SB147 – Street Racing and Exhibition Driving - Prohibited Acts, Enforcement, and Penalties

FAVORABLE

Carrington & Associates, LLC, on behalf of Sensys Gatso, requests a **FAVORABLE** report for SB147. This bill alters certain penalties and the points assessments for certain motor vehicle violations related to participation in a race or speed contest; prohibiting a person from engaging in exhibition driving on any highway or private property that is used for driving by the public; prohibiting a person from attending as a spectator certain race or speed contests or any engagement of exhibition driving; and authorizing the towing and impounding of a vehicle involved in a race or speed contest or exhibition driving.

Dear Chair Senator Smith, Vice Chair Senator Waldstreicher, and Judiciary Proceedings Committee Members:

Thank you, Senator Beidle for introducing SB147. This is a much-needed bill for local jurisdictions in Maryland.

While drag racing and exhibition driving has always been a problem, the instances of such activity grew exponentially during the COVID quarantine and became commonplace in many communities. Meet ups were planned via social media, large groups of cars would gather to race down major State roads and local streets, and local police were at a loss about how to stop this activity given the number of vehicles and the ability for the cars to disperse quickly.

As a Councilmember in Howard County, I am aware that most residents would welcome prohibitions and increased penalties for this type of activity. Complaints about loud engines and car racing frequently fill my Council inbox and were one of the most common concerns I heard when I was door knocking during my reelection campaign. My Councilmanic District is bounded by Route 29 and Route 108 and bisected by Route 32. Loud engine noise and car racing is a frequent occurrence on all of these roads. I know this because I hear it from Route 32 in my home almost every night. Not only does this activity take place on our major roads, it also occurs in the parking lots at the Columbia Mall, our Village Centers, including one that was defaced with tire tracks from a pop-up rally, and on local neighborhood streets creating extremely loud disturbances.

Our County has attempted to address the issue but has expressed the need for more tools to be successful. On August 8, 2022, one of our Columbia Village Boards held a town hall to discuss issues involving cars with modified engines racing through neighborhoods, disturbing the peace, and illegal street racing. I attended the meeting as a panelist, as did other elected officials, the Howard County Police Chief Der, and Police Major Justin Baker, who directs field operations.

Chief Der stated that the problem of car rallies started in October 2020 and that in May 2021 police throughout the state started working cooperatively because the situation had escalated to

include large groups of cars performing stunts for media posts. Chief Der noted that the police monitor social media for rally locations to prevent gatherings designed to disturb the peace and endanger public safety. Major Baker stated that the most effective deterrent at present is the equipment repair order, which requires modified exhaust systems to be restored to factory settings.

Former State Delegate Reid Novotny, another panelist that evening, related an incident he witnessed when returning home on Route 32 one evening with his child. He and nearby cars were brought to a stop by drag racers so that they could conduct an impromptu car race on the State highway. Needless to say, he expressed concern about the safety of his child during a routine trip home.

At the end of the town hall, the panel discussed the 2022 General Assembly bill that would have given police the ability to impound on site but was vetoed by Governor Hogan. The police in attendance that night felt that any increased penalties or powers would help improve responses to the calls that they get. We need to find more proactive ways to remove these dangerous drivers from our roads and Senator Beidle's bill will go a long way to help in that effort.

I urge all of you to vote in favor of SB147. Thank your time and consideration.

POSITION: SUPPORT

The Maryland Chiefs of Police Association (MCPA) and the Maryland Sheriffs' Association (MSA) **SUPPORT SB 147**. This bill is intended to address public safety situations that occur from street racing and exhibition driving. The bill increases the points on an individual's license and the penalties associated with these activities.

Across Maryland, there have been continual concerns regarding the safety of our roadways due to the reckless and careless driving engaged in by Street Racers and Exhibition Drivers. The actions of these drivers, who often conduct such activities with large groups of competitors and observers, often cause roadways to be closed to other traffic, including first responders en route to provide care for others. They also cause others using our roadways, including pedestrians and bicyclists, to be placed in grave danger due to their actions. These actions include conducting speed contests on our roads, closing roadways with vehicles and human chains, and conducting exhibition driving activities - all with a careless disregard for others. These activities have been ongoing across our state for several years and require legislation to properly address such activities, help preserve the safety and welfare of all, and achieve our goals of reducing traffic and pedestrian-related fatalities and injuries.

Legislation recently passed to establish "special event zones" in Ocean City to address these types of events has been extremely effective. SB 147 extends these measures statewide.

SB 147 proposes a reasonable solution to address the egregious behavior of street racing and exhibition driving. For this reason, MCPA and MSA **SUPPORT SB 147** and urge a **FAVORABLE** Committee report.

Man charged in two deaths after he crashed his car into an intersection in unsanctioned Wildwood drag race

Police charged Gerald J. White, 37, of Pittsburgh with two counts of death by auto and two counts of assault by auto, in the death of Lindsay Weakland, 18, and Timothy Ogden, 34.

According to a news release from the prosecutor's office, police officers were called to the intersection of Burk and Atlantic Avenues after a report of a multi-vehicle crash involving pedestrians around 9:30 p.m. Saturday.

White was driving a 2003 Nissan Infiniti when he first struck a 2014 Honda Civic, and then hit two pedestrians. Weakland, a pedestrian, died at the intersection. Ogden, a passenger in the Honda, died at the Atlantic City Medical Center as a result of his injuries. Police apprehended White after he attempted to flee the scene. No information about any injuries to the other pedestrian were released by police Sunday.

Authorities were aware of this weekend's planned roadway festivities, and the city's commissioners released a Sept. 21 statement warning against reckless driving.

"The Board of Commissioners emphasizes that all visitors to the Wildwoods are welcome and are expected to obey all ordinances and laws during their visit," the statement read. "Not everyone that went to Wildwood for H2Oi was there to cause havoc," said Keller. "It's quite sad that everyone attending the event this weekend will be umbrellaed into the same group of people that caused this tragedy."

Keller said that there is now discussion among members of the Facebook group about creating a sanctioned version of the meet-ups with safeguards to protect the public.

"The H2Oi group took a huge hit with what occurred and a lot of discussions will need to be had if there will ever be a chance to recover from this," said Keller. "It will need to be sanctioned and a place will need to be acquired for the reckless people to do the dumb stuff safely."

Dangerous driving and road deaths have surged since 2020 across the United States, part of a <u>trend of reckless and uncivil behavior</u> during the COVID-19 pandemic. Last week the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration <u>released data</u> showing that 20,175 people died in car crashes in the first half of 2022, a 0.5% increase from the first half of 2021.

The federal government reported, however, that the period between April and June saw the first decline in fatalities after seven consecutive quarters of increasing carnage, which started in 2020.

BILL NUMBER: Senate Bill 147 Position: Support

BILL TITLE: Street Racing and Exhibition Driving – Prohibited Acts, Enforcement, and Penalties

REVIEW AND ANALYSIS:

This legislation seeks to prohibit a person from engaging in exhibition driving on any highway or private property that is designated for use by the public. This legislation authorizes the towing and impounding of a vehicle participating in a race, speed contest, or exhibition driving and increases the penalties.

The Maryland General Assembly enacted similar legislation in 2019 specific to Ocean City, Maryland in an effort to reduce the dangerous and unlawful operation of motor vehicles during unsanctioned events within the town. The most famous is the H2O event. Ocean City historically has three unsanctioned car events throughout the year. With funding from the Maryland Highway Safety Office and partnerships with the Department of State Police and the Worchester County Sherriff's Office, the Ocean City Police Department has made a combined effort to reduce the illegal activities of these events and maintain vehicle and pedestrian safety in the town.

Armed with the new law, focusing law enforcement resources and using public safety announcements, Ocean City has achieved successful results. In 2017, prior to the law being enacted, OCPD conducted 945 traffic stops, investigated 74 crashes and made 169 arrests. In 2021, OCPD conducted 1,772 traffic stops, investigated 36 crashes and made 242 arrests. While the number of traffic stops and arrest increased over 2017, it is clear the new law allowed for targeted enforcement and a reduction of crashes. This targeted enforcement has identified and removed 54 impaired drivers and led to the arrest of 58 people for weapons violations.

Senate Bill 147 will allow for other jurisdictions throughout the State to use the same law and tools to make their roadways safer. Currently, law enforcement can only issue citations for these types of driving behaviors. The driver is released from the traffic stop and may continue their reckless driving. With the passage of this bill, law enforcement will be able to impound and tow the vehicle. This not only prohibits the driver from continuing to drive in this reckless manner, but also acts as a deterrent to driving in this manner in the future. In jurisdictions throughout the State, there have been countless examples of speed contests and exhibition driving resulting in the death of either participants or spectators. The Maryland General Assembly has allowed for the use of speed monitoring cameras in areas known to have such violations, and this legislation will add another tool for law enforcement and local government to ensure the safety of all persons within the State.

POSITION ON PROPOSED LEGISLATION

Last year's legislation was vetoed because the definition of exhibition driving was changed to require two or more motor vehicles thereby negatively impacting Ocean City's program and any potential statewide enforcement of the statute. Exhibition driving usually involves one vehicle, while racing or participating in a speed contest involves two or more motor vehicles.

As written, SB 147 expands the ability of law enforcement to take a successful program, as demonstrated by Ocean City, statewide to combat this very unsafe driving behavior.

For these reasons, the Department of State Police urges the Committee to give Senate Bill 147 a favorable report.
