## TESTIMONY

**Bill:** SB 229 - Vehicle Laws - Noise Abatement Monitoring Systems - Authorization, Use, and Penalties

**Position:** Support

### **Reason for Position:**

The Maryland Municipal League supports Senate Bill 229, which will significantly aid municipalities curb the rising problem of vehicles creating excessive noise. Specifically, the bill would grant municipalities the authority to install noise abatement monitoring systems.

Currently, municipal police officers are permitted to stop a vehicle that emits a noise in excess of the noise emitted by the vehicle as originally manufactured, but they must do so based on their training and experience. Allowing municipalities to install noise abatement monitoring systems, after a transparent public process, accomplishes two key points:

- Reduces the instances that a police officer needs to make a traffic stop in order to issue a citation for a noise violation.
- More accurately assesses citations, as the noise abatement monitoring systems are precisely calibrated to a certain decibel level before recording an image of the vehicle.

The new authority provided in SB 229 should significantly assist municipalities deal with the problem of excessively noisy vehicles operating on our roadways. For this reason, the League respectfully requests that this committee provide Senate Bill 229 with a favorable report.

We're strongly in favor of curtailing excessive vehicle noise. We don't live on a large street -- it's a two-way, 35MPH road (Rhode Island Ave in northern College Park) -- but even with two speed cameras nearby there is significant and disruptive road noise most of the time. We understand that motor vehicles make noise; that's natural. However, there are clearly individuals who intentionally modify (and operate) their vehicles to be much, much louder than baseline. We're fans of freedom of expression and leisure, but when those activities impose on unwilling participants, it feels unjust. The levels of noise are disruptive to families and regular work & sleep schedules.

It's important that these efforts NOT target people who are struggling to maintain their vehicles; like taillight/headlight programs (e.g. the "Lights On!" microgrant), please provide consideration or language which focuses enforcement on modified or inherently-loud vehicles, not on malfunctioning ones.

My name is John Becker, volunteer Board member of the *Maryland Coalition For Roadway Safety*, Inc. and a resident of Rockville, Maryland.

Our 200+ member organization strongly supports the enactment of SB 0229, the "Noise Abatement Monitoring Systems – Authorization, Use, and Penalties" bill.

We request that the Judiciary Committee submit a favorable review of this bill to vastly reduce DUI-related deaths on Maryland roads.

### The Problem

I live within 95 feet of Rockville Pike, MD Route 355 in Town Center Rockville, across the street from the Rockville Metro Station. Over the past decade the noise and associated speeding due to loud modifies exhaust systems on cars, trucks, and motorcycles has disrupted our quality of life. Modified vehicle exhaust systems are not enjoyed by the driver unless they are driven under hard acceleration and speeds. To live adjacent to Rockville's Main Street (MD Route 355) is a constant obnoxious situation in the morning, noon, evening rush hour and late at night.

Other areas throughout Maryland are affected by this obnoxious noise and associated speeding. Keep in mind that living in an urban environment does include associated urban noise such as emergency responder vehicles, law enforcement, and the occasional trash truck and tractor trailer. But all in all, cars, trucks, SUVs and motorcycles with original manufactures' exhaust systems produce background noise which does not distract from the quality of living in our homes and neighborhoods.

#### Take This Necessary Step Towards A Solution

**Enacting SB 0229** is an important step, especially when other jurisdictions in New York City and Washington, DC have moved forward with installing active operation noise cameras in New York City and another system in Washington, DC that is being slowly rolled out this month. Maryland needs to join these municipalities in ending this problem.

Our founding organizations include the American Automobile Association (AAA) Mid-Atlantic, the Greater Olney Civic Association (GOCA), The Route 210 Traffic Safety Committee in Prince George's County and a group of Maryland home owner associations. Last year a spoke at hearings on Senator Beidle's bill SB612.

### SB 229 Vehicle Laws - Noise Abatement Monitoring Systems Authorization, Use, and Penalties

Good Afternoon Chair Smith, Vice Chair Waldstreicher and Members of Judicial Proceedings,

Thank you for the opportunity to present SB 229, Vehicle Laws – Noise Abatement Monitoring Systems – Authorization, Use, and Penalties. Loud vehicles are a qualify of life issue for many of our communities, especially those located near state highways. As we all know, It's illegal in Maryland to modify your car's muffler, to operate a vehicle with an illegally modified muffler, or to operate a vehicle that exceeds 80 decibels. Many police departments don't want to pull over drivers because officers aren't equipped with decibel meters, this makes enforcement difficult.

How can we resolve this? New technology is emerging to detect loud vehicles and to automatically send the owner of the vehicle a citation. It's like a speed camera, but for noise. Multiple companies are developing this technology, including a company based in here in Maryland. Two states (CA and NY) have passed legislation to allow pilot programs of the technology. New York City recently launched a pilot program and has issued tickets. Other jurisdictions have done pilots in recent years.

This legislation would enable local governments to use noise cameras to detect and ticket vehicles that exceed Maryland's noise thresholds. The legislation is based on our speed camera program and has the same safeguards built in. A local government would need to authorize the use of the sound cameras:

- Provide public notice and hold at least one public hearing.
- Provide public notice about the proposed location of the camera and install a sign near the camera that indicates that noise abatement monitoring is happening in the area.
- For the first offense, a warning must be issued, for subsequent offenses, a citation is mailed for a civil penalty of up to \$70.
- An employee of the local government must review each citation.

Anyone receiving a citation can either pay it or contest it in court. Rental car companies are exempt from the provisions.

SB229 prohibits the camera vendor's fee being contingent on a per-ticket basis.

I respectfully request a favorable report on SB229.

<b>POSITION:</b>	Oppose, as drafted

The Maryland Judiciary opposes Senate Bill 229, as drafted. This bill establishes that, under § 22-612 of the Transportation Article, a noise abatement monitoring system may be used in a local jurisdiction if its use is authorized by the governing body of the local jurisdiction by local law enacted after reasonable notice and a public hearing.

The Judiciary has concerns with Transportation Article § 22-612(f)(4). This provision requires court clerks' offices to send to local law enforcement agencies "evidence substantiating who was operating" vehicles when the alleged offender is shown not to have been the operator when the traffic violations were committed. This inappropriately puts courts in the position of assisting a prosecuting agency.
