RE:	HB0205 – Real Property Transfer to Heir – Exemption from Payment – Support

The Office of Attorney General urges this Committee to favorably report HB 205. If passed, Delegate Hill's bill will take effect on October 1, 2023. This bill eliminates real property tax <u>prepayment</u> requirements on instruments of writing transferring real property from the estate of a decedent to that decedent's heirs.

Real property should transfer to a decedent's heirs irrespective of when the taxes on the property are paid. Some heirs may not have the means to pay taxes prior to inheriting. If HB 205 passes, heirs can leverage the real property for loans, etc., in order to pay the necessary transfer taxes. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, heir property is "the leading cause of Black involuntary land loss."¹ House Bill 205 is a means of stemming the tide of such land loss and is consistent with nationwide progressive trends with respect to real property laws.²

For the foregoing reasons, the Office of the Attorney General urges a favorable report of the House Bill 205.
