The Public Justice Center (PJC) is a not-for-profit civil rights and anti-poverty legal services organization which seeks to advance social justice, economic and racial equity, and fundamental human rights in Maryland. Our Health and Benefits Equity Project advocates to protect and expand access to healthcare and safety net services for Marylanders struggling to make ends meet. We support policies and practices that are designed to eliminate economic and racial inequities and enable every Marylander to attain their highest level of health. **PJC supports SB 722**, which would increase the amount of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefit that the State is required to provide for a household that includes an individual who is at least 62 years old from a minimum of \$40 to \$75.

One in three seniors who qualify for SNAP benefits are still food insecure. In Maryland, nearly 1 of every 4 (24.2%) seniors 65+ are likely to be eligible for SNAP benefits, as they have incomes at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). Despite receiving this assistance, 33.89% of these qualifying seniors aged 50-59 face food insecurity. For households that fall below 200% of the FPL, Maryland has the *nation's 7th highest food insecurity rate* among this age group and 8th highest food insecurity rate among those 60+ (18.69%). In fact, the average Maryland SNAP benefit currently <u>lags behind the national average</u> (\$211 vs. \$239). SB 722 would address hunger in seniors by increasing the minimum SNAP benefit, which has been proven to reduce food insecurity.

Seniors face their own unique challenges in maintaining adequate nutrition. <u>The CDC reports</u> that roughly one in five (19.3%) of seniors have special dietary needs, further increasing the cost and difficulty of getting

appropriate food. ⁵ Food insecure adults are 27% less likely to be in excellent or very good health, over 5 times more likely to suffer from depression, almost 2 times as likely to be diabetic, and more than twice as likely to have at least one ADL limitation. ⁶ Access to adequate nutrition is vital to the health of Maryland's senior citizens. SB 722, if passed, would help improve the health outcomes of low-income seniors in Maryland and raise SNAP to a level for seniors that is more responsive to rising food costs and enable access to healthier food options.

Bill Title: SB 892: School Construction - Public Charter School Facility Fund - Establishment

Dear Chair, Vice Chair and Members of the committee,

I write to you today in support of SB 892. SB892 bill would permit the Governor to provide funding to public charter school for their facilities expenses up to \$2000 per student.

There is an inequity under current Maryland law when it comes to the funding of public school facilities. Charter schools in Maryland are public schools but they receive no public funding for their facilities, while traditional public schools have access to their local school system general funds and capital funding to pay for their facilities expenses. Public charter schools are required to divert their per pupil classroom dollars (or raise private funds) to pay for their facilities.

SB 892 would correct this inequity by giving public charter school students, families, teachers and staff the opportunity to have the same facility experience as their traditional public school peers who are attending 21st century schools in updated buildings and state of the art learning environments.

The bill does NOT mandate funding; rather, it says that the Governor MAY appropriate funds to reimburse public charter schools for their actual eligible expenses for facilities up to \$2000 per student. Eligible expenses is defined under the bill to include the regular ongoing expenses to provide and maintain a safe and appropriate school environment for learning, including things like rent and mortgage expenses, building repairs and maintenance, utilities, insurance, cleaning,

security, etc. It does not include costs that are not regular ongoing costs, like construction, renovations and buildouts.

The bill is a reimbursement model, meaning that the public charter school is required to apply for reimbursement to document their actual eligible facilities expenses in the prior year.

Maryland lags other states in not providing any facilities funding to public charter schools. 34 states and the District of Columbia provide direct funding for charter school facilities. For example, DC provides an allowance of \$3200 per pupil for facilities expenses.

Even though the bill makes the funding discretionary, passing the bill to authorize the funding and set up the structure for the program in the event it is funded would benefit Maryland because, as you will hear from the panel, it opens up the possibility for the State to receive federal grant funding.

For these reasons and those you will hear from the panel, I encourage the Committee to give SB 892 a favorable report.

Senate Bill 722 increases the amount of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefit that the State is required to provide for a household that includes an individual who is at least 62 years old from \$40 to \$75 per month.

A legislative priority of Montgomery County for the 2024 Session is to support legislation that aligns with the advocacy recommendations made in the Montgomery County Strategic Plan to End Childhood Hunger¹ including increasing food financial benefits.

While many families receive direct benefits (like SNAP or WIC), these benefits at current rates are often insufficient to cover their actual needs. According to the Food Research and Action Center, "the greatest shortcoming of SNAP is that benefits for most households are not enough to get through the entire month without hunger or being forced to sacrifice nutrition quality." This is confirmed by the Montgomery County Resident Survey: the Survey found that, among respondents (n=1,315), 63% used both food assistance programs (e.g., food distribution and food benefit). For many residents, food benefits alone at current levels do not meet their needs.

Additionally, in Montgomery County, hunger is a buying power problem. Residents appreciate the assistance offered through community and school-based food distribution programs, yet they also shared concerns about the quality and cultural appropriateness of the products offered. Their preference (according to resident survey data) is to have increased food benefit amounts.

Senate Bill 722 would ensure that households with people over age 62 receive direct food benefits at an increased amount. Providing food insecure households with extra money to purchase the food they want from the local grocer they prefer is the most dignified, equitable, and efficient way to support them. Montgomery County respectfully urges the committee to issue a favorable report on Senate Bill 722.

Good afternoon, Chair Guzzone and Vice-Chair Rosapepe and members of the Budget and Taxation Committee. My name is Robert M. Doyle and I am testifying on behalf of the State Legislative Committee of the Maryland Federation of the National Active and Retired Federal Employees Association (NARFE), representing approximately 317,000 federal annuitants and employees in Maryland. For the continuing benefit of our senior membership as well as all Maryland seniors, we support – and ask you for a favorable report on – Senate Bill 722 entitled Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) – Seniors – State Supplement.

As we have heard, this Bill works as follows: for any household with at least one senior (a person over 62), their minimum SNAP benefit will be raised from \$40 to \$75.

SNAP is the federal government's largest program for fighting hunger and food insecurity. During the pandemic, Congress passed a coronavirus response law that temporarily increased the amount of financial assistance SNAP participants received -- the extra benefits were called Emergency Allotments or EAs. But in March 2023, a year ago, EAs ended and monthly SNAP benefits returned to prior levels based on the recipients' income and household size. The average recipient received \$90 less per month, and some larger households had benefits reduced by \$250 per month or more. But the minimum payment for an individual went from \$281 per month to \$23 per month.

Seniors were hit especially hard. According to a report from the Food Research and Action Center, the steepest cuts are felt by older adults who only qualify for the minimum SNAP benefit, the \$281 to \$23 fall-off. Research from AARP's Public Policy Institute, among households that participated in SNAP benefits, 8.7 million included at least one person age 50 or older. The sharp SNAP cuts and rising food prices from inflation were a one-two punch.

After the EAs ended, because of Maryland law, seniors in SNAP did at least receive the State minimum of \$40. From the Fiscal and Policy Note for SB 722, we know that between July and November 2023, there were approximately 29,368

average monthly recipients of the State supplemental SNAP benefit for households with a member who is at least age 62. An average monthly payment of \$15.30 was distributed to ensure these households received a total benefit of \$40 per month.

But we need to do better. We agree with organizations like Maryland

Hunger Solutions that we need to take steps to reduce hunger and bolster the health
and well-being of seniors, individuals and families across the state by boosting

SNAP assistance to those who need it. The funds dispersed in SNAP are
investments which persons spend in grocery stores and farmers markets and the
like.

Beyond that, SNAP is of great help to those older Maryland seniors who sometimes have to choose between food and other essentials including expensive prescription drugs, utility bills and even rent.

NARFE support bills like this one that improve the quality of life for Maryland seniors so that they will stay in Maryland and can age in place with dignity and not leave for other states. Maryland NARFE asks respectfully for the Committee to give a favorable report to SB 722.

The Maryland Senior Citizens Action Network (MSCAN) is a statewide coalition of advocacy groups, service providers, faith-based and mission-driven organizations that supports policies that meet the housing, health and quality of care needs of Maryland's low and moderate-income seniors.

MSCAN supports Senate Bill 722 which increases the minimum amount of the state SNAP benefit for households with a family member at least 62 years old from \$40 to \$75 a month.

Many of our seniors are on fixed income and struggle with meeting their basic needs. Nearly one in five low- income seniors in Maryland struggles with hunger, resulting in Maryland having the 8th highest food insecurity rate among low-income seniors. Low-income seniors rely on Maryland's safety-net programs – like SNAP – to supplement their household budgets and purchase the items they need to live a healthy life. Unfortunately, one in five seniors who apply for SNAP in Maryland receive the minimum benefit, an amount that is woefully inadequate for seniors to access proper nutrition.

SB 722 will reduce hunger among all Marylanders by increasing the minimum benefit while also helping the economy. Recipients spend their benefits on food in neighborhood grocery stores, farmers markets, and other local retailers. For every \$5 spent in SNAP benefits \$9 is generated in local economic activity, yielding a strong return on investment.

For the reasons stated above, MSCAN urges a favorable report on SB 722.

Economic Action Maryland (formerly the Maryland Consumer Rights Coalition) is a people-centered movement to expand economic rights, housing justice, and community reinvestment for working families, low-income communities, and communities of color. Economic Action Maryland provides direct assistance today while passing legislation and regulations to create systemic change in the future.

Economic Action Maryland supports SB722, which would establish an increased minimum benefit of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) funds to households with older adults over the age of 62 from \$40 a month to \$75 a month.

In the state of Maryland, a concerning statistic reveals that only 53% of eligible older adults over the age of 60 are participating in the SNAP program. This low amount of participation is encouraged further by the inadequate minimum monthly benefit of \$40 for households supporting older adults. This extremely low amount of support falls significantly short of meeting the basic nutritional needs of seniors, which has been linked to increased risks of health issues such as obesity, diabetes, and heightened hospitalization rates, all of which could be decreased with increased access to proper nutritional values.

Recognizing this, we believe that increasing the minimum benefit from \$40 to \$75 would not only encourage greater participation in the SNAP program but also alleviate the food insecurity faced by older adults, as well as contribute to the stimulation of local economies as recipients would have additional resources to spend on food and other necessities.

Dear Chair Guzzone, Vice-Chair Rosapepe, and Members of the Senate Budget and Taxation Committee,

SB 722 aims to provide additional state funding to the existing supplement for older adults on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). It would include additional funding to increase the existing \$40 SNAP minimum to \$75 a month while maintaining the age of eligibility for the supplement at 62 years old and older.

As a statewide, non-partisan, nonprofit working to end hunger in Maryland, Maryland Hunger Solutions strives to overcome existing barriers to state and federal nutrition assistance programs and create self-sustaining connections between Maryland residents and nutritious foods.

In 2015, Maryland Hunger Solutions championed legislation for the original SNAP supplement for older adults, from the then federal minimum of \$15 a month to \$30 a month. This was raised again in 2021 to \$40 a month, but at the time had minimal impact as the state was currently receiving the emergency allotments waiver that allowed for a boosted SNAP benefit to all eligible households.

Last year, SNAP lost a multitude of waivers and flexibilities that provided greater access to households to apply and maintain benefits, including Emergency Allotments. Under this waiver, a household of one received no less than \$281 a month. This ended in March 2023, with all households seeing a decrease in their monthly allotments with some falling to as little as \$23 a month, the federal minimum. This mostly impacted older adult households, as they have higher income limits for eligibility and often have higher incomes due to Social Security and pensions.

There is currently legislation being introduced this session to increase the minimum benefit for all Marylanders on SNAP to \$95 a month, HB666/SB35. This increase would not only assist older adult households, but working families and individuals who receive less than \$95 a month. This increase would be in step with New Jersey, who currently provides a \$95 a month minimum SNAP benefit as of March 2023.

Maryland Hunger Solutions appreciates the opportunity to inform the conversation around SB 722. We welcome the opportunity to work with legislators and the Department of Human Services to ensure that Marylanders have reliable access to healthy food year-round.
