The Maryland Senior Citizens Action Network (MSCAN) is a statewide coalition of advocacy groups, service providers, faith-based and mission-driven organizations that supports policies that meet the housing, health and quality of care needs of Maryland's low and moderate-income seniors.

MSCAN supports HB 702. HB 702 requires the Maryland Health Care Commission, when evaluating a transfer of ownership of a nursing home, to provide information to the Maryland Office of Health Care Quality on the entity acquiring the facility, including its Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) quality rating, its tax ID number, and its Medicare and Medicaid Services Certification Number. HB 702 will result in more transparency for entities purchasing nursing homes in Maryland, and documentation of whether they have a record of operating facilities that provide quality care to residents.

As advocates for low- and moderate-income seniors, MSCAN is particularly concerned about the quality of life of those who live in skilled nursing facilities (nursing homes) In Maryland. Increasingly, nationally and in our state, ownership of nursing homes is becoming increasingly concentrated, as private equity entities acquire control of nursing home chains. Researchers and journalists have documented that when these acquisitions occur, an emphasis on cost cutting leads to reductions of staffing, deteriorating resident health, and an increase in mortality rates. Yet when families and friends of nursing home residents seek to hold responsible parties accountable, they have difficulty understanding the opaque and complex corporate structures that control these homes, and identifying which homes with poor records of care have the same owner.

HB 702, by requiring two Maryland Department of Health agencies to share information about nursing home owners seeking to acquire homes, is a small step toward identifying owners with a poor record of providing care.

For the reasons stated above, MSCAN urges a favorable report on HB 702. Thank you for your consideration.
