<u>House Bill 1030 – Task Force to Study Murder Prevention and Reduction in Maryland</u>

Good afternoon esteemed colleagues,

Dear Honorable Members of the Maryland General Assembly,

I stand before you today to advocate for the passage of HB 1030, the Task Force to Study Murder Prevention and Reduction in Maryland. This bill is crucial in addressing the deeply concerning issue of the increasing frequency of homicides in our state.

- 1. To include representatives from the domestic violence community and the office of the public defender in the workgroup, ensuring that their voices and perspectives are heard.
- 2. To adjust the membership of the task force to be more inclusive of local governments, allowing for a more comprehensive and locally focused approach to the study of murder prevention and reduction.
- 3. To include a more diverse representation of violence intervention and prevention programs, ensuring that the task force has a comprehensive understanding of the programs and services currently available to address the issue.
- 4. To include other wrap-around service practitioners, such as mental health professionals, substance abuse specialists, and community leaders, in the task force, to ensure that all angles of the issue are considered.
- 5. To increase community voices in the task force, allowing for a more representative and inclusive approach to finding solutions to murder prevention and reduction.

I urge all of you to support HB 1030 and take action in preventing and reducing murder in Maryland. The establishment of this task force is a critical step forward in addressing this complex issue and creating a safer and more just future for our state.
