Dear Chair Feldman and Members of the Education. Energy, and Environment Committee

The Maryland Youth Advisory Council prides itself on being a coalition of diverse young advocates and leaders who serve as a voice for youth in the state of Maryland. As leaders in our communities, and as appointees of the Governor, President of the Senate, Speaker of the House, Maryland Association of Student Councils, Maryland Higher Education Commission and the University System of Maryland, we take every opportunity to address relevant issues by influencing legislation, spreading public awareness and serving as a liaison between youth and policymakers regarding issues facing youth.

The inclusion of student voices in educational decision-making processes is not just beneficial; but essential for creating learning environments that are responsive to the needs of all stakeholders, from students, to parents, and teachers. **SB 386** recognizes the valuable perspective that students bring to discussions on educational policy and school administration, rightfully enhancing our ability to contribute meaningfully in conversations affecting our future.

SB 386 proposes to amend current limitations on the voting rights of student members of the board, empowering these future leaders to vote on a wider range of matters affecting their constitutions—to provide actual, impactful, change.¹ This expansion is a necessary step towards bettering Maryland schools. In fact, a recent study suggested through analysis of 67 schools in Philadelphia, that student voice improves student engagement through better teacher care, competence, and overall feelings of belonging.² Furthermore, students who thought their schools to be responsive to their critiques, on average, had better grades and attendance.³ In 1975, Anne Arundel County became the *first* local board in the nation to afford full voting rights to a student member—creating a heightened sense of engagement and worth among students. Maryland is a leading state in education, which means we have the responsibility to set an example and accelerate education for both our young Marylanders and onlookers, just as Anne Arundel County did in 1975, and as other jurisdictions are now beginning to do.

- c. Encouraging discourse between youth stakeholders regarding the well-being of students and the availability of resources (Article IV. Health and Social Issues; Clause P)

The Maryland General Assembly has the opportunity to pass impactful legislation that will lead Maryland to champion a proven model of student engagement, providing youth with the resources necessary to lead a brighter, more intelligent, and inclusive future for generations. For these reasons, the Council adamantly supports **SB 386**, and respectfully requests a favorable report from the committee. We thank you for your consideration of our position.

Support

Good afternoon Chair, Vice-Chair, and members of the Committee.

Advance Maryland supports SB386, which allows student members of boards of education to attend executive or special sessions in certain circumstances. At Advance Maryland, we work towards a Maryland with thriving, healthy and inclusive communities where all Marylanders have access to opportunity, including safe and affordable housing; economic prosperity; quality healthcare; reliable transportation; a restorative justice system; and a livable future. AMD supports HB456 because it would increase student voice in appropriate decisions, allowing local school systems to build a better, more equitable, learning environment.

One of the unique components of Maryland's education system is the establishment of "student members" on Boards of Education. This can be traced back to Anne Arundel County, in 1975, when in a bipartisan bill, the student member was given full voting rights, including access to executive sessions. The spread of the practice has followed, but not the rights. Even though student members are prevalent in almost every county in Maryland, only a handful of school systems allow them to enter executive sessions. It's time we give students a voice in all conversations, including those behind closed doors.

Executive sessions are often where the most complicated issues of the school system are discussed. It's important that student members are not decoration for adults to point to, but real people whose opinions are considered, especially decisions affecting them. Student members are often incredibly well-educated on the real atmosphere of schools, can acutely identify issues, and are the most determined to accomplish their goals in their short (usually one year), timespan. They are composed, well-read, and eager students who understand the nuance of issues, in no way dissimilar to adult board members. They interact more with students, teachers, administrators, and all school staff more than every one of their fellow board members. They deserve a voice.

This bill brings the student members' rights closer to adult board members and allows Maryland to build a better school system. Advance Maryland strongly urges the committee to issue a favorable report.

Dear Chair Feldman, Vice Chair Kagan, and committee members:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony in favor of SB 386, a bill which provides Student Members of the Board (SMOB) of Education with expanded voting rights on the Board of Education of each jurisdiction, excluding personnel decisions. The Young Democrats of Maryland represent the next generation of Marylanders and seek to advance policies which allow Maryland youth to thrive. This bill represents one of our top education priorities and we support it for two reasons: it increases youth voice on the Board of Education, and it promotes broader youth civic engagement.

The role of the Student Member of the Board of Education is simple — students are the largest stakeholders in K-12 education systems yet their voices are often underrepresented within the policy-making process. Currently of the 22 Maryland jurisdictions with student board members, only Baltimore County, Anne Arundel County, and Montgomery County grant their elected SMOBs full voting rights on the Board of Education. Only these three jurisdictions allow for the student member to have a direct say in the decisions that impact their own learning environment and experience. By providing broader voting rights to all student members of county boards of education, this bill gives students a voice in decisions related to their school districts' policy.

Expanding SMOB voting rights also strengthens student civic engagement. By having the opportunity to elect and engage with a SMOB with expanded voting rights, students are able to practice exercising civic duties like voting and holding their student leaders accountable, building civic muscle.

Some argue that the existing limited power SMOBs in many Maryland jurisdictions —partial, non-binding voting power on non-budget issues— already achieves the goal of this legislation. We strongly disagree; simply having a voice in the room where decisions are made is not the same as having a vote at the decision-making table. For these reasons, we respectfully ask for your support for SB 386 and strongly urge a favorable committee report.

My name is Brenton Meade, I am a senior at Broadneck High School in Anne Arundel County, and I write to express my strong **support, with amendments**, for SB386/HB456. As the president of the Chesapeake Regional Association of Student Councils, I oversee the election of the Anne Arundel County Student Member of the Board of Education, the only such student member on a local board in the country with full voting rights, by the secondary school students of Anne Arundel County Public Schools (AACPS). While our organization has prided itself on this privilege for half a century, the time for our fellow regional student councils to have a say on their boards of education has long been overdue.

This bill will expand voting rights for student members across the state, giving their students a long-awaited say in their education. At a time where education has become more politically toxic than ever, the clarity and genuine passion of student voice is needed, and the students of Western Maryland, Southern Maryland, and the Eastern Shore deserve to have the same stake in their education that the students of Central Maryland have. Students provide an invaluable perspective on educational matters because they see the first-hand impacts of policy changes, budget cuts, and curriculum on a regular basis, and allowing them to serve on boards of education prevents the unintended consequences we seek to avoid when creating policy.

Students who serve their communities on boards of education go on to serve our state and nation in impactful ways. The second student member of the Anne Arundel County Board of Education currently serves as a department chair at Georgetown University, and another student member who was elected by her colleagues as vice president of the board is the chief of staff to a senator in this body. These students are chosen by their peers through a variety of selection methods from county to county, but those rigorous processes produce student members who are driven by their passion to serve their community, demonstrating the character we ask of our children every day when they go to school.

Additionally, I propose that the bill be amended to state that a local board's expansion of voting rights under its provisions cannot be revoked to ensure stability in the rights and powers of student members and to prevent politics from interfering with a student member fulfilling their responsibilities.

Our names are Mara Babb, Subhashi Pradhan, Noor Chaudhry, and Julien Halleman, and we are students of Anne Arundel County Public Schools. On behalf of the Chesapeake Regional Association of Student Councils (CRASC), we are writing in support of SB0386 - County Boards of Education - Student Members - Voting Rights and Participation in Executive Sessions. If passed, this bill establishes a set of voting rights for all student members on the board (SMOB), regardless of what voting rights they currently have. The SMOBs stipulated in the bill would be able to vote on any matter other than personnel matters and appeals to the Superintendent.

CRASC respectfully proposes the following amendment to SB0386:

• Strike any sections of this bill in which the additions restrict existing voting rights of student members on local boards of education in certain counties/city (Anne Arundel County, Baltimore County, Baltimore City, Montgomery County, and Prince George's County)

CRASC is in strong support of the intent of this bill to expand the voting rights of SMOBs. Anne Arundel County's student member on the board of education has had full voting rights for decades to make educated decisions on all matters before the board. Through this privilege as a student leader, the Anne Arundel County SMOB stands out amongst others in Maryland as a representation of youth empowerment and resolve to hold the same rank on paper and in practice as adult members on the board.

This bill grants many counties rights that the student member would otherwise be deprived of on a systematic level. However, this conversely sets a baseline that takes away the established rights of multiple SMOBs, including in Anne Arundel County and Montgomery County. CRASC proposes to adjust the language of this bill without changing the intent of expanding voting rights for all SMOBs, and setting a flexible baseline based on the established rights of the county/city. These expanded voting rights will build a mutual trust between student and adult members, creating a culture of equality and excellence akin to the Anne Arundel County Board of Education.

CRASC is currently working with the Anne Arundel County Delegation to propose the stipulated amendments on the bill and urges the support of the Education, Energy, and Environment Committee to pass this bill.

The CRASC Legislative Department refers back to the following relevant clauses of the CRASC Platform:

- *CRASC Supports* ... "Full voting rights for all Student Members on Boards of Education;" (Plank I, Clause B)
- *CRASC Supports*... Opportunities for students to voice opinions on issues that directly affect students; (Plank 1, Clause F)
- *CRASC Supports*...Student participation in decision-making processes; (Plank 1, Clause G)

Accordingly, CRASC respectfully requests a **FAVORABLE WITH AMENDMENTS** committee report on SB0386.

Testimony in Support of SB386: Student Member Voting Rights

Chair Feldman, Vice Chair Kagan, and esteemed members of this committee,

My bill, SB386, will standardize voting rights of student members on county boards of education across Maryland by making it so that their voting rights are at least matching those enjoyed by the student member on the state board of education. However, all counties may increase voting rights. This bill simply provides a baseline.

Some counties only offer a symbolic vote with no real effect, while others grant more substantial voting rights and there have been dozens of local bills regarding the rights of students on boards of education.

What does this bill do specifically? Student members of county boards of education would be permitted to vote on all matters before the county board, except for dismissals or disciplinary actions of personnel, hearings concerning the dismissal of personnel, and appeals regarding the powers and duties of the county superintendent.

Students are the most important stakeholders in their education. By granting them a voice in this decision-making process, it builds civic

engagement and helps prepare students for their future. We allow driving at 16 and enlisting the military at 17. There is no minimum age for owning a rifle or shotgun in Maryland. Many students have jobs and pay taxes. Students today have lived through world-changing events like Covid. I do not see a good reason why a student member cannot vote at the county level on things that we allow at the state level.

There may be concerns that granting voting rights to individuals under 18 could violate the state constitution. However, Maryland's highest court affirmed the General Assembly's authority to establish voting rights for student board members in 2022¹.

This bill is a compromise that will standardize implementation of student member voting rights while preserving the authority counties could grant and have already granted to their student members. This bill will ensure that those most affected by educational policies have a voice in shaping them. I urge a favorable report.

The Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) **OPPOSES** SB 386. This bill would extend broad voting rights to all student members of local boards of education, essentially overturning the tradition of local autonomy in education decision-making.

Historically, the State has empowered local boards of education to shape the local school system and make decisions that only those at the local level could have the necessary local experience and insight to make. This includes whether to have a student member of the board, and if so, which roles and responsibilities of the local board to extend to the student member, including voting rights.

SB 386 turns this process upside down and extends voting rights to all student members, regardless of the wishes of the local community and local governing bodies. Counties oppose this repeal of local autonomy and decision-making.

Local boards of education have critically important responsibilities. They shape our local education systems, make critical budget and financial choices, and guide the community's approach to schooling. Unequivocally, counties believe that student members have enhanced their local boards of education and have provided important perspectives.


However, county governments have serious concerns about extending voting powers on budget decisions to students. Budgeting in any context – but especially for school funding – is often difficult and complex and requires a certain level of maturity and experience to balance all of the factors, needs, and priorities involved. Maryland is among only a handful of states that fund education through county governments. School funding is by far the largest expenditure for its county governments, and counties take the responsibility very seriously.

Counties have significant and well-founded concerns about the prospect set forth in SB 386 of high school students – who are potentially underage and unable to even vote in Maryland elections – having voting power over the largest portion of a county's operating budget. For these reasons, MACo **OPPOSES** SB 386 and urges an **UNFAVORABLE** report.

The Maryland Association of Boards of Education (MABE) opposes Senate Bill 386, a bill to impose mandated changes in the composition of local boards of education and the roles of student board members.

MABE recognizes that student members of local boards provide valuable insights and perspectives on school board policy matters and enjoy a range of voting rights across the 24 jurisdictions. However, the composition, compensation, and other provisions governing the operation of each of Maryland's 24 local boards of education are contained in separate sections of the Education Article. As with other inherently local matters, proposed amendments to these laws are appropriately considered by the General Assembly in a manner that confers local courtesy on the jurisdiction requesting or subject to the proposed legislation. In this context, MABE strongly opposes this legislation which would impose a comprehensive set of reforms impacting almost every local board.

Specifically, Senate Bill 386 would make dramatic changes to the membership status and voting rights of student board members. Again, MABE firmly believes that the scope of the roles and responsibilities of students, as members or non-members of local boards, should remain within the purview of each local board and subject to local discretion as to the types of reforms to be adopted over time.

Local boards are at the helm with their local superintendents making funding and policy decisions that are aligned with state performance and accountability standards, including the Blueprint for Maryland's Future. The role of student voices in informing these decisions is critically important, regardless of the legal status and scope of voting rights of a student member of the local board. In Maryland, this locally driven process has already placed us in the vanguard among all other states regarding the membership and voting privileges provided to many student board members. MABE urges the rejection of the approach taken in Senate Bill 386, in favor of the incremental, locally developed revisions to state law that have resulted in an expanded range of voting rights for student members of local boards of education.

For these reasons, MABE requests an unfavorable report on Senate Bill 386.
