#### **Testimony in Support of SB 896**

Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority Task Force March 1, 2024 - Senate Finance Committee

The Maryland Hotel Lodging Association (MHLA) serves as the sole statewide trade association dedicated to advocacy for Maryland's 750+ hotels. Our industry employs more than 25,000 individuals and provides the state with \$1 billion in state and local taxes, \$5 billion in total wages and salaries, and \$9 billion in total gross domestic product.

31 hotels in Baltimore City, representing 76% of total rooms in the City, have dual membership in the local "Baltimore City Council of the MHLA" in addition to the statewide hotel association. 11 of our Baltimore City member hotel representatives are among the 37 directors serving on the Baltimore Convention and Tourism Board. Baltimore City hotels are highly invested in the future of the Baltimore Convention Center (BCC) as it will have a significant and direct impact on the future of our industry.

Convention business is highly competitive given the economic impact it brings to a host city. When Baltimore hosts citywide conventions, that impact is felt by hotels both in the City and in the surrounding jurisdictions. Guests spend money not only on lodging but on transportation, food and beverage, shopping, entertainment and more. According to a 2023 study by Oxford Economics, for every \$100 a hotel guest spends on lodging, an additional \$220 is spent during their trip.

In addition to supporting jobs, the state and local tax revenue derived from visitor spending is a win for both state and local governments. We are hopeful the Baltimore Convention Center may be maximized as a source for driving hotel demand in Baltimore City and surrounding jurisdictions in the future.

As shared by the BCC, "FY15-19 saw a 15% decrease in group leads and the decline has continued post COVID. Destinations like Columbus, OH (+20%), Pittsburgh, PA (+14%), and Cleveland, OH (+46%), all with newer buildings, have become much more competitive in drawing conventions and leaving Baltimore with less. Smaller space limits the Baltimore Convention Center from drawing as many events. From 2013-2029 Baltimore has lost at least 389 events worth 1.8 million room nights and \$695 million in economic activity. Those numbers grow larger every day."

With passage of this legislation, the Maryland Hotel Lodging Association looks forward to providing input on this proposed task force, which we view as a critical step toward enhancing the competitiveness of the Baltimore Convention Center in the future.

For these reasons, the Maryland Hotel Lodging Association requests a Favorable Report on SB 896.

The Maryland Economic Development Corporation submits this testimony in Support of SB0896 – Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority Task Force.

HB0897 is a crucial step towards reinforcing the Baltimore convention industry's already strong return-on-investment. Through the legislation, HB0897 will create a task force to govern a study regarding the renovation, revitalization, or development of projects related to the Baltimore Convention site, as well as draw in industry stakeholders. An enhanced convention center would only increase those numbers.

Furthermore, it is becoming clear that the Baltimore City Convention Center is truly the premiere convention center for the State of Maryland. Centrally located, and close enough to other major attractions, the Center is truly poised to be the best Center on the East Coast. Currently, city-wide convention numbers are down, which highlights the need for an updated and revitalized Center. With an updated Center, Baltimore is poised to compete with other major cities on the East Coast, such as Boston, Columbus, Pittsburgh, and Savannah. A revitalized Center would give Baltimore an advantage over its competition and bring more revenue into the State.

For these reasons, the Maryland Economic Development Corporation endorses HB0897, and encourages the legislature to ensure the future success of downtown Baltimore, and in turn, the State. Thank you.

Madame Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee:

Senate Bill 0896 would establish a task force for the purpose of studying and making recommendations concerning the Baltimore City Convention (BCC) site and its surrounding areas before reporting their findings to the Baltimore City Mayor's office before December.

The BCC as it stands is currently 45 years old, with only one significant renovation that happened in 1996. Currently as it stands, 14 destinations are either renovating or building new convention centers to draw in tourism dollars to their own cities and away from Baltimore. SB0896 is a vital step towards solidifying the historically very strong return-on-investment for the Baltimore convention industry. Over the last ten years, the State of Maryland has seen an average ROI of 4.3:1 in its support of BCC operations, which annually supports 4,900 jobs and over \$30 million in state tax.

Among its competitors, the BCC is by far the oldest and smallest among its competition and has over \$100 million in deferred maintenance items due to the lack of adequate funding sources. The BCC is a "general fund" city agency which receives no supplemental tax revenue. It runs at an annual deficit that has grown significantly over the last several years in support of its greater regional impact, and that deficit, by state legislation, is paid two-thirds by the State of Maryland and one-third by the City of Baltimore, correlating to the proportion of tax revenue historically seen at each level of government.

The task force would issue a third-party governance benchmarking report that compares Baltimore to its national competitors, authoring recommendations for how the BCC can better compete in the convention marketplace through changes to its long-standing business model. These changes would keep the BCC "in the game", attracting business away from the more modern venues in surrounding areas, as well as increasing agency revenue and decreasing any state or city subsidies.

As such, I urge this committee to issue a favorable report on SB0896. Thank you for your time.

Chair Beidle, Vice Chair Klausmeier, and Members of the Committee, the Baltimore Convention Center (BCC) supports Senate Bill 0896, because it is a vital step towards solidifying the historically strong return-on-investment for the Baltimore convention industry.

Over the last ten years, the State of Maryland has realized an average ROI of 4.3:1 in its support of BCC Operations, which annually supports 4,900 jobs and over \$30 million in state tax.

#### Background - State of the BCC:

-Is a "general fund" city agency that receives no supplemental tax revenue. It operates with an annual deficit that has grown significantly over the last several years in support of the greater regional impact.

-The operating deficit, by state legislation, is paid two-thirds (2/3) by the State and one-third (1/3) by the City; correlating to the proportion of tax revenue historically seen at each level of government.

- -At 45 years old, the BCC is the oldest and smallest in its competitive set. Currently, 14 destinations are either renovating or building new convention centers to draw tourism dollars to their city and away from Baltimore, and many more have had renovations since Baltimore's last renovation in 1996.
- -Has over \$100 million in deferred maintenance items due to the lack of adequate funding sources.
- -For Baltimore to stay "in the game," rental discounts are heavily offered to attract business away from more modern venues whereby reducing agency revenue and increasing the state's subsidy. This strategy is not a viable long-term solution, and other tools need to be available.

Using a commissioned governance benchmarking report that compares Baltimore to its national competitors, the taskforce will author recommendations for how the BCC can better compete in the convention marketplace through changes to its long-standing business model and provide guidance for future renovation/modernization efforts.

We respectfully request a favorable report on Senate Bill 0896 including all mayoral amendments.

On behalf of the Greater Baltimore Committee (GBC), I write to you in support of SB.896, Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority Task Force.

As the leading voice for the private sector in the Baltimore region, GBC is actively engaged in collective efforts to grow a dynamic and inclusive regional economy. A revitalized downtown Baltimore is vital to that growth. But investment in our core will not happen without a modernized Baltimore Convention Center (BCC). When the BCC is successful, restaurants, hotels, and small businesses also grow and thrive, which in turn benefits residents of the entire region. Moreover, all sales tax from Baltimore accrues to the state, thus making a vibrant BCC impactful statewide. In that light, BCC is truly the State's Convention Center, too.

Unfortunately, leads for city-wide conventions are down, a trend that began even before COVID (-15% between 2015-19). This is in large part because the BCC is the oldest and smallest center in its comp set and as a city agency doesn't have the tools that its competition has (including secondary income sources to offset incentives and address deferred maintenance). Meanwhile, over a dozen cities have made significant renovations or constructed new buildings in recent years. We are now competing with not just the Pittsburghs, Bostons, and Nashvilles but also Columbus, Cleveland, Cincinnati, and Savannah—all of which have modern centers that keep associations from even looking at Baltimore as a venue for their meetings and events.

By establishing this Task Force, Baltimore City will be able to study and develop recommendations on the future of the BCC site and ensure that any future plans and governance of the site will reflect the needs of the City. Such governance will not only make the current BCC nimble but will lay the groundwork for a renewed center that not only meets the industry's future needs but will be a key contributor to Baltimore's renaissance.

We hope you will issue a favorable report on this bill.

This Task Force would study and then make suggestions regarding the membership, purpose, and function of an Authority to lead the renovation and renewal of the downtown Baltimore Convention Center and neighboring Inner Harbor.

The downtown Baltimore area heavily contributes to the well-being of the City of Baltimore, and serves as a hub for tourism, industry, and business — not only for itself, but also surrounding counties. I am writing to urge your support - and that of your Committee colleagues - for SB0896, as introduced by Senator Jill Carter to establish the Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority Task Force to make recommendations regarding the proper authority to oversee the renovation, revitalization and financing, as well as ongoing management of the Baltimore Convention Center.

For over 40 years, it's been the mission of Downtown Partnership "to promote, advance, and stimulate the economic health and vitality of downtown." Essential to the vitality and economic strength of Downtown, however, is our ability to attract visitors from near and far and to compete with other major cities on the eastern seaboard especially, as well as cities known for their ability to attract major convention business consistently.

As Governor Wes Moore has asserted, "This is Maryland's decade, but Baltimore's time." And yet for us to fully realize the enormous potential before us requires that we invest in our essential assets to ensure that Baltimore is sufficiently competitive with other cities vying for business, residents, and tourism. Our Convention Center, now 45-years old, has had only one significant renovation in that period, almost 30-years ago, resulting in a backlog of deferred renovations estimated to cost at least \$100 million. And yet, at least 14 other destinations are currently making major investments in their convention centers, compounding the challenges of our colleagues at Visit Baltimore and the Convention Center to attract convention and tourism business going forward. The substandard condition of Baltimore's Convention Center complex, as I'm sure you know, has necessitated extending substantial discounts as a means to incentivizing decision makers to still choose Baltimore, despite superior convention facilities elsewhere. This unsustainable approach has only exacerbated the Convention

Center's annual deficit which the State and City - and ultimately Maryland taxpayers - must bear.

The Maryland Department of Commerce (Commerce) supports Senate Bill 896 - Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority Task Force with amendments.

#### **Bill Summary:**

Senate Bill 896 establishes the Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority Task Force to study the establishment of a Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority and make recommendations regarding the structure and functions of such an Authority. Commerce would staff the Task Force and the findings and recommendations would be due to the Mayor of Baltimore, the Governor, and the General Assembly by December 1, 2024.

### **Background:**

As noted in the bill's preamble, the Baltimore Convention Center is vital to attracting business and tourism to the City of Baltimore as well as the State as a whole, but the Convention Center and surrounding area are in dire need of redevelopment and revitalization. Due to the scope of the project and the importance of the site, a thorough evaluation and engagement of stakeholders is necessary to ensure these efforts are successful.

#### Rationale:

Tourism is one of the State's top economic drivers, and for that reason Commerce, through the Maryland Office of Tourism, is focused on continuing to promote our great state as a travel destination to visitors both domestically and abroad. In calendar year 2022 Maryland was fortunate to welcome over 43 million visitors to the State, and their spending was over \$19 billion. This generated more than \$2.3 billion in state and local tax revenue, and supported more than 187,000 jobs. Investing in tourism brings a high return to our State, counties, and municipalities.

The Baltimore Convention Center and the area surrounding it should be one of the drivers of tourism activity and spending in Baltimore and the State as a whole, but redevelopment and revitalization are necessary for Baltimore to be successful in attracting major conferences to the City. The Task Force created through Senate Bill 896 will bring together a wide variety of persons that have an interest in the success of Maryland's tourism/convention industry and the need for a world-class convention asset to attract business/convention travelers. It is time now for the conversation to turn to action and to be bold in recommendations to innovate and turn the state-owned asset into a money maker.

Commerce respectfully requests a favorable report with amendments on Senate Bill 896.

Visit Baltimore is writing to support Senate Bill 0896 to create the Baltimore Convention and Tourism Redevelopment and Operating Authority Task Force, with the purpose being to study and make recommendations concerning the membership, purpose, and function of an authority to govern the renovation, revitalization, financing, and ongoing maintenance and management of the Baltimore Convention site and certain surrounding areas.

Over the last few years, we've seen progress in the revitalization of Baltimore. For those of us who live and work here, it's easy to see that Baltimore has all the makings of a world-class destination for meetings and conventions. And with the recent investments in development and transportation, we have more to offer visitors than ever before.

However, there is a glaring gap that stands between the present and the future we know to be possible - our outdated convention center. The last significant renovation was completed over 25 years ago, and as the years have passed our direct competitors have continued making major investments in their convention centers, leaving Baltimore in a precarious position to compete.

Failure to modernize the Convention Center is forfeiture of the economic prosperity that a reinvigorated tourist economy would create. From 2013 through 2022, we've lost the business of 426,000 possible attendees, equating to a loss of over 700,000 room nights and \$14 million in local tax revenue. We consider this task force to be an essential element of a prosperous tourism economy. Not only is this an opportunity to demonstrate our commitment to the growth of this city, but it is an opportunity to put that responsibility in the hands of those who live and work in Baltimore. This is an opportunity to lead, to invest in our collective future, and to secure our place as a premier destination.
