Testimony of Delegate Marlon Amprey in Support of House Bill 847 Alcoholic Beverages - Class A License - Food Retailers

Many states in the US, like California, Pennsylvania, and Colorado, as well as Washington D.C., allow the sale of beer and wine at grocery and convenience stores with specific regulations in terms of the amount that can be bought and specific timings.

It is important to note that this bill includes several key safeguards to ensure responsible alcohol sales and consumption. For example, food retailers seeking to obtain Class A licenses must meet strict criteria and adhere to regulations established by their local licensing boards. These regulations may include requirements related to responsible service practices, employee training, and compliance with local alcohol laws. By upholding these standards, we can help prevent abuse and mitigate any potential negative impacts on public health and safety.

In summary, HB847 represents a balanced and pragmatic approach to alcohol licensing reform in Maryland.
