid, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and energy assistance programs – do not miss out on them or lose them by streamlining the process by which people sign up for assistance. It will also establish categorical eligibility, which means one application process will allow an individual to enroll in all services for which they are eligible.

Background

Currently, Marylanders who are eligible for safety net services have to constantly complete and renew multiple applications which are reviewed by different agencies. This is a duplicative, lengthy and burdensome process for both the applicant and State agencies. As a result, many Marylanders are not receiving or not renewing Medicaid or energy assistance benefits. A majority of the documents needed to verify energy assistance income-eligibility are also collected for SNAP or Temporary Cash Assistance. Yet 30,000 SNAP households who claim a heating or cooling expense do not receive Energy Assistance. Similar documents are needed for Medicaid enrollment. Based on Census Bureau data for 2021, 65,000 uninsured state residents receive SNAP—nearly one in five uninsured Marylanders (17%)4.

Equity Implications

Black and Latinx households are far more likely than white households to earn poverty-level wages and
are therefore more likely to qualify for safety-net benefits. While state and federal safety-net benefits
serve a larger number of white households than households in any other racial or ethnic group, they
serve a larger proportion of people of color.

Social safety nets also have a disproportionate positive impact in reducing poverty rates among households of color.5

Impact

Senate Bill 26 would likely improve racial and economic equity in Maryland.

Dear Chair Griffith, Vice Chair Klausmeier, and Honorable Members of the Finance Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to speak before the committee today. The American Heart Association extends its strong support for Senate Bill 26 Maryland Medical Assistance Program, Maryland Children's Health Program, and Social Services Programs – Eligibility and Enrollment. My name is Laura Hale and I am the Director of Government Relations for the American Heart Association.

Access to healthcare is essential and too many Marylanders struggle with the cumbersome paperwork requirements to enroll in the many programs that support health such as Medicaid and SNAP. With this legislation we can help to change all that and make the lives of low-income Marylanders a little bit easier. By automatically granting Medicaid eligibility to children and adults enrolled in SNAP, this will help connect people in need into the programs the state has set up to support them in the first place. Based on Census Bureau data for 2021, it would help over 60,000 uninsured Marylanders get the health coverage they need, including 23,000 Black Marylanders and 28,000 Latinos, making this a way to dramatically reduce the levels of uninsured in Maryland while at the same time improving health equity. This legislation would also eliminate paperwork currently required for over half a million SNAP recipients in Maryland to renew their Medicaid benefits, creating administrative savings for Maryland. In addition, this bill would improve other social determinants of health by streamlining utility assistance enrollment, expanding access to electric assistance, and automatically enrolling seniors into SNAP if they quality for Supplemental Security Income.



Madame Chair and members of Senate Finance: Maryland Energy Advocates is a coalition of non-profits, foundations, churches and volunteers that advocate, directly help, and support policies and change to ensure that the Maryland's low income segment will one day have affordable utility bills that run about 6% of their hsoueholds income.

Utility bills are often over-looked. A joke we say is that, "Few care, or are passionate about, BGE and Pepco's or utility bills, until you are." Then it's usually a crisis with families facing termination notices.

Several of us work directly with Marylanders in home energy utility crisis. Considered low-income by the federal and state government, most are seniors, about 45%, folks that are disabled, out of work, or work, but don't make enough income to cover their family expenses.

Here's how this SB26 could work in reality if passed and implemented well. This is not how it works in the field today.

A family, two seniors, and both are younger than 67, is income-eligible for food assistance and utility bill assistance. This couple earns less than \$2,670 in gross income a month, or \$32,040. Their utility bill averages about \$2,000 and with meds and food and rent, they're struggling. In September, they go around their house and gather a bunch of verification papers to prove they indeed are low-income: state ID's, actual social security cards, rental lease and payments for rent, current Social Security benefits letters, Pepco and Washington Gas bills. They drive on a Tuesday to their local Montgomery County Department of Social Security office. They wait for a bit, and then a State certifier works with them and indeed they are low-income, they need

food stamps, now called SNAP, and energy assistance to get monthly bill payment credits. One trip, one application, one intake visit by the state, and one set of documents. This elderly couple has applied for and will receive income-eligible grants to help bolster their family's finances.

This common-sense process is how it's supposed to have worked for years.

Yet today, it seems 95% of the folks we help in the field are enrolled in SNAP, but not in energy assistance. It seems few in the system mentioned energy assistance.

These SNAP-enrolled families are unaware, and not enrolled in, OHEP bill pay assistance. Now, usually around January after the heater's been running expensive fuel, they are in crisis with sky-high Pepco and Washington Gas bills. The helper teams in the field, the OHEP offices' staff and the residents are all "in the foxhole" scrambling to get this couple's application through OHEP energy assistance in time to beat the power cut off. If this second, sometime third state benefit application is done, again, on another day, by the same couple, on time, a 55-day account hold is placed on the utility account so that this energy assistance application can run its long course through OHEP, get approved, get grants credited to account and avoid cut-off.

SB26 is a smart, responsible streamlined bill that makes our state more effective for income-eligible benefits. Energy Advocates thanks Senator Augustine for his sponsorship of this highly important bill.

Madam Chair and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify for sufficiency and well-being for all. I am Lee Hudson, assistant to the bishop for public policy in the Delaware-Maryland Synod, <u>E</u>vangelical <u>L</u>utheran <u>C</u>hurch in <u>A</u>merica. We are a faith community with three judicatories in our State.

Sufficient livelihood and access to appropriate and affordable health care for all people have been adopted in moral deliberation statements within our community ("Sufficient, Sustainable Livelihood for All," 1999; "Caring for Health," 2003).

Maryland has done good things with the simple mechanism of notification about access to health care through tax filing; for example, *Senate Bill 369* of 2022. **Senate Bill 26** expands that policy principle with convergent eligibility. It would streamline sign-up for services such as Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and energy assistance programs by establishing a categorical eligibility, one application standard that allows an individual to enroll in all the available services.

The services and eligibility for them are already established. Yet there remain people without adequate medical care, or nutrition, or safe shelter, who do not, or cannot apply. Multiple application processes, with annual renewal requirements, asking for the same information, amount to a barrier for underserved clients for State services. It also creates an unnecessary State administrative burden.

Senate Bill 26 would bring the programs to eligible clients in an efficient and effective manner, illustrated by prior "express lane" State initiatives that have increased participation. Because of that, and because of the good it would do for residents of the State, we urge your favorable report.

Welfare Advocates is a statewide coalition of social service organizations, advocacy groups, faith communities, and community members, whose mission it is to educate about and advocate for an adequate safety net and public policies that support families moving towards economic stability.

Welfare Advocates supports SB 26, which requires the Department of Human Services and the Department of Health to streamline access to safety-net programs by automatically enrolling individuals in public benefits based on their eligibility for other safety-net programs.

Amidst record inflation and unemployment, many Marylanders are struggling to make ends meet. Before the pandemic, one in ten Marylanders were living at or below the Federal Poverty Line, and COVID has only exacerbated the struggles of low-income individuals and families. Predictably, the need for safety-net programs in our state has exploded, and has put a spotlight on the entrenched barriers and inequities that have long existed in our programs and policies to address and end poverty, especially for Black and Brown communities that have disproportionally borne the brunt of economic downturns due to systemic racism and historic disinvestment. A dizzying maze of applications, departments, and varying eligibility requirements means that - even for Marylanders who qualify – safety-net programs only reach a fraction of the people who need them.

Public benefit programs – like Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Medicaid - provide vital resources to low-income families, and strengthen our State's economy. Families use benefits to purchase housing, food, transportation, and other basic needs. These funds are immediately spent in the local economy, generating economic growth. Consequently, improving access to safety-net programs benefits families and Maryland's businesses, communities, and local economies. In regards to health coverage, studies demonstrate that individuals who are uninsured have higher rates of illness, die younger, and are often only one emergency department visit away from a financial crisis.² Without improving access to safety-net programs, Marylanders will continue to bear the societal costs of uncompensated care, homelessness, and poverty.

SB 26 simplifies access to safety-net programs by automatically enrolling individuals in benefits they are eligible for based on their eligibility for other programs. Welfare Advocates believes that all Marylanders should have easy access to the public benefits they are eligible for, and categorical eligibility is an important step to improve the economic security of Marylanders struggling in or near poverty.

WA appreciates your consideration, and respectfully urges a favorable report on SB 26.

Economic Action Maryland (formerly the Maryland Consumer Rights Coalition) is a people-centered movement to expand economic rights, housing justice, and community reinvestment for working families, low-income communities, and communities of color. Economic Action Maryland provides direct assistance today while passing legislation and regulations to create systemic change in the future.

We are here in support of SB 26 and urge a favorable report.

Our direct service programs screen individuals for eligibility for food, energy, and other cost-savings programs. In 2022, we saved Maryland families \$50,000 through earned-benefits screenings. Each year we screen hundreds of consumers across the state that were unaware that they qualified for these critical programs. Often, individuals save enough to move from financial precarity to being able to save a portion of their income.

In addition, many programs require onerous paperwork and financial records in order to qualify. Many of our clients move frequently and these financial records may be misplaced or difficult to locate. The paperwork is not simple and requires time to navigate—time that may be lacking for individuals working an hourly job or balancing work and child/elder care. This is one of the reasons our program is so successful, we assist clients who need dedicated assistance to complete the paperwork to receive assistance.

We strongly support SB 26 because we believe that presumptive eligibility makes sense. If an individual has demonstrated financial need to receive state assistance in one area, it is reasonable to assume that the individual will qualify for other programs with similar income thresholds. Fast-tracking

The League of Women Voters Maryland supports Senate Bill 0026: Maryland Medical Assistance Program, Maryland Children's Health Program, and Social Services Programs- Eligibility and Enrollment, which would help more low-income Marylanders obtain health insurance coverage by decreasing the administrative burdens associated with Medicaid's application and renewal processes. The bill would establish Express Lane Eligibility, automatically granting Medicaid eligibility to adults and children who already qualify for SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits.

The League of Women Voters believes that healthcare is a human right. All Marylanders need accessible, equitable, affordable, quality health care. But access to that health care is largely determined by one's ability to obtain health insurance.

Lack of health insurance can be deadly. An Institute of Medicine report found that "The uninsured have poorer health and shortened lives.... Uninsured patients, even when acutely ill or seriously injured, cannot always obtain needed care..."

Almost 6% of Maryland residents remain uninsured. Per the *Commonwealth Fund's 2022 Scorecard on State Health System Performance*, Maryland did poorly on "disparity indicators" such as uninsured adults (ranking 23rd out of the 50 states and D.C.), uninsured children (28th), and adults who went without care because of costs in the past year (39th). Racial and ethnic disparities were also evident in the report. While only 4% of White Marylanders were uninsured, 29% of Latinx residents had no health insurance coverage.

Passing Senate Bill 26 would increase the number of low-income Marylanders with health insurance by establishing <u>categorical eligibility</u>. Marylanders would be able to enroll in multiple safety-net programs with the same eligibility requirements at the same time, thus eliminating many of the administrative burdens that often prevent people from obtaining

the assistance for which they're qualified. Categorical eligibility would eliminate the current requirement that, even if already proven eligible for one low-income assistance program such as SNAP, an individual needs to go through the same financial eligibility determination process, requiring submission of essentially the same paperwork, to qualify for or keep their energy assistance or Medicaid benefits.

Currently a federal health emergency has paused Medicaid redeterminations, but once the emergency ends, then Medicaid recipients will have to renew their benefit eligibility through a redetermination process once every twelve months. Renewal instructions will be sent to Medicaid recipients by mail, and they will have to respond by submitting the requested income information according to a strict timeline. But mail can be lost, instructions misunderstood, or forms fille out incorrectly due to language or literacy barriers. Missed deadlines and incomplete paperwork lead to lapsed coverage, and getting benefits reinstated is a cumbersome and time-consuming process, piling on additional administrative costs for the State.

The real-life consequence of this complicated, inefficient system will be that many Marylanders will not get the medical care they need. Streamlining the process is in the best interests of patients, providers, and the Maryland Medicaid system itself. Administrative costs will decrease, thus enabling more Medicaid funds to be used for disease prevention and treatment.

Passing Senate Bill 26 and instituting Express Lane Eligibility will streamline the application process for crucial assistance programs. This program is of vital importance, and for that reason the League of Women Voters Maryland and its 1,500+ members urge the committee to give a favorable report to Senate Bill 0026.

DoTheMostGood (DTMG) is a progressive grass-roots organization with members in all districts in Montgomery County as well as in several neighboring counties. DTMG supports legislation and activities that keep all Maryland residents healthy and safe in a clean environment and which promote equity across all our diverse communities. SB026 will support those goals by streamlining the process by which people sign up for safety-net services such as Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and fuel and utility energy assistance programs. By establishing categorical eligibility, one application process will allow an individual to enroll in all services.

SB026 would:

- Implement Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) to automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults who SNAP already has determined meet financial eligibility requirements.
- Streamline the process for receiving assistance by automatically enrolling someone for fuel and utility
 assistance if they qualify for SNAP, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Supplemental
 Security Income (SSI), or Means-Tested Veteran's Affairs Benefits.
- Support seniors by automatically enrolling someone for SNAP if they qualify for SSI.
- Expand eligibility to participate in the electric universal service program to 200% of the FPL.

Thirty thousand SNAP households who claim a heating or cooling expense currently do not receive Energy Assistance. Sixty-five thousand people, or seventeen percent of those covered by SNAP, are not covered by Medicaid. Streamlining and creating one eligibility process will allow additional eligible families in Maryland to be served essential assistance with little to no administrative cost increases.

For all these reasons, DTMG strongly supports SB026 and urges a FAVORABLE report on this bill.

We have caseworkers across our programs and across the state that help families and seniors apply for benefits like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Temporary Cash Assistance (TCA). Cumbersome applications, missing paperwork, refusals to accept written applications, and materials sent in the wrong language are just some of the barriers our caseworkers see every day when helping families navigate safety-net program eligibility. We know that public benefits are vitally important in the effort to assist low-income seniors and families meet their basic needs, but enrolling and maintaining benefits is a herculean effort.

Passing SB 26 will directly improve the economic security of low-income Marylanders, and generate economic growth for the state as a whole. Automatically enrolling Marylanders in public benefits they are eligible for based on their eligibility for similar programs will reduce the burdensome paperwork and travel often required to apply for benefits. Automating public benefit eligibility will increase access to reliable food, health care, and utilities for the families we work with, building their overall economic security. Improving access to public benefits also benefits our state's local economy and public health: healthy families with secure incomes go into their local communities and spend their resources on clothes, food, and other basic necessities. Categorical eligibility – like proposed in SB 26 – is a national best practice that Maryland should adopt in the effort to ensure low-income seniors and families receive all of the public benefits they are eligible for.

My name Ricarra Jones and I am the Political Director with 1199SEIU United Healthcare Workers East. We are the largest healthcare workers union in the nation, representing over 10,000 members in Maryland & Washington DC alone. Our union supports SB26 to automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults enrolled in SNAP. We urge the Committee to issue a favorable report.

When enacted, SB26 will benefit the 60,000 uninsured Marylanders who need health coverage. If patients have health insurance, they are less likely to delay receiving preventative and primary healthcare, so they are less likely to end up in the emergency room with a more severe condition. Maryland has the longest hospital wait times in the country in large part due to the severe short staffing crisis that is burdening overworked and underpaid healthcare workers. Much needs to be done on a policy front to implement safe staffing ratios in our hospitals – and in the meantime, making sure patients have affordable health insurance is important so that patients don't end up in the hospital with preventable illnesses. Furthermore, when patients don't receive healthcare until they are forced to go to the emergency room, their conditions become more expensive to treat, leaving them with crushing medical debt.

SB26 will also improve health equity in Maryland. Of the 60,000 uninsured Marylanders mentioned above, 23,000 Black are Marylanders and 28,000 are Latinx Marylanders. Furthermore, the bill would address other social determinants of health by making the enrollment process for utility assistance more efficient, broadening access to electric assistance, and enrolling seniors who quality for Supplemental Security Income into SNAP automatically. Streamlining these processes will ensure that Marylanders don't lose their Medicaid coverage due to cumbersome, unnecessary paperwork.

Chairwoman Griffith, Vice-Chair and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of Senate Bill 26. This bill will streamline the process by which people sign up for safety-net services such as Medicaid, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and energy assistance programs. By establishing categorical eligibility, one application process will allow an individual to enroll in all services.

The CASH Campaign of Maryland promotes economic advancement for low-to-moderate income individuals and families in Baltimore and across Maryland. CASH accomplishes its mission through operating a portfolio of direct service programs, building organizational and field capacity, and leading policy and advocacy initiatives to strengthen family economic stability. CASH and its partners across the state achieve this by providing free tax preparation services through the IRS program 'VITA', offering free financial education and coaching, and engaging in policy research and advocacy. Almost 4,000 of CASH's tax preparation clients earn less than \$10,000 annually. More than half earn less than \$20,000.

There are many Marylanders that are low-income and are eligible to receive public benefits and services that could alleviate the strain of coping with inflation and future economic downturns. There are a number of programs available but accessing those programs can be a daunting task. Each department has separate application forms and similar but disconnected processes. This produces a confusing series of steps that fracture a family's time and resources into needlessly inefficient exertions. The more stress an individual or family experiences, the less capacity they have to navigate through complicated processes. SB 126 will not only help families apply for multiple benefits they are eligible for, but it will also help ease the administrative burden for state agencies.

This bill will provide an opportunity for better coordination among service agencies and lead to a smoother experience for struggling families. The effects of COVID-19 showed the need to simplify applying for social benefits for families and state agencies. There was an influx of families who applied for assistance and a significant delay in receiving it due to backlog. CASH has seen a significant increase in our client's needs pertaining to benefit screening, and SB 26 will ensure that individuals and families can access and receive the assistance they truly need.

This bill will:

- Implement Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) to automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults whom SNAP has already found to have very low income.
- Streamline the process for receiving help by automatically enrolling someone for utility assistance if they qualify for SNAP, TANF, SSI, or means-tested veteran's benefits.

Chair Griffith, Vice-Chair Klausmeier, and Members of the Senate Finance Committee, thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of Senate Bill 26, which would automatically grant Medicaid eligibility to children and adults enrolled in SNAP. Special thank you to Senator Augustine for sponsoring this critical legislation. I am testifying on behalf of the Maryland Health Care for All! Coalition which is made up of over 300 faith, business, labor, community, and health care organizations across the state, and our mission is quality, affordable health care for all Marylanders.

Under your leadership over 400,000 Marylanders have enrolled in health coverage since the passage of the Affordable Care Act. Maryland was the first in the nation to create an Easy Enrollment program to allow Marylanders to start the enrollment process by checking a box on their state tax return, and other states are now following our example. Maryland then built on that progress by adding a similar checkbox to its unemployment insurance forms. Programs like these have led to Maryland cutting the rate of uninsured in half to six percent.

Based on <u>Census Bureau data for 2021</u>, this would help over 60,000 uninsured Marylanders get the health coverage they need, including 23,000 Black Marylanders and 28,000 Latinos, making this a way to dramatically reduce the levels of uninsured in Maryland while at the same time improving health equity.

This legislation would also eliminate paperwork currently required for over half a million SNAP recipients in Maryland to renew their Medicaid benefits once the public health emergency ends and Medicaid redeterminations begin again. This will reduce the number of Marylanders eligible for Medicaid who lose their coverage because of burdensome paperwork requirements, while also creating administrative savings for Maryland.

In addition, this bill would improve other social determinants of health by streamlining utility assistance enrollment, expanding access to electric assistance, and automatically enrolling seniors into SNAP if they quality for Supplemental Security Income.

The Maryland Department of Human Services (DHS) thanks the Committee for the opportunity to provide written support and recommendation for amendment to Senate Bill 26 (SB 26).

The Department supports the intent of Senate Bill 26 as it would streamline eligibility for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Office of Home Energy Program (OHEP) applications. This piece of legislation will impact two processes. First, it will make the application process for all applicants faster, streamlined, and uniform. Second, it seeks to enroll approximately 32,000 additional prospective households for the energy assistance program based on information DHS has learned from the SNAP's caseload of households and individuals currently claiming a utility expense.

Senate Bill 26 addresses the income eligibility requirements for the Electric Universal Service Program (EUSP). The legislation would serve the citizens of Maryland in need of assistance by providing a waiver to customers in the State. It would enhance the client's experience, cut down on processing times and administrative burdens, and extend benefits to people eligible, but not currently receiving OHEP or SNAP benefits. This piece of legislation would allow DHS to reach a broader segment across the State of Maryland.

The Department of Human Services recommends amending the language on page 4, line 19 as follows:

(II) The OFFICE SHALL ENROLL IN ANY FUEL AND UTILITY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM ANY <u>HOUSEHOLD WITH AN</u> INDIVIDUAL WHO MEETS THE FINANCIAL ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS ESTABLISHED BY THE DEPARTMENT FOR A RECIPIENT OF:

The Maryland Department of Health (MDH) respectfully submits this letter to support with amendments for Senate Bill (SB) 26 – Maryland Medical Assistance Program, Maryland Children's Health Program, and Social Services – Eligibility and Enrollment. MDH supports establishment of an Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) program to expedite renewal of coverage for existing Medicaid and Maryland Children's Health Program (MCHP) participants, subject to budget approval.

SB 26 will require MDH to establish an Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) program to streamline and expedite enrollment of eligible individuals in the Maryland Medicaid and MCHP. The bill requires MDH to designate the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) as the Express Lane Agency (ELA) to support the program and facilitate Medicaid/MCHP eligibility determinations. MDH supports SB 26 with amendments to establish an ELE program using SNAP data for renewals, consistent with the approach adopted by Massachusetts MassHealth, the state's Medicaid Program, as described below.

Current federal statute permits state agencies to adopt the ELE option under the Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2009 (CHIPRA), P.L. 111-3. CHIPRA allows state Medicaid and/or CHIP agencies to use information already collected by another participating State agency to determine whether a child meets Medicaid and/or CHIP eligibility requirements for enrollment or renewal of coverage. The ELE option does not apply to adults.

In addition, President Biden recently enacted the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 (P.L. 117-328), which requires all State Medicaid and CHIP agencies to provide up to 12 months of continuous eligibility for children by January 1, 2024. This federal requirement guarantees full-year Maryland Medicaid/MCHP coverage for eligible Maryland children up to age 19. MDH is reviewing system requirements for implementing this new requirement and has set a tentative

target date for implementation in August 2023. Implementation of this initiative is expected to have a positive impact on enrollment for children.

MDH has been exploring the best means of implementing a SNAP-based ELE approach into the State's eligibility system. Specifically, subject to budget approval, MDH can commit to implementing an ELE program that emulates the Massachusetts MassHealth approach. MassHealth partners with SNAP to renew coverage for members of the SNAP household up to age 65 already enrolled in Medicaid and/or CHIP through a data matching process. The SNAP eligibility decision is used to verify ongoing residency in the state and serves as a proxy for income at renewal. Medicaid benefits are renewed based on the child's eligibility for SNAP. Parents, legal caretaker relatives, and childless adults who are part of the same household group as these children are included in this process and also have their Medicaid coverage renewed if they are eligible for SNAP.

Notably, State Medicaid agencies using the Express Lane option must still ensure that individuals enrolled in SNAP have submitted appropriate documentation to establish their status as citizens, nationals, or qualified aliens, in accordance with the applicable documentation requirements. Medicaid agencies are *not* permitted to borrow eligibility findings with respect to citizenship from an Express Lane agency. Further, in discussions with Maryland to date, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has indicated that these requirements are not subject to waiver under authorities governed by CMS. Use of SNAP data for the purpose of automatic renewals allows MassHealth to rely on citizenship/immigration documentation previously submitted at the time of initial application for Medicaid or CHIP, substantially streamlining the ELE process for consumers.

To successfully operationalize SB 26, MDH will need to develop new, appropriate data use agreements in partnership with the Maryland Department of Human Services (DHS), the State's administrator of SNAP. While no such agreement currently exists, MDH will coordinate with DHS to advance these efforts. Additionally, while MDH cannot reliably estimate the potential impact on revenue or expenditures, nor renewal outcomes, MDH estimates new costs will be subject to a federal match rate of 61%.

MDH stands committed to assisting children and their families with renewing their Medicaid/MCHP coverage as well as reducing administrative burden for participants. In collaboration with the DHS, this approach will help support Maryland's most vulnerable children and families and meet the interests of SB 26. We Oppose SB26

On behalf of our 200,000 followers across the state, we respectfully object to SB26. The bill is expanding eligibility and enrollment into the Maryland Medical Assistance Program and Maryland Health Children's Program (MHCP) based on "eligibility findings by the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program" and "may NOT consider any other income or eligibility requirements." We oppose expanding eligibility without excluding abortion funding.

The Maryland Medical Assistance Program and the Maryland Children's Health Program (MHCP) are the two primary programs used for publicly funded reimbursements to abortion providers in Maryland. The Maryland Department of Legislative Services, in their *Analysis of the FY 2022 Maryland Executive Budget*, shows that Maryland taxpayers are forced to fund elective abortions. For the years 2018, 2019 and 2020, over \$6 million was spent each year for almost 10,000 abortions each year. In that same report, we see that for Fiscal 2020, less than 10 of the almost 10,000 abortions were due to rape, incest or to save the life of the mother.

Medical Assistance Expenditures on Abortion Language attached to the Medicaid budget since 1979 authorizes the use of State funds to pay for abortions under specific circumstances. Specifically, a physician or surgeon must certify that, based on his or her professional opinion, the procedure is necessary. Similar language has been attached to the appropriation for MCHP since its advent in Fiscal 1999. Without language to prohibit abortion funding, expansion of the Maryland Medical Assistance Program and MHCP will certainly increase the number of abortions and thus the amount of taxpayer money spent on abortions.

Maryland is one of only 4 states that forces taxpayer funding of abortion. Maryland taxpayers are forced to subsidize the abortion industry through direct Maryland Medicaid reimbursements to abortion providers, through various state grants and contracts, and through pass-through funding in various state programs. Health insurance carriers are required to provide reproductive health coverage to participate with the Maryland Health Choice program. Programs involved in reproductive health policy include the Maryland State Department of Education, Maryland Department of Health, Maryland Family Planning Program, maternal and Child Health Bureau, the Children's Cabinet, maryland Council on School Based Health Centers, Maryland for the Advancement of School Based Health, Community Health Resource Commission, Maryland Children's Health Program (MCHP) and Maryland Stem Cell Research Fund.

Abortion is not healthcare and abortion is never medically necessary. A miscarriage is the ending of a pregnancy *after* the baby has died; an ectopic pregnancy is not a viable pregnancy and the baby cannot continue to develop. Abortion is the destruction of a developing human being and often causes physical and psychological injury to the mother. In the black community, abortion has reached epidemic proportions with half of pregnancies of Black women ending in abortion. The abortion industry has long targeted the Black community with 78% of abortion clinics located in minority communities. **Abortion is the leading killer of black lives.** See www.BlackGenocide.org.

Americans oppose taxpayer funding of abortion. The 2023 Marist poll shows that 60% of Americans, pro-life and pro-choice, oppose taxpayer funding of abortion. 81% of Americans favor public funds being prioritized for health and family planning services that save the lives of mothers and their children including programs for improving maternal health and birth and delivery outcomes, well baby care and parenting classes.

Funding restrictions are constitutional. The Supreme Court of the United States, in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health* (2022), overturned *Roe v. Wade* (1973) and held that there is no right to abortion found in the Constitution of the United States. As early as 1980 the Supreme Court affirmed in *Harris v. McRae*, that *Roe* had created a limitation on government, not a government funding entitlement. The Court ruled that the government may distinguish between abortion and other procedures in funding decisions -- noting that "no other procedure involves the purposeful termination of a potential life", and held that there is "no limitation on the authority of a State to make a value judgment favoring childbirth over abortion, and to implement that judgment by the allocation of public funds."

For these reasons, we respectfully ask you to oppose **SB26**.

BILL ANALYSIS: Senate Bill (SB) 26 would require the Maryland Department of Health to establish an Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) program to streamline and expedite enrollment of eligible individuals in Maryland Medicaid (MA), Maryland Children's Health Program (MCHP), and Social Services programs. The bill requires MDH to designate the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) as the Express Lane Agency (ELA) to support the program and facilitate eligibility determination for MA/MCHP and designated social services programs.

POSITION RATIONALE: The Maryland Association of County Health Officers (MACHO), the professional association of the State's twenty-four Health Officers who oversee the State's twenty-four local public health departments, is committed to assisting Maryland's most vulnerable children and families with improving access to resources that support healthy outcomes, as well as reducing the administrative burden faced by these families. Current federal statute permits state agencies to adopt the ELE option under the Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2009 (CHIPRA), P.L. 111-3. CHIPRA allows state Medicaid/MCHP agencies to use information already collected by another participating state agency to determine whether a child meets Medicaid/MCHP eligibility requirements for enrollment or renewal of coverage.

To the limits of what state and federal budgets may allow, streamlining eligibility and reducing churn would ensure children and their families have consistent access to health services and decrease the time they spend establishing, or re-establishing, eligibility. LHDs hope that the establishment of an ELE will result in increased efficiencies in LHD staff processing of Medicaid/MCHP applications and renewals. MD had express lane eligibility over a decade ago and it was found to be effective and efficient.

While it is too early to quantify how much these efficiencies will improve administration and reduce costs, it is anticipated that the decrease in documentation requirements will offset any increases in enrollment demand and associated workload. As the benefit to local health departments is realized due to the work of other agencies, existing, or evolving, data agreements and data systems, such MDThink, can be leveraged to automate eligibility determination and reduce labor demands as much as possible and support the inclusion of any children and/or families who may not normally access the proposed ELA.

The Maryland Health Benefit Exchange (MHBE) respectfully submits this letter of information for Senate Bill (SB) 26 – Maryland Medical Assistance Program, Maryland Children's Health Program, and Social Services Programs – Eligibility and Enrollment. SB 26 will require the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) to establish an Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) program by January 1, 2025, and require MDH to designate the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) as the express lane agency (ELA) to use eligibility findings from SNAP to expedite the determination and renewal process for children in Maryland Medicaid or Maryland Children's Health Program (MCHP). The bill also authorizes MDH to apply for a federal 1115 waiver with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid in order to effectively implement an ELE program in Maryland.

MHBE is generally supportive of state-wide efforts to simplify the enrollment process for residents into health insurance coverage, and has worked with relevant state agencies to implement other programs that simplify and streamline the process. Over the last few years MHBE has partnered with the Maryland Office of the Comptroller, and more recently the Maryland Department of Labor, to implement the Easy Enrollment Programs to facilitate and streamline enrollment in health coverage for individuals who file their taxes during tax season or receive unemployment benefits at any time in the year.

The uninsured rate for Maryland children age 0-18 was 4.3 percent in 2021, accounting for around 46,000 of the 248,000 total uninsured individuals in the state. ELE supports continuous coverage for children by simplifying the renewal process and reducing barriers to enrolling and re-enrolling in coverage, and could contribute to lowering the uninsured rate for Maryland children.

MHBE serves most Medicaid enrollees in the state, around 1.25 million individuals, through the Maryland Health Connection which allows residents to compare health insurance plans and determine eligibility for and enroll in public assistance programs like Medicaid and MCHP. In this role, MHBE is prepared to work with MDH and the Department of Human Services to assist with the implementation, as appropriate, of an Express Lane Eligibility program for Medicaid and MCHP enrollees in Maryland.
