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HB508: Property Tax Credit - Disabled Law Enforcement Officers and Rescue Workers - Definition and Eligibility

The FOP/United States Capitol Police Labor Committee (FOP/USCPLC) applauds the introduction of the HB508: Property Tax Credit - Disabled Law Enforcement Officers and Rescue Workers - Definition and Eligibility FOP/USCPLC represents the 2,000 hard working U.S. Capitol Police Officers who protect Congress every day.

HB 508, modeled after the MD Code, Tax - Property, § 9-210, would require counties in the State of Maryland to define the eligibility of disabled U.S. Capitol Police Officers and other federal agents for property tax credits, and would remove some of the residency requirements to be eligible for this tax credit. This same benefit is being extended to all local law enforcement, i.e. county police, community college police, fire marshals, private university police, and we ask the same courtesy be extended to our U.S. Capitol Police Officers and other federal agents that sacrifice so much for our country.

Unlike many retirees, disabled U.S. Capitol Police Officers and federal agents are not able to work to supplement their income. As inflation climbs faster than the federal government can initiate cost of living expense increases, home ownership for many our disabled and retired U.S. Capitol Police Officers seems far out of reach. Waiving property taxes would ease the financial burden of home ownership and provide much needed support to our retired and disabled U.S. Capitol Police Officers.
