EXPLANATION OF DEPARTMENT'S POSITION

The Department supports the proposed legislation to provide necessary transparency and reliability around differing permits and licenses that the Department offers. From hunters to boaters to aquaculturists, this legislation will be an important tool for the Agency to continue and expand our efforts to provide meaningful and efficient service to those seeking differing permits or licenses from the Department. The Department also supports the creation of the Government Efficiency Commission in the Office of the Governor – and we look forward to having the opportunity to partner with said Commission to develop strategies to increase efficiency in the Department as well as the ability for the Department to contribute to the State's economic competitiveness.

This legislation also goes hand-in-hand with the development and upcoming launch of our updated licensing system in the Fall of 2024 to provide an easier and more efficient experience to those purchasing licenses from the Department.

The Department of Natural Resources issues permits or licenses for a variety of different purposes. BILL EXPLANATION

Senate Bill 472 requires the catalog and analysis of all differing permits, licenses, and certificates that the Department issues. The legislation also then requires the Department to share information on our website about said permits, licenses, and certificates along with the time required to process each application. Additionally, this bill also creates the Government Efficiency Commission to monitor and enhance government efficiency and economic competitiveness.

The Maryland Department of Commerce (Commerce) supports Senate Bill 472 – State Government – Permits, Licenses, and Certificates – Processing (Transparent Government Act of 2024).

Bill Summary:

Senate Bill 472 requires that each principal department and independent unit of State government which issues permits, licenses, and certificates create a catalog of permits, licenses, and certificates it issues. The catalog must include information such as the length of time the permit, license and certificate is valid, the application process for each, and the length of time to review and make a determination regarding the application, among other things. The legislation also creates the Government Efficiency Commission, to be staffed by the Governor's Office, which is tasked with monitoring efficiency in the processing of permits, licenses and certificates.

Background:

Under current law, various departments and independent units of State government have the statutory or regulatory authority to issue licenses, permits or certificates, but there are no requirements for those agencies and units to publish information publicly about processing times to issue these items.

Rationale:

Senate Bill 472 will improve predictability for individuals and businesses seeking to build or grow businesses in Maryland. This legislation creates a catalog of required permits, licenses and certificates that are publicly available and includes projected timelines for licensing and permitting applications - and if those established timelines are being met. Having access to this valuable information will help entrepreneurs better plan their business growth. Commerce often hears from business owners and consultants that a barrier to locating or expanding in Maryland is the unpredictability associated with obtaining necessary permits and licenses. Requiring agencies to make information about these processes and timelines publicly available will eliminate that unpredictability, and Senate Bill 472 goes further by creating the Government Efficiency Commission which will work to improve efficiencies in these processes and ultimately reduce the amount of time businesses have to spend working through permitting and licensing in order to be able to open or expand their business here in Maryland.

Commerce respectfully requests a favorable report on Senate Bill 472.

Position Rationale

Overall, MDE's mission is simple: To protect and restore the environment for the health and well-being of all Marylanders. With this mission, MDE also recognizes the need to be customer service oriented by ensuring that our permitting processes are timely, constituent, and transparent. SB 472 will ensure that MDE is accountable for the timeframes established through this legislation and will demonstrate our commitment to Maryland's economy.

Dear Chairman Feldman:

The Maryland Building Industry Association, representing 100,000 employees statewide, appreciates the opportunity to participate in the discussion surrounding SB 472 Transparent Government Act of 2024. MBIA Supports the Act in its current version. The proposal would require certain departments and independent units to create a certain catalog of information relating to permits, licenses, and certificates issued by the department or independent unit and submit the catalog to the governor's office.

Maryland currently faces a housing shortage of approximately 96,000 housing units. If nothing changes, that number will increase by 5600 units per year. The National Association of Homebuilders reports that the estimated rent of a Maryland Housing Units is more than 30% of household incomes state wide with 25% of people spending more than 50% of their income on housing. In order to address this problem, we need a concerted effort to make housing available, and affordable to needed housing units. More than 50% of residents of the state of Maryland report that lack of housing availability is a major problem. According to the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development, Maryland is the 8th least affordable state in the United States. In addition, regulations imposed by all levels of government account for 23.8% of the price of a house.

This bill would allow for an evaluation of permits and other licenses that Builders need to obtain in order to build housing and evaluate the nature of these items and what may be duplicative and unnecessary. For these reasons, MBIA respectfully requests the Committee give this measure a favorable report. Thank you for your consideration.

Testimony in Favor of The Transparent Government Act (SB 472) Before the Senate Education, Energy, and Environment Committee On behalf of the Maryland Economic Council (MEC) February 22, 2024

Chair Feldman, Vice Chair Kagan, and Members of the Committee, we testify today in support of Senate Bill 472, The Transparent Government Act, which takes a crucial first step in streamlining Maryland's regulatory process so business can grow and thrive.

Governor Moore established The Maryland Economic Council (MEC) last year to provide analysis and recommendations for implementing economic policies that achieve growth, diversify our workforce, and merge our state's assets and growing industries. Our mission includes identifying and tracking underlying economic factors that impact Maryland's business climate, evaluating Maryland's regulatory environment and economic policies compared to competing states, analyzing Maryland's economic strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats, and reviewing current economic policies through an equitable lens to ensure fairness and help eliminate the racial wealth gap.

Through our research, we identified Maryland's disjointed and antiquated regulatory environment as one of the top hindrances to our state's economic success. In our first set of recommendations¹ to the Governor, the MEC highlighted the need to streamline the State's regulatory environment. Specifically, "Maryland consistently falls at the bottom of the list when it comes to business friendliness and regulatory environments. The average business ranking has our state's regulatory environment at 47th in the nation. Our hostile business environment creates a meaningful drag on productivity, hampering the ability of Maryland entrepreneurs to bring their ideas to market in Maryland. It also weakens Maryland's reputation, which dissuades businesses from locating here, and disproportionately harms small and economically disadvantaged businesses, by creating a business environment that requires significant resources and knowledge to navigate."

This legislation is an important first step in addressing this critical challenge. By requiring state agencies to catalog and assess each regulation it administers, and by establishing and publicizing expectations for when licensing and permitting applications are to be returned, the Moore Administration is injecting accountability into Maryland government.

This catalog and data will be vital to achieving the Administration's stated goal of streamlining Maryland's regulatory processes, and will allow them to do so in a way that ensures businesses receive timely and clear guidance without eliminating necessary regulations.

This legislation requires principal government agencies and independent units in the state government to create and publish a catalog of permits, licenses, and certificates it issues, in addition to processing timelines and regulatory requirements.

This legislation also creates the Government Efficiency Commission, which is tasked with monitoring and reviewing the efficiency of processing permits, licenses, and certificates. The commission is also responsible for making recommendations about overcoming burdensome requirements and making recommendations about creating reliability in these processes.

The administration requests eight (8) technical amendments on the following page that aim to streamline the process for agencies and units responsible for compiling the annual reports and expanding the Government Efficiency Commission to include the Secretary of DoIT or the Secretary's designee and the Special Secretary of Governor's Office of Small, Minority & Women Business Affairs or the Secretary's designee.

With these provisions and amendments combined, the Transparent Government Act aims to provide much-needed regulatory reliability to businesses that want to start up or expand here in Maryland.

I respectfully ask the committee for a favorable with amendments report on Senate Bill 472 and look forward to working with the committee and other stakeholders in partnership on potential amendments to the bill.

The federal government has tried for the past 30 years to improve its operations by establishing performance measures for every department. The first attempt was the Government Performance and Results Act of 1993 (GPRA)

It did not achieve its goals so Congress passed the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010

For GPRA, the Government Accountability Office (GAO), oversaw the creation of metrics and established government-wide guidance to assist each department. Supposedly the key to success was to establish meaningful and, more importantly, measurable metrics, that showed how well the departments were meeting their mandated objectives. The GAO also helped set standards for CPA firms to audit the process and the underlying calculations.

Despite the best intentions and efforts, essentially, these two laws only helped pad the income of the contracted CPA firms. Despite 30 years of trying, most of the public would doubt that the federal government has become a model of effectiveness and efficiency despite all the effort and money spent to improve key service to the public.

Most of the employees and lower management where I worked viewed GPRA as a gigantic waste of time and a drain of resources.

Bill SB0472 looks like a mini version of GPRA at the State level.

Unlike the federal process where each Department had GPRA committees that were selected from within the organization, this bill will have committee members that span the entire state government and will contain politicians or high level appointees from politicians who will have little or no understanding of the many and varied permitting and licensing processes in the State.

Testimony Against SB0472

Somehow they will be expected to catalog all these processes and then recommend changes for streamlining all these processes in just 6 months. The bill does not discuss the creation of uniform reporting so that each department sends its requested data in a format that will lend itself to the summarization needed to produce a meaningful report in the short time allowed. To accomplish the goals of this bill, the committee members are going to need a great deal of assistance from those who actually work in these processes, thus taking time away from their basic job functions. This will result in even poorer service to the public.

Instead of the Transparent Government Act of 2024, you will have the Made Government Even Worse Act of 2024.
