**POSITION:** Oppose, as drafted

The Maryland Judiciary opposes House Bill 754, as drafted. HB 754 would amend § 3-1102 of the Criminal Law Article to make two enumerated misdemeanor offenses, § 3-1102(a)(1)(v) and (vi), felonies. Additionally, the bill would create a new subsection, (f)(1), which states that "in a prosecution under this section, it is an affirmative defense of duress if the defendant committed the alleged violation as a result of being a victim of the act of another who was charged with violating the prohibition against sex trafficking under this section or under federal law."

Although the Judiciary has no position on the policy aims of the legislation, the Judiciary has concerns with Criminal Law § 3-1102(f)(1) of the bill which conditions the affirmative defense on whether another has been "charged" with a violation of the statute. That effectively gives to the State the ability to control whether the affirmative defense is available to a given defendant.

In addition, the Judiciary has several questions about implementation of the affirmative defense provision, specifically with regard to jury instructions.
