It is often argued that carry laws should be more restrictive due to concerns about public safety. However, the data suggests otherwise. In Maryland, before being granted a Wear and Carry permit, individuals must undergo extensive background checks and rigorous training. This ensures that only responsible, law-abiding citizens can carry a weapon.

In the wake of the Bruen decision, the number of applications for Wear and Carry permits in the State of Maryland skyrocketed. This is a testament to how important this right is to people who want to protect themselves and their families. Furthermore, the statistics clearly demonstrate that Wear and Carry licensees are not the ones perpetrating gun violence. This reinforces the fact that concealed carriers are responsible, law-abiding citizens who have gone through the proper channels to obtain their license.
