Dear Chair Griffith and members of the Finance Committee,

The Caroline County Commissioners **SUPPORT** HB 258, Caroline and Queen Anne's Counties – Alcoholic Beverages Licenses – Residency Requirement.

The Caroline County Commissioners request that Caroline's alcoholic beverages licenses requirements reflect those of the State's. The current law requires at least one license applicant to have lived in the county at the time of application. This can be a significant hurdle as business owners must find a willing resident to serve as the primary license holder, which usually requires a previous relationship and a certain level of trust. This results in someone who is paid an annual fee to serve as the resident agent on the license and has little, if anything, to do with the operations of the establishment.

The Board of Commissioners believe that this change will allow Caroline County to attract more businesses to the region, thus providing a greater economic benefit to our County by creating jobs and generating revenue.
