Written Testimony Senate Bill 92 - Places of Public Accommodation - Motion Picture Houses - Captioning Judicial Proceedings Committee – February 8, 2024 Support

Background: Senate Bill 92 would require that all motion picture houses offer closed captioning for each screening of a motion picture; and require a place of public accommodation that controls, operates, owns, or leases at least two motion picture houses in the State to provide open captioning for at least two screenings each week.

Written Comments: The Baltimore Jewish Council represents The Associated: Jewish Federation of Baltimore and all of its agencies. This includes the Jewish Connection Network, which has an entire department dedicated to ensuring that every member of our community, regardless of their background or abilities, can fully embrace Jewish life.

The U.S. hard-of-hearing population parallels the U.S. Jewish population. And while there are no resources to correlate deaf statistics to the Jewish population, there is no reason to assume the percentage of deaf Jews is other than that of the general population. It can be estimated that 0.22 percent of U.S. Jews, more than 14,000 people, are deaf; 2.2 percent of U.S. Jews, nearly 142,000 people, have a lot of trouble hearing; and 2.05 percent of Jews worldwide, some 271,256 people, have disabling hearing impairment.

Going to the movies is one of the most enjoyable pastimes. By providing closed and/or open captioning, Maryland would be expanding the accessibility to an even wider audience.

Choosing to support this legislation is a no-brainer that can make a huge difference for the deaf community, those with any type of hearing loss, or any other individuals who benefit from closed and/or open captioning. For these reasons, the Baltimore Jewish Councils asks for a favorable report on SB92.

The Baltimore Jewish Council, a coalition of central Maryland Jewish organizations and congregations, advocates at all levels of government, on a variety of social welfare, economic and religious concerns, to protect and promote the interests of The Associated Jewish Community Federation of Baltimore, its agencies and the Greater Baltimore Jewish community.

Chair Smith, Vice-Chair Waldstreicher, and Members of the Committee, please be advised that the Baltimore City Mayor's Commission on Disabilities supports Senate Bill 92 – Places of Public Accommodation – Motion Pictures Houses – Captioning.

This bill would allow persons with hearing deficits the right to fully enjoy watching a movie on the big screen at their local motion picture house just as everyone else now takes for granted. It would accomplish this by requiring that any place of public accommodation controlling at least two motion picture houses in the State provide what is known as open captioning for at least two screenings of each movie that is shown in a given week.

At present, under the federal Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA"), movie picture houses are required to provide closed captioning access for persons with hearing deficits, which means small individual devices so that each person can read the dialogue as the movie plays on the big screen. But, as you can imagine, this is an awkward way to experience a film that was intended to be enjoyed on the big screen as one seamless experience. The proposed requirement for open captioning for two screenings per week would mean that the dialogue would be displayed on the big screen. While there is some resistance to this for fear of an adverse financial impact, our investigation suggests that such screenings, particularly if offered at the more attractive times, would actually increase the overall audience, because it would also be of interest to seniors as well as persons for whom English is a second language and so having the dialogue on the big screen would enhance the movie-going experience.

We therefore respectfully request a **favorable** report on Senate Bill 92.

The Arc Maryland is the largest statewide membership organization that is dedicated to protecting and advancing the rights of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and supporting their families. The Arc Maryland supports SB0092 because captioning benefits everyone. In our past, captioning would be a labor intensive and costly thing to provide on celluloid film and complex processing. However, with the digital age, and increased use of assistive technology, captioning is/should be within our reach- affordable and accessible. SB0092 is important for ensuring more Marylanders have the opportunity to experience and enjoy movies. Captioning is already mandatory for almost everything that airs on US Television. There are only two circumstances under which the closed captioning requirement can be waived for TV: 1.) the 'economically burdensome exemption' and 2.) the 'self-implementing exemption.' i We do not believe either of these exempting standards would apply to movie theaters.

SB0092 would require:

- 1.) Movie theaters (considered places of public accommodation) to provide access to fully operational open caption technology for the general public for each screening of a movie that is produced and offered with closed captioning.
- 2.) (I) This paragraph does not apply during the first 7 days after a motion picture premieres in the motion picture house.
- (II) A place of public accommodation that controls, operates, owns, or leases at least two motion picture houses in the state shall provide open captioning for each motion picture it screens each week that is produced and offered with closed captioning for at least two screenings each week.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires that individuals with disabilities shall not be discriminated against in "places of public accommodation." Although the ADA doesn't refer specifically to media content accessibility, which is regulated by the CVAA- The 21st Century Communications

and Video Accessibility Actⁱⁱ– it was the legal basis for a lawsuit that the National Association of the Deaf (NAD) filed against Netflix in 2010ⁱⁱⁱ.

NAD alleged Netflix was in violation of the ADA as it did not offer closed captions for all of its content. Netflix argued that, as a streaming service, it was not subject to the requirements of the CVAA. The court sided with the NAD and ruled that Netflix was a place of "public accommodation" and therefore subject to ADA Title III. This decision resulted in a settlement and with Netflix offering CC for the entirety of its content library. This was the first time that the ADA had been interpreted to apply to an online business. We believe this case sets a precedent and standard to be followed in the case of movie theaters.

I am writing on behalf of Deaf Ministry - Archdiocese of Baltimore in support of HB 426 and SB 92-Open Captioning Movie Bill, sponsored by Delegate Harry Bhandari and Senator Benjamin Brooks. The Bill would require each movie theater to add onscreen captions on all movies at least two (2) times per week, in an effort to make moviegoing more accessible.

Deaf Ministry - Archdiocese of Baltimore serves Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals from Western Maryland to the Chesapeake Bay. Twenty percent of individuals have a hearing loss. It is important that they have full access to the movies shown in theaters.

Many people would benefit from onscreen captioning of movies. We have members and family members who are deaf, who are hard of hearing, who are neurodivergent, learning to read, learning English, and/or elderly. These are just some of the people who would benefit from onscreen captioning. Many hearing people also appreciate captions so they don't miss dialogue in movies.

Current mandated technologies, including glasses or "cup holder" technologies are often difficult to use and provide a sub-optimal viewing experience for users, since they must attempt to view the movie and captioning through these devices at the same time. They may also be uncomfortable with disclosing their disability to the theater.

Showing onscreen captioned movies twice per week would allow all moviegoers the opportunity to better understand the dialogue of the movie they are watching. Millions of people use onscreen captioning when watching television at home for this reason.

We are therefore supportive of HB 426 and SB-92 and hope that the Bill moves forward as it would allow more people to fully experience and enjoy movies in Maryland – benefiting residents, visitors, and movie theaters.

Dear Judicial Proceedings Committee:

I am writing on behalf of the Baltimore City Association of the Deaf (BCAD) regarding **SB 92**-Open Captioning Movie Bill, sponsored by Senator Benjamin Brooks. The Bill is to ensure that each movie theater is required to add onscreen captions on all movies at least two (2) times per week, in an effort to make moviegoing more accessible. Currently, the rule does not require movie theaters to add captions.

The BCAD Board strongly feels that the bill would benefit our citizens in the City of Baltimore of all ages and backgrounds. This includes children and adults learning to read, senior citizens, veterans, people with learning developmental disabilities and English language learners, the Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing population.

In case you may not know, we are sharing the current information regarding accommodations to bring us on the same page. Our current federal law that was passed in 2017 requires movie theaters to provide accommodation devices to those with hearing loss, learning challenges, and second language learning. These accommodation devices come in two forms: glasses and the "cup holder" device. While it's an improvement allowing accessibility, they still provide challenges for theater goers.

Often the accommodation devices fail to stay reliable for the entire movie. The captions or technical equipment would stop working or would have had the wrong set up that the captions were not the right one for the given movie. This can happen anytime during the movie. Often these malfunctions had to be resolved in person and this often means the moviegoer would have to depart the movie room and miss a good chunk of movie to get the issue resolved. I wonder if you or any member of your organization has experienced these frustrations. It has happened to me numerous times. It gets old when the problem repeats over and over.

Another issue we experience is that the equipment was not designed as a "one-size-fits-all." The glasses are often too big for children. If a person already has a pair of glasses, then it's a

challenge to wear two glasses at the same time. The "cup holder" equipment is also awkward to use. The gooseneck has to be adjusted so the screen stays in its position. Sometimes, it's necessary that we have to hold it manually. Some moviegoers would sit awkwardly to accommodate the view of the "cup holder" equipment and the big movie screen. Sometimes, a tall person would need to slouch until it comes to eye to eye with the equipment and the movie screen. Sometimes, a child would find it challenging to use the equipment when it's higher than the child's sitting height. Although the concept of having closed captions at a movie theater is great, the equipment doesn't always suit everyone. We would like to see them going to movies without any issues and allow them to watch movies with pleasure and in comfort.

According to the articles from "Video Captions Benefit Everyone" written by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and "Does Closed Captioning Improve Reading and Literacy in Children" written by Elise Lewis in March of 2021, the study has shown that captioning proves to a greatly improve reading levels. It has shown to improve their reading speed and fluency, word knowledge, decoding, vocabulary acquisition, word recognition, reading comprehension and oral reading notes. Not only these benefits, captioning has helped to alleviate anxiety and stress. This has proven to also benefit children and English language learners.

The bill is designed with the flexibility in the intention of working with the larger audience to allow them to get comfortable with open captioning and to allow us to fully understand the entire movie. International countries have movies with subtitles and they are widely accepted. This bill is a win-win for all movie fans. It allows the entire population the same pleasure of watching movies at the theater. Also, our hearing members find it beneficial to them because of background noises and sometimes the speaker is not clear and they miss what they said, captioning helped them to catch up with what they were saying.

Having the law set in place would guarantee open captioned movies for all to benefit! We do not believe that open captioned movies will have a major negative impact on the community. Theaters also would not have a major negative impact. The theaters would not suffer over two open captioned movies per week. They will gain more as they will not need more staff to handle open captioning. This bill is a major win/win situation for all movie goers and theaters.

Thank you for your time and attention to this important matter and I appreciate your support on SB 92.

Dear the Judicial Proceedings Committee:

Deaf In Government (DIG), a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, serves as a support group for local, state, and federal employees who are deaf or hard of hearing and as a resource for government entities. On behalf of our members who are Maryland residents, DIG supports the passage of the Open Captioning Movie Bill HB 426 and SB 92 regarding movie theater captioning.

The current closed captioning (CC) technology in Maryland movie theaters are often not maintained which leads to the caption boxes or glasses to either break down in the middle of a movie or the battery dies, necessitating Deaf, Hard of Hearing movie patrons having to leave the theater and missing part of the movie. Additionally, these devices are inaccessible for some deaf people with vision or physical impairments who are unable to use them. With the broken and inaccessible equipment, this is not an effective, inclusive way to provide an equitable movie going experience.

National Association of Theatre Owners and the movie theaters are only tracking the numbers of paid admission tickets, not the number of people who leave the movie before it ends, or the number of vouchers given out to return another time. This lack of a complaint system is one that has proven to be problematic for many Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing patrons.

Open Captioning (OC), in contrast, is better suited to an equitable movie going experience, less prone to failure, costs nothing, and enables deaf and hard of hearing theater patrons to participate in the experience, while also benefiting a wider segment of the public (children, seniors, the Deaf, those learning English as a second language, etc.).

We ask for your vote in support of the Open Captioning Movie Bill HB 426 and SB 92.

The Maryland Continuing Care Residents Association (MaCCRA) is a not-for-profit organization representing the residents in continuing care retirement communities (CCRCs). Maryland has over 18,000 older adults living in CCRCs. The principal mission of MaCCRA is to protect and enhance the rights and financial security of current and future residents while maintaining the viability of the providers whose interests are frequently the same as their residents. MaCCRA supports efforts to enhance transparency, accountability, financial security, and to create and preserve existing protections in law and regulation for current and future CCRC residents statewide.

On behalf of Maryland Continuing Care Residents, we support Senate Bill 92, which requires Maryland movie theaters to offer closed captions on all screenings, and theater chains with two or more locations to provide two open-captioned screenings each week.

A substantial proportion of the population we represent suffer from hearing deficits, yet wish to continue to enjoy a full life, including going to the movies. Without captioning and being unable to hear and understand dialogue, there is no point for them in buying a ticket to a movie. While the Americans with Disability Act (ADA) requires movie theaters to provide closed captioning, many theaters currently have equipment that does not work properly or does not work at all. More importantly, even when in good repair, using these devices is cumbersome, inconvenient, and often difficult. Looking back and forth between the device and the screen interferes with full comprehension and pleasurable viewing. Having open captions provides a very welcome alternative to using these devices and makes going to the movies once again possible and enjoyable.

Captions benefit many people, not only elders who struggle with hearing loss, but other deaf and hard of hearing viewers. In addition, those learning English, those who have auditory processing issues, those who struggle with accents, and people learning to read find captions helpful if not essential.

For these reasons we support Senate Bill 92 and ask for a favorable report.

Testimony of Maryland Centers for Independent Living SUPPORT

Senate Judicial Proceedings, February 8, 2024

The seven Centers for Independent Living (CIL) were established by federal law and work to ensure the civil rights and quality services of people with disabilities in Maryland. Centers for Independent Living are nonprofit disability resource and advocacy organizations located throughout Maryland operated by and for people with disabilities. CIL staff and Boards are at least 51% people with disabilities. We are part of a nationwide network which provides Information and Referral, Advocacy, Peer Support, Independent Living Skills training, and Transition Services.

The Independent Living Network submits this written testimony in strong support of SB 92.

As an employee of the Centers for Independent Living and advocate for people with a disability, I was pleased to see Senate Bill 92. I have Deaf friends and colleagues and am a person who benefits from captioning for other reasons. Were it not for closed captioning, one of my closest friends would not attend movies because, despite their use of a hearing aid, they also have a disability that impacts how they process information. This bill can support people with disabilities and bring people back to the movies, including many people who might not typically visit a movie theatre. I believe the cost of close captioning will be offset by the increased attendance of those who cannot now attend including those who are hearing impaired or have certain processing disorders.

This bill requires that a place of public accommodation that controls, operates, owns, or leases at least two motion picture houses in Maryland provide open captioning for at least two screenings each week. This action supports good business practice and promotes universal design. It removes the burden from the individual who would typically have to request a small handheld captioning device in advance of attending a movie screening. I have heard stories of theatres not having these captioning devices on sight, or that the devices available were not functioning properly. My friend shares with me that asking for this device is yet one more nuisance that deters them from going to see a movie. Thus, they are missing out on an opportunity to socialize and build community. For most people without disabilities going to the movies is a fun activity of convenience, and people with disabilities deserve an equitable community living experience whereby they can participate in all sectors of society – including

recreation and leisure. If a customer does not want to view a movie with open captions, they can choose to attend a different screening.

This bill can help theatres recover from business losses during the pandemic, and likewise create a more welcoming environment for people with disabilities.

The Maryland Independent Network strongly supports SB 92 and urges a favorable report.

The Metropolitan Asian Deaf Association requested a favorable report on Senate Bill 92 & House Bill 426.





Dear Chairperson Smith, Vice Chairperson Waldstreicher, and Members of the Senate Judicial Proceedings Committee:

The Maryland Commission on Civil Rights ("MCCR"; "The Commission") is the State agency responsible for the enforcement of laws prohibiting discrimination in employment, housing, public accommodations, health services and state contracts based upon race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, familial status, sexual orientation, gender identity, genetic information, physical and mental disability, and source of income.

Senate Bill 92 would require motion picture houses to offer "closed captioning" for each screening of a motion picture and require that certain motion picture houses provide "open captioning" for at least certain screenings each week. The difference between the two captioning options is that "closed captioning" can be turned on and off by the viewer, while "open captioning" cannot be turned off by a viewer. A place of public accommodation that owns, controls, or operates at least two motion picture houses must provide "open captioning" for each motion picture it screens each week that is produced and offered with "closed captioning" for at least one screening during a weekday and one screening during the weekend. The bill excludes smaller entities and ensures that the frequency requirement is not too cumbersome.

Watching movies is an American pastime that generates billions of dollars in ticket sales each year and it is important to ensure that all citizens have equal access to public accommodations. Nationally, there are approximately thirty million Americans that are hearing impaired. Hearing impaired citizens often struggle to engage with video media because the current accommodations fall short. For example, special glasses that are provided to display captions are often uncomfortable or malfunctioning. There are over a million Maryland citizens that struggle with hearing loss and would immediately benefit from this legislation. Further, captions can also help emerging readers, visual learners, and nonnative speakers. While there are many alternatives to increasing access to video content, the most effective and inclusive method is captions. Hawaii became the first in the nation in 2015 to require theaters to play open captions for at least two showings a week of each movie, catering to 3,700 Hawaiians on an island of nearly one and a half million people.

For these reasons, the Maryland Commission on Civil Rights urges a favorable vote on Senate Bill 92. Thank you for your time and consideration of the information contained in this letter. The Maryland Commission on Civil Rights looks forward to the continued opportunity to work with you to improve and promote civil rights in Maryland.

In furtherance of that mission, we believe in equal access to community resources; and that all people have the right to live, work, love, and play in the communities of their choosing, regardless of whether or not they have a disability or significant support needs.

People on the Go is pleased to provide this written testimony in support of Senate Bill 92 (SB 092). We support this bill because:

- It establishes a requirement for motion picture houses throughout the state (more commonly known as movie theaters), to offer a minimum of two showings per week which provide open-captioning access.
- This benefits those who are Deaf and hard of hearing, as well as others who might need to read a description of what is happening in a movie, versus relying purely on being able to see the scenes in the film.
- POG does not agree with the objection that this could negatively affect attendance at movie theaters. The legislation only specifies a minimum of two showings per week.
- Movie-goers could choose whether to see a standard-format show or a
 captioned show just as they can choose from the many other formats
 now being offered, to attract and increase movie theater attendance (Dolby
 Cinema, RealD 3D, IMAX, etc.).
- Movie theaters are already offering many other perks such as being able to choose your seating, and what kind of concessions you can buy. It is a simple matter to flip a switch to enable captioning at a movie showing. It would benefit a large population segment of individuals who either need captioning themselves, or are caregiver support to impaired individuals.

This bill is an important step toward making movie theaters in Maryland truly inclusive of the communities who need captioning--the physically deaf and the Deaf Community, the hard-of-hearing, and persons with other differences around language and hearing. Currently, while access may technically be available in many movie theaters, the accommodations are not consistent. The bill would make the accommodations more consistent.

The following experiences at movie theaters of one of Cheverly's residents, who is deaf, illustrates the problems that the bill will help to rectify:

Captioning equipment not being maintained. The resident has attended movies that were advertised as being closed-captioned, at movie theaters that provided captioning equipment. On multiple occasions, at different theaters, she had borrowed the captioning equipment only to discover it was not properly maintained (e.g., battery not charged) and as a result would not provide captions for the movie. Not every theater employee necessarily knows how to maintain the equipment, and those who do (typically a manager) are not always immediately available to address problems like this.

Pursuant to this problem, I emphasize that poorly-maintained captioning equipment does not provide equal access. Because movie trailers and advertisements shown before the start of the main feature frequently are not captioned, the Cheverly resident has on multiple occasions and at multiple theaters only discovered the equipment malfunction after the movie started. Getting the

problem fixed required her to go back to the theater's service desk and ask for assistance from a staff member who was not immediately available, and therefore she missed the plot expositions of the films she attended. Missing that information only reinforced the usual non inclusive dynamics she experiences typically--having to piece information together, with bits of information missing, because communication in the wider community assumes all parties are hearing.

Rarity of open-captioned movie viewings. Attending the movies is a social activity. The movie theater is a place where friends go to connect and where couples go on dates. When closed-captioning equipment malfunctions, it takes away from the shared experience of watching the movie -- particularly when, as is often the case, only one person in a party attending the movie needs the captioning. Open captioning would put everyone on an even footing, and not mark those who need the captioning as "other." Currently, open-captioned movies are rare, both geographically (only some theaters have open captioning) and in terms of content (usually only non-English-language films have subtitles).

Given her repeated experiences with malfunctioning captioning equipment, the Cheverly resident has attempted to go to the movies with friends and loved ones for open captioned viewings. To do so she either had to go to Columbia Maryland (a 40-minute drive each way from Cheverly) for specific viewings, or see a foreign-language film closer by (which provided English subtitles for spoken dialogue). Therefore, her experiences of going to the movies on a date or with a group of friends usually required her to rely on closed-captioning equipment, as opposed to an unencumbered viewing of an open-captioned film.

I want to point out that when hearing people want to see a film in a language other than English, they usually expect there to be subtitles. Providing open captioning for each film multiple times a week, at popular movie-viewing times, shows respect for those who need captioning for English-language films; failing to do so does not.

For these reasons above, I urge you to pass the act. It would reduce needless frustration and send a message that everyone matters, regardless of ability.

- * 55% say they often have to rewind after missing things said when they don't use subtitles.

Dear Judicial Proceedings Committee:

On behalf of the Howard County Association of the Deaf (HCAD), I respectfully ask that you pass Senate Bill (SB) #92 which would allow deaf and hard-of-hearing Maryland citizens to have the equivalent and equitable experience so that they can enjoy the same movie experience as others.

The closed captioning devices have proven to be ineffective and in violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Many of us had negative experiences with these devices that made the screening less accessible.

I would like to remove the norm that the captions are only for the deaf and hard-of-hearing community because this is no longer true. Studies have shown that not only do they benefit the deaf and hard-of-hearing but they also benefit those who do not have hearing loss.

Many viewers find captions beneficial, particularly as the nature of video changes. The shows feature heavy accents that can be hard to understand. Many of our family members and friends, who are not deaf, have come to rely on captions. It has become their standard way of watching TV shows and movies. It adds information you wouldn't get without, e.g., the name or lyrics of a song being played, or a whispered comment by a character off-screen or in the crowd.

Additionally, captions are a very simple and effective way to help a child learn. Students can increase vocabulary, comprehension, and reading skills by watching programs with captions turned on. The captions help children learn sight words and reinforce reading skills. The same also applies to foreign speakers who are learning English but also it improves their listening comprehension, word recognition, and decoding skills.

The request to have all movie theaters provide at least two open-captioning screenings per week is the practical, reasonable way forward.

Please consider passing this bill so it becomes a permanent fixture of accessibility in the Baltimore-Washington metropolitan area for its expansive deaf and hard-of-hearing community as well as for other citizens without hearing loss.

Significantly, movies are generally social events, enjoyed by friends and loved ones together, rather than attended alone. When a group of friends decides to see a movie, it can place a person with hearing loss in an untenable position: Attend the movie, and endure two hours of frustration at not being able to follow the dialogue, or miss out on social connections. Studies have shown that people with hearing loss suffer social isolation, and the inability to attend events such as movies is part of the reason.

The significance of captioned movies was highlighted recently by Academy Award winning actress Marlee Matlin who led a walk out of the prestigious Sundance Film Festival when the Festival failed to provide adequate captioning. Quite simply, failure to provide captioning serves a large sign of the door of a movie theater saying: "People with hearing loss are not welcome."

Thank for your consideration. I hope this committee to act expeditiously on this important legislation.

Thank you Chair Smith, Vice Chair Waldstreicher, and the Committee for the opportunity to allow us explain why this equal access bill is SO important. You will hear examples of how and why captioning benefits ALL of us- not just the Deaf and Hard of Hearing citizens of the State of Maryland.

Captioning also benefits veterans and those later in life who lost their hearing. Captioning helps people who come to the US and Maryland to learn English. Captioning is also a useful tool for adults and children who are learning how to read and write. For hearing people dealing with background noises and unclear screens, captioning is a lifesaver in catching up with the dialogue.

Having open captioning on the screen means everyone can enjoy the movie together with no separate devices needed for access. Currently, patrons need to continually adjust either the cupholder device or the very bulky glasses--even if they wear prescription glasses. Oftentimes, the equipment malfunctions frequently and the patron has to go to the theater lobby to get it replaced and pray that the replacement isn't broken either. That means missing a good portion of the movie, and it's no fun to hear your (hearing) companions talk about certain scenes you missed because of no access or having to take care of the broken equipment. I also don't need to add these are potential violations of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) because of ineffective communication access with broken devices. Open captioning will reduce all of these issues and motivate consumers to patronize the movie theaters even more.

NATO says that having open captioning will hurt their business. This is not true. We have proven data that shows that a good number of seats have sold with the open captioning movies in the State of Maryland. Hawaii was the first state to have this kind of law since 2019, and business has been booming since then. Also, NYC passed this lawin December 2021. The fiscal note shows that businesses will not be impacted.

Thank you for your time and attention to this important matter and I appreciate your support on SB 92.



Dear Judicial Proceedings Committee:

I am writing on behalf of the Prince George's County Association of the Deaf regarding **SB 92**-Open Captioning Movie Bill, sponsored by Senator Benjamin Brooks. The Bill is to ensure that each movie theater is required to add onscreen captions on all movies at least two (2) times per week, one during the weekday and one on the weekend, in an effort to make moviegoing more accessible. Currently, the rule does not require movie theaters to add captions.

The PGCAD Board strongly feels that the bill would benefit our citizens in Prince George's County of all ages and backgrounds. This includes children and adults learning to read, senior citizens, veterans, people with learning developmental disabilities and English language learners, the Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing population.

In case you may not know, we are sharing the current information regarding accommodations to bring us on the same page. Our current federal law that was passed in 2017 requires movie theaters to provide accommodation devices to those with hearing loss, learning challenges, and second language learning. These accommodation devices come in two forms: glasses and the "cup holder" device. While it's an improvement allowing accessibility, they still provide challenges for theater goers.

Often the accommodation devices fail to stay reliable for the entire movie. The captions or technical equipment would stop working or would have had the wrong set up that the captions were not the right one for the given movie. This can happen anytime during the movie. Often these malfunctions had to be resolved in person and this often means the moviegoer would have to depart the movie room and miss a good chunk of movie to get the issue resolved. I wonder if you or any member of your organization has experienced these frustrations. It has happened to me numerous times. It gets old when the problem repeats over and over.

Another issue we experience is that the equipment was not designed as a "one-size-fits-all." The glasses are often too big for children. If a person already has a pair of glasses, then it's a

challenge to wear two glasses at the same time. The "cup holder" equipment is also awkward to use. The gooseneck has to be adjusted so the screen stays in its position. Sometimes, it's necessary that we have to hold it manually. Some moviegoers would sit awkwardly to accommodate the view of the "cup holder" equipment and the big movie screen. Sometimes, a tall person would need to slouch until it comes eye to eye with the equipment and the movie screen. Sometimes, a child would find it challenging to use the equipment when it's higher than the child's sitting height. Although the concept of having closed captions at a movie theater is great, the equipment doesn't always suit everyone. We would like to see them going to movies without any issues and allow them to watch movies with pleasure and in comfort.

According to the articles from "Video Captions Benefit Everyone" written by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and "Does Closed Captioning Improve Reading and Literacy in Children" written by Elise Lewis in March of 2021, the study has shown that captioning proves to a greatly improve reading levels. It has shown to improve their reading speed and fluency, word knowledge, decoding, vocabulary acquisition, word recognition, reading comprehension and oral reading notes. Not only these benefits, captioning has helped to alleviate anxiety and stress. This has proven to also benefit children and English language learners.

The bill is designed with the flexibility in the intention of working with the larger audience to allow them to get comfortable with open captioning and to allow us to fully understand the entire movie. International countries have movies with subtitles and they are widely accepted. This bill is a win-win for all movie fans. It allows the entire population the same pleasure of watching movies at the theater. Also, our hearing members find it beneficial to them because of background noises and sometimes the speaker is not clear and they miss what they said, captioning helped them to catch up with what they were saying.

Having the law set in place would guarantee open captioned movies for all to benefit! We do not believe that open captioned movies will have a major negative impact on the community. Theaters also would not have a major negative impact. The theaters would not suffer over two open captioned movies per week. They will gain more as they will not need more staff to handle open captioning. This bill is a major win/win situation for all movie goers and theaters.

People On the Go of Maryland (POG) is a statewide self-advocacy organization, ran for and by those with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities (IDD) and our mission is to promote self-advocacy throughout the state. In furtherance of that mission, we believe in equal access to community resources; and that all people have the right to live, work, love, and play in the communities of their choosing, regardless of whether or not they have a disability or significant support needs.

People on the Go is pleased to provide this written testimony in support of Senate Bill 92 (SB 092). We support this bill because:

- It establishes a requirement for motion picture houses throughout the state (more commonly known as movie theaters), to offer a minimum of two showings per week which provide open-captioning access.
- This benefits those who are Deaf and hard of hearing, as well as others who might need to read a description of what is happening in a movie, versus relying purely on being able to see the scenes in the film.
- POG does not agree with the objection that this could negatively affect attendance at movie theaters. The legislation only specifies a minimum of two showings per week.
- Movie-goers could choose whether to see a standard-format show or a
 captioned show just as they can choose from the many other formats
 now being offered, to attract and increase movie theater attendance (Dolby
 Cinema, RealD 3D, IMAX, etc.).
- Movie theaters are already offering many other perks such as being able to choose your seating, and what kind of concessions you can buy. It is a simple matter to flip a switch to enable captioning at a movie showing. It would benefit a large population segment of individuals who either need captioning themselves, or are caregiver support to impaired individuals.
- Without this service, this segment of the community could decide to just stay home and stream a movie with their own television's accessibility controls enabled. With such a service, the hearing- and visually-impaired can participate in the community experience of seeing a movie, help small businesses, and stimulate the economy throughout the state of Maryland.

STATEMENT OF IDENTITY AND INTEREST

The Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (hereinafter "A.G. Bell") respectfully submits the following comments in support of the "Places of Public Accommodation - Motion Picture Houses – Captioning" Bill (SB 92).

A.G. Bell is a non-profit organization based in the District of Columbia. It has chapters throughout the United States—including in the Maryland—and international affiliates worldwide. One of the oldest and preeminent organizations in deafness, A.G. Bell advocates for spoken language in deaf children and adults. A.G. Bell provides advocacy, resources and leadership for parents, professionals, and individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing. A.G. Bell has long advocated for movie captioning accessibility. A.G. Bell has participated as *amicus curiae* in court cases seeking movie captioning access, and submitted comments in favor of expanding captioning accessibility to legislative and regulatory bodies. Indeed, A.G. Bell submitted comments to the Maryland House in support of "Rachel's Law" (HB 1463) in 2011 urging the House to implement captioning access. A.G. Bell is also submitting comments concomitantly to the Maryland House in support

of the current HB 426 (which also contemplates open captioning access).

Moreover, A.G. Bell has published numerous articles advocating movie captioning access in its publications.

In a perfect world, movie theaters would happily and voluntarily provide captioning access to deaf patrons for their feature presentations. Sadly, however, such has not been the case. History has conclusively shown theaters, when left to their own devices, either provide minimal or no captioning access for deaf patrons. While the deaf community has achieved success in requiring theaters to provide captioning accessibility for their feature presentations via litigation and settlements throughout the country, most of these efforts have resulted in closed-captioning technology access—which is not the preferred method of access for deaf moviegoers.

Although long overdue, A.G. Bell applauds the Maryland Senate focusing on movie captioning access. A.G. Bell believes that its views can inform the Senate, and assist the Senate in making an informed decision when it decides to issue laws regarding movie captioning access. In these comments, A.G. Bell will provide the Senate with a brief background to the history of movie captioning, and the deaf community's efforts to obtain captioning access.

If history is any guide, A.G. Bell fully expects the movie theater industry to oppose the bill outright, or at least minimize the potential impact of the bill.

Indeed, they did so for Rachel's Law before the Maryland House in 2011. A.G. Bell expects the theater industry to set forth the same tired and discredited arguments that it has made in court cases, to state legislatures and/or city councils considering captioning access bills, and to federal government regarding federal disability laws. Accordingly, these comments will discuss the movie theaters' historical resistance to captioning access, and will refute many of the industry's often-repeated arguments as to why a mandate for captioning access is unnecessary. The comments will also explain why open captioning accessibility mandates are necessary.

I. THE NECESSITY FOR FULL MOVIE CAPTIONING ACCESS FOR DEAF PATRONS

In order to fully appreciate the necessity of captioning access regulations, it may be helpful to have an understanding as to what movie captioning means for deaf citizens.

A. Cultural Significance of Movies and Impact of Lack of Captioning Access

There are thousands of movie theaters nationwide, each showing many features daily. To experience the "magic of movies," deaf individuals need captioning access to the movie's dialogue. Simply put, deaf individuals cannot follow a movie's storyline if (for example) they cannot understand Darth Vader's proclamation "No, Luke—I am your father" in *The Empire Strikes Back*. Nor can

they appreciate the drama of a scene without understanding (for example) Chief Brody gravely informing Quint "You're gonna need a bigger boat" in *Jaws*.

Furthermore, a movie (or even a line from a movie) may become a topic of popular discussion because of the movie's entertainment value or social message. Without captioning access, deaf individuals would not be able to follow the nowiconic "It is literally impossible to be a woman" speech from *Barbie. Cf.*Comment, *District Court Approves Settlement Requiring Movie Theaters to Provide Closed Captioning for Deaf and Hard of Hearing People*, 118 HARV. L. REV. 1777, 1780 (2005) (making similar point).

B. Movie Captioning Prior to the 1990s

The earliest movies provided full accessibility for deaf individuals, as the dialogue was printed on the screen and visible to the entire audience. The era of "silent" films effectively ended in 1927, when *The Jazz Singer* (a "talking" movie) was a commercial success. In the decades that followed, deaf individuals were largely excluded from the social, cultural, and emotional experience of movies.

The first law to address the lack of captioning issue was the Captioned Films Act, Pub. L. 85-905 (1958), when the United States Congress appropriated federal funds to lease, or accept films, provide captions for them, and distribute them through state schools for the deaf, and other appropriate state agencies. This program proved enormously popular among deaf individuals, and Congress has

expanded the captioning appropriations over time. *See generally* Heldman, *Television and the Hearing Impaired*, 34 FED. COMM. L. J. 93, 123-24 (1982) (recounting early development of federal captioning laws).

Despite extensive efforts by deaf advocates, captioning access in theaters was largely nonexistent-to-limited until recently. Prior to the 1990s, captioned films were generally not available for deaf audiences until long after they had been available to hearing audiences. Until the later Twentieth Century, captioning was a laborious process, often taking several months after a film had been released. Theaters were not interested in showing a (now captioned) movie that had outlived its commercial run. *See generally* Kovalik, "Silent" Films Revisited: Captioned Films for the Deaf, 41 Library Trends 100 (June 22, 1992).

Moreover, until the late 1990s, the only form of movie captioning that existed was "open captioning." In the movie theater context, "open" captions are seen by the entire audience, whereas "closed" captions are seen only by the deaf patron. *See Ball v. AMC Entern., Inc.*, 246 F. Supp.2d 17, 20 n.9 (D.D.C. 2003) (explaining differences between "open" and "closed" captioning). As a practical matter, "open" captions are similar to English subtitles in foreign films. However, unlike such subtitles in foreign films, "open" captions include additional aural information (i.e., "doorbell" or "telephone ringing"), as well as tone (i.e., "shouting," "whispering," "falsetto").

Theaters have long resisted extensive use of open captions, ostensibly because they are "too distracting" to non-deaf members of the audience.² While technological improvements have greatly simplified the captioning process (indeed, today many amateurs caption their films and videos such as YouTube and other social media), and studios have assumed responsibility for captioning their films, most theaters that show open captioned movies are reluctant to show such movies beyond non-premium times such as Tuesday evenings or Sunday mornings.

C. Development of Closed-Captioning Technology

When the federal Americans With Disabilities Act ("ADA") was enacted in 1990, deaf advocates were dismayed when the ADA's House Report contained a passage stating that "open captioning" was not required. *See* H. REP. 101-485(II)

at 108 (1990). However, deaf advocates were encouraged by language in the Report indicating that the ADA contemplated utilization of future technologies. *See id.* (ADA requirements "should keep pace with the rapidly changing technology of the times"). Based upon this language, deaf advocates—including A.G. Bell—pressed for the development of closed captioning technologies.

Since the late 1990s, there have indeed been several closed-captioning technologies developed, and deaf advocates sued under the federal ADA for theaters to implement these technologies. See, e.g., Arizona v. Harkins, 603 F.3d 666 (9th Cir. 2010) (requiring movie theaters to install closed-captioning equipment for deaf patrons); Ball v. AMC Entm't, Inc., 315 F. Supp.2d 120, 122-23 (D.D.C. 2004) (same). In the mid-to-late 2000s, a few states enacted laws mandating closed-captioning access. And in 2014, the National Association of Theater Owners and several deaf advocacy groups—including A.G. Bell—agreed to standards on closed-captioning access on a nationwide basis. See Lieberman, Exhibitors Agree To "Landmark" ADA Compromise on Closed Captioning, DEADLINE (Nov. 21, 2014), available at https://deadline.com/2014/11/movietheaters-closed-captioning-americans-disabilities-act-1201292123/. In 2019, Hawaii became the first state that required movie theaters to provide a minimum number of weekly open-captioned feature presentations for deaf patrons.

D. General Captioning Preferences of the Deaf Community

It has been A.G. Bell's longtime position that open-captioning—rather than closed-captioning—is the preferred method of movie access for deaf patrons.

Indeed, such is the position of every major deaf advocacy organization.

Tellingly, one of the reasons why movie theaters were so reluctant to implement closed-captioning technologies in the 1990s was because they argued that deaf patrons preferred open captioning. This explanation would have been acceptable if theaters had agreed to increase their open captioned showings in lieu of installing closed captioning. But they did not do so. Rather, theaters generally continued their practice of showing open-captioned movies only a few times a year, and always at non-premium times, such as Tuesday evenings or Sunday mornings. Hence, the deaf community was forced to resort to litigation using what limited remedies the federal ADA offered (i.e., closed captioning access) to attain captioning accessibility for showtimes that the rest of the world preferred.

The reasons why the deaf community prefers open captioning over closed-captioning have been oft-repeated. A.G. Bell is confident that the Senate will hear of the shortcomings of closed-captioning technologies from other deaf citizens, and will only briefly re-state them here. Many (if not all) closed captioning technologies are cumbersome to use. The closed-captioning devices require the deaf patron to look-up/look-down to read the captions and follow the action on the

screen, whereas the open captions are within the line of sight of the screen (indeed, literally on the screen). In other words, open captions are easier to read/follow than closed captions. In addition, far too often, the closed-captioning devices suffer from operator failure or battery loss. And most users of the closed-captioning devices have experienced instances where the signal is not strong enough to the theater, resulting in missed or garbled dialogue on the closed-captioning device.

And perhaps most importantly, movie theaters have shown little appetite for improving the closed-captioning technologies that they have installed. In many theaters, the same closed-captioning system has been in place for well-over a decade. For this reason, many closed-captioning manufacturers (Sony, for example) have ceased their closed-captioning system innovations. Why bother investing in new research when theaters are not going to buy new systems?

The long and short of it is that open-captioning is a far superior form of access than closed-captioning for deaf patrons. An analogy—while admittedly imperfect—is that closed-captioning is to civil unions what open captioning is to marriage equality. It is better than nothing, but it is not equal accessibility.

II. A.G. BELL EXPECTS THE THEATER INDUSTRY TO OPPOSE SB 92

A.G. Bell has been monitoring captioning advocacy for decades and is well-familiar with the usual arguments that theaters make in opposing captioning

access. A.G. Bell will list below the more common contentions set forth by theaters in opposing captioning mandates, and will explain why none of them withstand scrutiny. A.G. Bell encourages the Senate to disregard the theaters' often-repeated arguments for avoiding captioning access mandates.

A. "We Don't Discriminate"

Although this argument has lost much steam because it has been rejected so many times, theaters often claimed that they do not discriminate against deaf individuals because deaf patrons are free to purchase tickets and watch (uncaptioned) films in the same fashion as the general public. As one court noted, this type of reasoning "missed the point" of disability discrimination laws. *See Soto v. City of Newark*, 72 F. Supp.2d 489, 496 n.12 (D.N.J. 1999) (defendants' argument that they need only treat deaf individuals "in the same fashion as everyone else . . . misses the point of the ADA").

As federal courts have recognized, failure to provide equal access through accommodations constitutes illegal discrimination. *See, e.g., Lentini v. Cal. Ctr. for the Arts*, 370 F.3d 837, 846-47 (9th Cir. 2004) (failure to provide accommodations is discrimination); *Walker v. Carnival Cruise Lines*, 63 F. Supp.2d 1083, 1092 (N.D. Cal. 1999) (defendants violate ADA "not simply for denying their services to disabled customers outright, *but for failing to modify or adjust their services so as to meet the needs of the disabled customers they do*

serve"; emphasis added). Accordingly, theaters cannot avoid discrimination charges merely by contending that they allow deaf patrons to buy tickets and entry to the theater in the same manner as the general public.

Theaters also contend that they serve their deaf patrons by installing assistive listening devices such as infrared or FM sound systems. However, such devices only benefit people with mild hearing losses, and were useless to people who were deaf or had significant hearing impairments. *See Ball*, 246 F. Supp.2d at 23 n.17 (noting point). As one legal commentator put it, "[c]aptioning is currently the only form of technology that serves as an auxiliary aid providing equally effective communication to profoundly deaf individuals as well as others with less severe hearing loss." Comment, *Open and Closed, Captioning Technologies as a Means to Equality*, 23 J. MARSHALL J. COMPUTER & INFO. L. 159, 182 n.207 (2004).

A.G. Bell expects that the movie theaters will attempt to make a similar argument with respect to closed-captioning technologies as they did with respect to assistive listening devices. However, as already discussed above, the deaf community unquestionably prefers open captioning, rather than closed captioning for movie theater access.

B. Captioning "Alters the Content of a Movie" or is a "Different Service"

Theaters have often contended that they have no control over whether studios caption movies (even though studios caption almost every major movie today), and that providing captioning access "alters the content" of a movie. As such, theaters contend, they may be liable for violating artists' First Amendment rights if they provide captioning access to deaf patrons.

Again, these "captions alter the content of a movie" arguments are absolute balderdash. Courts and commentators have flatly rejected such arguments in no uncertain terms. See, e.g., Gottfried v. FCC, 655 F.2d 297, 312 n.54 (D.C. Cir. 1981) ("A captioning requirement would not significantly interfere with program content"), rev'd in part on other grounds, 459 U.S. 498 (1983); Ball, 246 F. Supp.2d at 21 n.11 (captioning does not alter content of movie); Comment, supra, 23 J. MARSHALL J. COMPUTER & INFO. L. at 197 ("The movie product is not itself altered in any way, shape or form when [captioning] is used"). The Federal Communications Commission likewise does not believe that captioning alters the content of television programming in any fashion. See, e.g., In re Captioning for the Deaf, 63 F.C.C.2d 378, at *5 (Dec. 20, 1977) (noting FCC's longstanding interest in promoting television captioning for deaf viewers); Comment, supra, 23 J. Marshall J. Computer & Info. L. at 169-70 (similar point). Likewise,

Congress never indicated in the 1958 Captioned Films Act that captioning alters movies.

Moreover, in 2010, a panel of judges on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit considered and largely ridiculed the theaters' "we are in the non-captioned movies business" argument, telling counsel for the theaters: "We think, you know it's just silly for anybody to argue that." Moreover, the Chief Judge of the Ninth Circuit called the theaters "jerks" for refusing to provide captioning access, and said that the theaters "are going to lose this battle [over captioning access] in the end."

And even more compelling is the critical and commercial successes of foreign and/or "subtitled" movies in recent years, such as *Parasite*, *Pan's Labrinth*, and *The Passion of the Christ*. If American audiences had no problem watching the subtitles visible to the entire audience in these critically and commercially successful films, then it is entirely incongruent for theaters to argue that captions for deaf patrons somehow alter the nature of a movie. *Cf.* Comment, *supra*, 23 J. MARSHALL J. COMPUTER & INFO. L. at 197-98 (making similar point).

C. Deaf People Are Illiterate and Can't Understand Captions

Finally, a lawsuit seeking captioning was filed in Washington State Court in the early 2000s under Washington State Disability Law. The theaters raised the usual defenses as to why they should not be required to provide captioning access. However, the theaters had made a new argument in the Washington State lawsuit that bears highlighting. Theaters argued that they shouldn't have to provide captioning access because many deaf patrons are illiterate and cannot understand captions.

Seriously. They made that argument.

Like every demographic, it is true that the deaf community has some members whose reading skills are poor. However, like every demographic, the deaf community has members who have graduated from Ivy League institutions. In short, the deaf community has members of all walks and abilities of life—just like every other demographic. The theaters' argument in the Washington State case that they should not have to provide captioning access because some deaf patrons have poor reading skills is nothing short of outrageous and demonstrates the depths to which the theaters will sink to avoid captioning access mandates.

D. Captioning Will Result in Financial Burdens and/or Losses

Another favorite canard that theaters employ to resist captioning access is that it supposedly cost too much to install captioning equipment. For theaters that have converted to digital technology (i.e., any reasonably modern theater), there is no cost for implementing open captioning. Indeed, virtually every major motion picture comes with captions (produced by the studio) at present.

Relatedly, theaters claim that they lose money on open-captioned showings because "hearing" patrons demand refunds after discovering that a showing has open captions, or else refuse to attend open captioned showings. The former complaint can be avoided with appropriate advertising (i.e., "this presentation contains open captions") to protect against upset expectations. A.G. Bell also respectfully suggests that such people are becoming rarer and rarer, given that an entire generation has grown up with captions on television at home, airports, and bars. The public is far more accepting of open captions than it was thirty years ago.

The latter complaint (usually in the form of comparing attendance between captioned showings and non-captioned showings) fails to take into account that patrons who refuse to attend an open-captioned showing will likely adjust their schedules to attend a non-captioned showings. There is no evidence that patrons stay home entirely merely because a particular movie they wish to see is being

shown with captions. They are far more likely to simply attend a non-captioned showing of that movie rather than stay home altogether.

If anything, it can be argued that open-captioned showings *increase* attendance for theaters. Deaf people (and their close friends/relatives) are simply not going to attend non-captioned movies. They will attend open-captioned movies. And theaters will also reap the benefits of concession expenditures from those deaf patrons (and their close friends/relatives). *See Ball*, 246 F. Supp. 2d at 26 (recognizing point).

And to the extent that the theaters suggest that *any* expenditure or loss of profit necessarily constitutes economic hardship, their position is beyond frivolous. Basic disability law "contemplates some financial burden resulting from the accommodation" for people with disabilities. *United States v. Cal. Mobile Home Park Mgmt. Co.*, 29 F.3d 1413, 1417 (9th Cir. 1994). Under the federal ADA, the "undue burden" standard is high. *See, e.g., Anderson v. Gus Mayer Boston Store of Delaware*, 924 F. Supp. 763, 781 (E.D. Tex. 1996) (defining "undue hardship" as a "concept approaching financial ruin"). Theaters can point to no example of a business (let alone a theater) going into financial jeopardy as a result of captioning access, and no such examples exist.

Moreover, courts have continually rejected comparable "we will lose business" arguments as a defense against civil rights laws. Theater owners once

argued that compliance with desegregation laws would be economically ruinous because their Caucasian patrons would be offended by the presence of African-Americans, but courts rejected such contentions. *See, e.g., United States v. Gulf-State Theaters, Inc.*, 256 F. Supp. 549, 552 (N.D. Miss. 1966) (three-judge court; rejecting theater's defense that white patrons objected to presence of African-American patrons); *Baylies v. Curry*, 21 N.E. 595, 595-96 (Ill. 1889) (rejecting theater's defense that exclusion of African-American woman was justified "to avoid collision between the races"). The Senate here should do likewise. And courts have continually rejected alleged losses of business because of "consumer preference" as a defense to civil rights lawsuits in other contexts, such as gender and religious discrimination.⁵

Tex. 1981) ("If an employer could justify employment discrimination merely on the grounds that it is necessary to make a profit, Title VII would be nullified in short order"); see also Volokh, The California Civil Rights Initiative: An Interpretive Guide, 44 UCLA L. REV. 1335, 1373 (1997) ("If customers feel uncomfortable doing business with female executives or being served by male flight attendants, that's the customers' problem").

In short, merely because the captioning equipment costs money or that some hearing patrons object to open captioning are not valid bases for opposing SB 92. In the unlikely event that theaters are still facing losses from installing captioning access, they are free to adjust their business practices to offset remaining losses (if any), such as marginally increasing prices to the general public.

CONCLUSION

A.G. Bell strongly desires—and will continue to advocate for—equal access to the movie viewing experience in theaters. The theaters' resistance to captioning access mandates has significantly delayed this goal, and SB 92 would be a significant step in improving captioning access for deaf citizens. Accordingly, A.G. Bell urges the Senate to ignore the oft-repeated opposition from the theaters, and to pass SB 92.

To the Maryland Legislature,

The Association of Late Deafened Adults (ALDA) writes in support of an Open Captioning Movie bill. SB 92 and HB 426 are a modest, but important step towards providing open captioned movies for people who are Deaf, people who are hard of hearing and people who are deaf/blind. In short, this will permit these people with the opportunity to fully enjoy movies.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires "places of public accommodation," specifically including movie theaters, to provide effective communication for people with sensory disabilities. For patrons who are Deaf, who are hard of hearing and who are deaf/blind, this is done through captioning. The captions convert the dialogue and other aural information into written form. This permits the patrons to "hear" with their eyes.

After several successful court cases, in 2016, the federal Department of Justice issued captions regulations. These regulations require all movie theaters to provide individual viewing devices. In theory, patrons who want captioning can use those devices without altering the movie-going experience for others. This method is referred to as closed captioning (CC), because the captions are visible only to those who choose to see them.

While the viewing devices can deliver captions, experience has shown that they frequently provide an unacceptable experience. Glasses that show the captions on the lens are heavy and physically uncomfortable. The captions glasses are designed to rest on top of the ear, where hearing aids, cochlear implants and regular glasses are located (sometimes this is painful to do, especially with eyeglasses).

Other captions devices attached to a flexible arm on a base that fits into a cup-holder often fall out of alignment or on the floor. All these devices must be properly sanitized, maintained and charged: that requirement is often overlooked. The devices must be checked out and returned. Many users are uncomfortable with the conspicuous nature of the devices and 'putting themselves out there' in public. Many wish to walk into the theater and be treated like other patrons – with privacy and anonymity to fit in with everyone else.

For those reasons, patrons who are Deaf, who are hard of hearing and who are deaf/blind greatly prefer open captions (OC), in which the captions appear on the screen like subtitles for foreign-language films and provide a hands-free and hassle-free experience. The

ADA does not require OC, but the ADA explicitly states that state and local laws providing greater protection for people with disabilities are valid.

In 2015, Hawaii became the first state to require OC showings, passing a state law essentially identical to SB 92 and HB 426, and that law is now permanent. In 2021, New York City passed an ordinance requiring four OC showings each week for most movies. A pending ordinance in the District of Columbia would require that a minimum of 12% of all movie showings be OC.

The theaters believe that some hearing people find on-screen captions distracting, and avoid those showings. Attendance figures do indicate lower attendance at OC showings than at other showings. But those numbers, in and of themselves, prove almost nothing.

People who want to avoid OC may go to another showing of that movie, or to a different movie at the same theater, and in those cases, the theaters lose no revenue. On the other hand, some people who attend OC showings would otherwise not be in the theater at all, and those patrons, even if their numbers are modest, represent revenue the theaters would otherwise not realize at all. The question is not attendance at individual OC showings, but rather, whether a modest number of OC showings adds to or detracts from total revenue.

Some tantalizing data comes from a pre-pandemic experiment in D.C., where a number of theaters began offering some OC showings. The National Association of Theatre Owners (NATO) engaged Ernst & Young to develop an economic model that would predict movie attendance based on variables like showtime and type of movie. Sometimes, when a movie was showing in more than one auditorium, an OC showing would take place within an hour of a non-OC showing of the same movie. In those cases, attendance at the OC showing was usually lower than at the non-OC showing. But combined attendance at both showings was higher than the predicted attendance at those two showings.

Deaf and hard of hearing patrons are not trying to impose their movie-going preferences on everyone. A movie is typically shown 31 times per week in each auditorium -- a blockbuster being shown in three auditoriums will have roughly 90 showings per week. Requiring two of those showings be OC will not meaningfully limit the choices available to people who don't want on-screen captions, but will provide real and important benefits for those who prefer the OC format.

ALDA believes SB 92 and HB 426 are modest in scope, but a big step towards equitable treatment for the substantial population of deaf and hard of hearing movie-goers.

Thank you to the Chair and Committee Members, for the opportunity to provide testimony on Senate Bill 92: Places of Public Accommodation - Motion Picture Houses – Captioning. Disability Rights Maryland (DRM – formerly Maryland Disability Law Center) is the federally designated Protection and Advocacy agency in Maryland, mandated to advance the civil rights of people with disabilities. DRM works to improve community integration and access for people with disabilities living in Maryland.

SB 92 would require chain movie theaters in Maryland to provide two open-captioned showings of each film weekly. AMC Theatres (franchised throughout Maryland) announced in late 2021 that it would start offering open-captioned showings. State laws requiring that movie theaters provide open captioning are increasingly common throughout the nation. New York's City Council passed a bill, which went into effect on January 15, 2022, that requires all movie theaters to offer 25% of all showings to be open-captioned. Comparatively, Maryland's approach is more cautious, but makes it easier for movie theaters to comply. Open captioning will also benefit seniors with moderate age-related hearing loss, children learning to read, individuals with ADHD, immigrants for whom English is a second language, and more.

Although Title III "Public Accommodations and Commercial Facilities" of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) was signed into law over 30 years ago, movie theater patrons with disabilities still have not yet achieved equal enjoyment of this public accommodation. The applicable law under 28 CFR § 36.202(b) states:

"A public accommodation shall not afford an individual or class of individuals, on the basis of a disability or disabilities of such individual or class, directly, or through contractual, licensing, or other arrangements, with the opportunity to participate in or benefit from a good, service, facility, privilege, advantage, or accommodation that is not equal to that afforded to other individuals."

Pursuant to a Final Rule issued in 2016 by the U.S. Department of Justice, movie theaters must provide captioning technology to patrons with disabilities.²

When this Final Rule was issued, Deaf and hard of hearing individuals won the novel right to enjoy this public pastime. Most often, closed captioning is offered. Time has shown that closed captioning cannot function as the sole auxiliary aid available to customers with disabilities. Closed captioning devices provided to movie theater guests often do not function as promised, causing the customer to miss essential dialogue as their device is repaired or replaced. The movie theater may "meet its obligation to provide captioning... through any technology so long as that technology provides communication as effective as that provided to movie patrons without disabilities." Since communication through a closed captioning device is unreliable at best, a movie theater may choose to "use open movie captioning as an alternative to complying with the requirements." Maryland should join the cadre of states implementing similar disability rights legislation, in the interest of compliance with Title III of the ADA.

We are advocating for the passage of the SB 92 sponsored by Senator Benjamin Brooks regarding movie theater captioning. There are approximately 1.2 million Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing individuals living in the State of Maryland. Therefore, it is imperative that the State of Maryland take the lead in requiring movie theaters to provide on-screen captioning accessibility.

NATO (National Association of Theatre Owners) has proven over and over that their promises and excuses have literally fallen on "deaf ears" in dictating when and where captioned movie technology should be shown based on their perception of movie going audiences. This is a practice that has proven to be problematic for many Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing patrons.

The current closed captioning (CC) technology in the State of Maryland movie theaters are inconvenient to have to return and give some people headaches having to move their heads up and down from screen to device and focusing on the device. These caption boxes or glasses either break down in the middle of a movie or the battery dies, necessitating Deaf, Hard of Hearing movie patrons having to leave the theater and missing part of the movie to get a replacement. This is not acceptable. With the broken equipment, it is not an effective way to have equal access as others.

Open Captioning (OC), in contrast, are better suited to movie enjoyment, less prone to failure and enable us to remain invisible and maintain our dignity, while also benefiting a wider segment of the public (children, seniors, the Deaf, those learning English as a second language, etc.).

We look forward to a favorable report on SB 92.

Dear Maryland Legislators:

I write to reaffirm our call for your support of Senate Bill 92, the Open Captioning Movies Bill. Every day, people are able to go to theaters and watch any movie they want on a big screen. The National Association of the Deaf (NAD) respectfully asks that you support the right of deaf and hard of hearing people to have the equivalent and equitable experience by passing SB 92, the Open Captioning Movies Bill. Based in Maryland, the NAD is the oldest national civil rights organization in the United States, having been founded in 1880 and overseen for the past 142 years by deaf and hard of hearing leaders. The NAD also has a state association affiliate in Maryland – the Maryland Association of the Deaf (MDAD), and supports the efforts of MDAD to pass SB 92.

This bill is necessary to correct the inequity that all deaf and hard of hearing individuals currently face in movie theaters. The U.S. Department of Justice issued a Final Rule on November 21, 2016 that mandates movie theaters to provide closed captioning technology (see, https://www.ada.gov/regs2016/movie_captioning_rule_page.html). However, closed captioning technology in movie theaters are devices that deaf and hard of hearing people have had to borrow from the theater management to be able to view captioning through them while trying to watch a movie at the same time. In addition, such devices have been prone to malfunction during the course of movies due to breaking down, powering down, and signal disconnects. While the DOJ's 2016 Final Rule made it possible in theory for deaf and hard of hearing people to go to any movie theater and be able to watch practically any movie, these equipment failures were so common that going to the movies was fraught with disappointment rather than the equal access that was the idealized goal.

Ask any deaf or hard of hearing person who has gone to a movie and had to endure the theater's closed captioning equipment, and you will find that nearly all of them have experienced the failure of this equipment. And they will also tell you that they have complained practically every time to the theater involved. However, the theaters do not compile and share the data on those failures and complaints, but only offer the deaf or hard of hearing patrons with refunds, free popcorn, and other concessions. The deficiency of closed captioning devices for movie theaters was also newsworthy at the Sundance Festival this year (see,

https://people.com/movies/marlee-matlin-and-other-sundance-film-festival-jurors-walk-out-of-premiere-over-capt ioning-malfunction/).

By contrast, open captioning is fully accessible simply because the captioning is turned on the movie itself. With open captioning, deaf and hard of hearing people do not need to depend on any specialized devices and can just enjoy movies along with everyone else. The open captioning function is simple to use now that all movie theaters use digital technology, and the open captions are easily turned on through such technology. While some movie theater chains have seen the writing on the wall and have started to provide open captioned showings at various theaters, the showings are not frequent enough and often are during inconvenient times. These movie theaters often only offer closed captioning technology during peak showings.

Such limitations were the impetus for the deaf and hard of hearing community to seek state and local level remedies, including in Maryland. The first successful legislation was by Hawaii in 2015 with a new open captioning law, HRS 489-9, which had to be restored in 2019 after theater owners watered down the legislation in 2017. New York City recently enacted its own open captioning requirement – NYC Administrative Code section 20-699.7. These legislative efforts are just the beginning, as there is a huge demand for open captioning.

According to research done by Johns Hopkins experts, there are at least 48 million people in the United States who are deaf or hard of hearing (see, https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC3564588/). In Maryland alone, it is estimated that there are more than 1.2 million deaf and hard of hearing people (see, https://odhh.maryland.gov/press-releases/featured-story/over-1-2-million-deaf-and-hard-of-hearing-marylanders/). This is a huge audience that needs access at movie theaters along with their families and friends.

Moreover, movie theaters in Maryland are failing to provide open captioning to a sufficient degree to ensure access to the latest movies. Too often, movie theaters make arbitrary decisions on which movies will be open captioned and how infrequent they will be shown. They will often show a very popular movie with open captioning only once during its run and do so on a day and time that is entirely inconvenient for anyone.

SB 92 would ensure that every covered movie theater provides at least two open captioning showings of each movie per week, and this is not unreasonable. Would the deaf and hard of hearing community be seeking open captioned showings of movies across the country if they were truly happy with closed captioned showings? The answer is obvious.

Deaf and hard of hearing Marylanders simply ask that we be able to watch movies at any time without dreading machine failures. Please pass SB 92 to make that possible.

The Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council (Council) is an independent public policy organization that creates change to make it possible for people with developmental disabilities to live the lives they want with the support they need. Our vision is that people with and without disabilities in Maryland live, learn, work, and play together. SB 92 is needed to make that happen. It benefits everyone and takes another important step to ensure more Marylanders can access and enjoy movies.

Maryland already requires captions for television. SB 92 expands those requirements to movie theaters

WHAT does this legislation do?

- It requires movie theaters (a place of public accommodation) to provide closed caption technology for each screening of a movie for the public. Closed captions provide individual viewers a transcript of the audio portion of a movie if they choose to access it on a device provided by the theater.
- It also requires companies that own at least two movie theaters in Maryland to provide open captions for each movie it screens that include closed captions. Open captions provide all viewers access to captions.

WHY is this legislation important?

- Video captions benefit everyone. Multiple studies have found that captioned videos increase comprehension, attention, and memory for everyone: children, youth, and adults. Research also finds benefits for people with disabilities, people for whom English is not their first language, and children and adults learning to read.
- A state-wide mandate supports making recreation accessible to everyone, regardless of where they live. The Americans with Disabilities Act and subsequent DOJ rulings have required access to captions in most workplaces and education settings without using an auxiliary device (i.e., a handheld transmitter for captions). This bill expands access to make recreation inclusive for all Marylanders regardless of where they live in the state and which movie theaters are in their communities.
- The current practice of relying on auxiliary devices for closed captions or to arrange for open captions ahead of time in movie theaters creates undue hardship on audience members. A reasonable accommodation is defined as making a place of public accommodation suitable for access, use, and patronage by an individual with a disability without danger to the individual's

health or safety and undue hardship or expense to the person making the accommodation. Testimony on this bill for the last several years offers repeated examples of the burden on people seeking captions at movie theaters under current practices. This bill will increase accessibility and reduce the burden on patrons.

It is critical that people with disabilities have full access to every mode of communication and recreational option available, including movies. For these reasons, the Council supports SB 92.

As one of the many Hard of Hearing Marylanders, I rely on captioning to watch the movies.

This legislation requires movie theaters that provide closed captioning to also provide open captioned movies twice a week. Open captions are an inclusive experience for all to share together regardless of their hearing or other language access needs. Closed captions are not inclusive. When individual caption devices fail, the user is excluded from the experience thus leading to further isolation or disillusionment from their peers.

Based on Johns Hopkins population projections in 2016 approximately 1.2 million people 12 years of age and older reside in Maryland. Due to centuries long stigmas around hearing loss, not as many people are willing to disclose their hearing loss to others. Most particularly the age related

loss. Some may choose to isolate themselves from others or to cruise through group conversations

assenting to what others said without accessing all the information available to them. Bonding over

shared experiences is important for one's health.

Captions are a universal design. And bonding with family and friends. Young children will be able

to read the captioned text as part of their literacy. For people whose English may be their second

or third language will benefit from both reading and listening to the dialogues and sound effects.

Those who have auditory processing disorders will be able to follow the movie. Some

neurodivergent children and adults rely on captioning.

Please support this bill for inclusivity of all. Thank you.

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TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENT OF SB92 Places of Public Accommodation – Motion Picture Houses – Captioning

Judicial Proceedings Committee February 8, 2024

Chair Smith, Vice-Chair Waldstreicher and Members of the Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to testify before you on SB92, Places of Public Accommodation-Motion Picture Houses – Captioning. The purpose of this bill to make motion picture houses fair and equitable for our deaf, hard of hearing, and non-English or non-native English-speaking residents. SB92, as amended, would require motion picture houses with 8 or more screens, to offer open captioning for at least 2 showings for each motion picture it screens. This would apply to each of the 3 weeks after a motion picture premieres. After which, motion picture houses may provide open captioning with reasonable notice. Pictures that are played less than 5 shows in a one-week period, defined as Friday thru Thursday would not be subject to this regulation. As amended, National Association of Theatre Owners (NATO), remains neutral on the bill.

Everyone is likely familiar with closed captioning, which is an option that you can find on your TV remote or video streaming services. Closed captioning requires a separate device to process and display captions and gives the user the option to turn it off. Open captioning is a separate copy of the film, provided to motion picture houses at no additional cost, with embedded captions. These cannot be turned off.

Currently, motion picture houses are required to provide individual closed captioning devices in compliance with a 2016 ruling of the Department of Justice. Closed captioning devices commonly take the form of wearable glasses or handheld devices that can fit into cup holders. As you will hear from witnesses, these devices are uncomfortable, distracting, frequently out of synch, and often encounter technical issues. The setup and troubleshooting of these devices can cause users to miss crucial scenes of the movie. These challenges often lend themselves to a less than favorable movie experience.

Many theater owners worry that offering more frequent captioning showings may inconvenience moviegoers with a preference against captions, but, given the plethora of screening options available to consumers, it is hard to imagine circumstances in which a hearing moviegoer would be forced into watching an open captioned film. The reverse of this situation is a much more common experience for our state's 1.2 million deaf or hard of hearing residents.

Further, research conducted by the charity, StateTEXT, performed in November of 2021 suggests that "31% of people would go to more live events if they had captions on a screen in the venue. Among 18-25-year-olds, that figure was 45%, compared with 16% among those over 56. The new data reveals, public opinion favors increased captioning, post pandemic. Nearly 46% said that the number of captioned performances and events was not enough, with 77% saying they are in favor of venues offering more captioned performances." According to the study, the public is also "more likely to frequent venues offering captioning service with almost 43% describing this service as valuable and almost a third (28%) suggesting these venues deserve more funding from grant giving organizations and the government".

Further, a Preply study, in the U.S. found that:

- 74% of viewers say subtitles help them comprehend the plot.
- 68% say subtitles help hold their attention on the screen.
- 55% say they often must rewind after missing dialogue when they are not using subtitles.

Some of the largest theaters in Maryland, Cinemark, Regal, Horizons and AMC, already offer frequent open captioning showings at select locations. Based upon our research, ticket sale data demonstrates the popularity of these showings among the local community. In many cases, most, if not all, of the seats in the theater are sold out. However, since it is not mandated, the parameters of these voluntary programs may change from time to time. SB92 limits the movie theater's ability to arbitrarily alter these programs by providing clear guidance. This mandate eliminates uncertainties for both theaters and moviegoers. Maryland has the opportunity to become a national leader in communications accessibility, with the passage of SB92.

For these reasons, I am requesting a favorable report on SB92.

SB 92 - Places of Accommodation - Motion Picture Houses - Captioning Senate Judiciary Proceedings Committee February 8, 2024

Position: Neutral with Amendments

On behalf of Mid-Atlantic NATO, a regional affiliate of the National Association of Theatre Owners (NATO), representing movie theatres throughout Maryland, we respectfully submit these written comments for your consideration on SB 92.

In 2023, Maryland's Movie Theaters voluntarily played over 7,500 Open Caption shows across the state!

Maryland's movie theaters are committed to access for individuals that are deaf or hard of hearing. For over 25 years, the movie theater industry has collaborated with individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing, advocacy groups, film studios, and technology developers to achieve access to all feature films at all times.

Moviegoers in Maryland seeking captions have the flexibility to view a movie with captions at any showtime, on any day. In 2016, the Department of Justice issued a final rule requiring digital movie theaters to provide closed movie captioning equipment. The DOJ adopted the majority of recommendations set forth in an agreement between the National Association of Theatre Owners and major advocacy groups, including the Hearing Loss Association of America and the National Association of the Deaf. Through these collaborative efforts, today, digital movie theaters in Maryland offer closed movie captioning devices (allowing text to be viewable by an individual moviegoer) that can be used at any show time for any movie that comes with closed movie captions.

Movie theaters in Maryland already work with their local communities to enhance existing access by scheduling open movie captioned shows on a regular basis. In addition to closed captioning offerings, where the demand for open captioned (text on the screen viewable by all moviegoers) showtimes exists, movie theaters in Maryland collaborate with their patrons that are deaf or hard of hearing to develop market appropriate programming and accommodations. A listing of current open movie captioning programs being offered throughout the state is included with this testimony.

Lawmakers should allow the industry to respond to the marketplace instead of passing a "one-size-fits-all" statewide mandate. Our records indicate that the mandate set forth in SB 92 would apply to 46 movie theater locations across the state where owners operate at least two locations. The bill would require these locations to provide open captioning twice per week per film, after the first seven days, for almost every movie played, regardless of local demographics. Based on the 504-screen count across these 46 locations, we estimate this bill would require approximately 750 open captioned shows per week, 39,000 open captioned showtimes per year.

<u>There is a cost to theaters to implement this requirement.</u> Historically, the industry has found that when open-captioned shows are mandated, instead of scheduled based on consumer demand, theaters see a significant drop in attendance. Despite assertions to the contrary, attendance data demonstrates that open caption showtimes have a very small turnout due to limited consumer demand. The cost to theaters is in the





reduction of ticket sales/lower attendance for open captioned shows, averaging at least 50% less than comparable showtimes of non-open captioned shows.

Movie theaters were devastated by the pandemic and are struggling to recover. Despite slight gains over 2020 attendance numbers when theatres were shuttered for most of the year, box office admissions in Maryland were still 23.2% lower in 2023 than they were in 2019. Even with the most recent blockbuster releases making national headlines during 2023, our Maryland theatres will likely take years to recover their losses, and the open captioning mandate outlined in SB 92 would further reduce theater attendance at a critical time for movie theaters' recovery. Two current Maryland operators together closed four significant Maryland locations last year, and the theater film supply was affected by Hollywood's recent labor strikes. Since movie theaters are already 100% accessible and offer enhanced access with open movie caption showtimes, we believe this legislation to be unnecessary and potentially harmful to a theater's financial viability.

SB 92 has technical issues within the language of the bill that could have unintended consequences on how the rule would be applied to Maryland movie theaters. While lawmakers have described the bill as being based on prior legislation from Hawaii (the only state with a captioning law, with far fewer theater owners covered), Maryland's definition of "closed captioning" in motion picture theaters is unclear. The Bill uses the word "houses" to describe covered locations, which is ambiguous as to whether it relates to movie theater locations or auditoriums contained within a movie theater. Moreover, the requirement to provide "open captioning" for films produced and offered with "closed captioning" creates a mandate that is beyond a movie theater's ability to comply. Not all films come with closed captioning and even if they do, they may not include an open captioned file to allow a movie theater to meet the mandate.

We seek the following amendments to remedy these technical issues:

- Separate the definition of "closed captioning" for the television environment from the terms for the movie theaters by adding definitions for "closed movie captioning" and "open movie captioning."
- Apply the requirement to all locations with 8 or more screens.

In its 2016 ruling, the Department of Justice (DOJ) intentionally used the terms "open movie captioning" and "closed movie captioning", instead of "closed captioning", so as not to create confusion with the terms used in the context of television captioning. Television closed captioning is hidden unless specifically initiated by the viewer to enable the captions to be visible. Movie theaters provide closed captioning devices, whereby the captions are only viewable by a single viewer. Conversely, a separate file must be initiated to enable open captions on screen viewable to all viewers. Captioning on television cannot be viewed with the same assistive technology as used in a movie theater, and captioning on a movie screen cannot be accomplished with the same assistive technology as on a television.

Hawaii's movie theater market is very different than in Maryland. The Hawaii law that put the requirement on companies with more than two locations in the state, only applied to two theater circuits, and exempted the smaller independently owned locations. While all movie theaters are struggling, smaller theaters without multiple screens are operating on reduced schedules, play far less movies, and are generally at a competitive disadvantage compare to the larger, multi-screen operations. Applying the requirement to all locations with 8 or more screens is clear, and puts the locations best able to handle the impact of this requirement on a level playing field.





Not all films play full-week schedules. As written, SB 92 would require open captioning twice per week for each motion picture it screens, after the first seven days, without allowance for special event films that may only play once per week or once per day. In addition, many films in subsequent weeks after the first few weeks will be held over for just a show or two per day, and may end mid-week to allow space to open a new motion picture. With this limited availability, movie theaters would be unable to meet the legislative mandate or be forced to not show such films to avoid risk of violating the legislative mandates proposed.

We seek the following amendments to allow for movies playing limited shows:

- Require two open captioned shows for each of the first three weeks after a film premieres.
- Define a theater operational week as Friday thru Thursday.
- Exempt movies that play less than five shows in a one-week period.

As the bill is written, we are opposed. With the agreed amendments, we are neutral.

Open Movie Captioning Programs Maryland Movie Theaters February 2024

Introduction

Mid-Atlantic NATO (Maryland) and the National Association of Theatre Owners (NATO) appreciate the opportunity to work with advocates, state and local governments, and theaters of every size to increase access for individuals who are deaf and hard-of-hearing. While all digital theaters are currently accessible to individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, NATO members understand consumer desire for access options and are committed to expanding access by the creation and implementation of pilot open movie captioned programming. NATO members are eager to partner with advocacy organizations to promote these showtimes to moviegoers.

In addition to open movie caption programs in Maryland and across the country, NATO members will continue to offer the use of closed movie captioning devices and make these individual devices available at every movie, at every showtime in accordance with the exhibition industry's agreement with the Department of Justice. Staff will continue to be trained on the preparation and use of the devices. NATO is also developing additional training material for its members on proper maintenance of closed movie captioning devices and systems.

This memo outlines select open movie captioning programs currently happening in Maryland theaters, but should not be considered complete, as all locations are scheduling additional open captioned showtimes on a theater-by-theater basis in response to guest requests.

AFI Silver Theatre and Cultural Center

Most U.S. studios now include Open Captioned (OC) files on their DCPs. AFI Silver typically schedules at least one OC show per title per week in those cases.

U.S. specialty and independent distributors are inconsistent in providing OC files. When OC files are provided by these distributors, we also schedule at least one OC show per week.

AFI Silver programming includes a large amount of foreign language titles with English subtitles. We have received positive feedback from the deaf and hard of hearing community that these screenings, while only providing dialogue, and not the full detail of OC titling, are nonetheless of value and sought out for attendance.





AMC Theatres

AMC has a nationwide program with 260 locations currently offering showtimes with open captions. The following Maryland locations are participating in this program:

- AMC Rio Cinemas 18 Gaithersburg
- AMC Owings Mills 17 Owings Mills
- AMC White Marsh 16 Baltimore
- AMC Montgomery 16 Bethesda
- AMC Columbia Mall 14 Columbia
- AMC MJ Capital Center 12 Largo
- AMC Wheaton Mall 9 Wheaton

For all week-one wide release titles with open captions available, open caption showtimes are scheduled for at least one weekend matinee time and one weekday evening. For all blockbuster titles, theaters will play one show per day in its first full week of release, followed by a second week of one weekend matinee and one weekday prime show.

The Charles Theatre

The Charles Theatre schedules all films with the OCAP file twice a week. Films play for a Saturday Matinee and during the second round on Wednesday's (4PMish). In addition, they run Cinema Sundays Club screenings in open caption for movies that include the OCAP file.

Cinemark Theatres

Cinemark operates three locations in Maryland, and will offer open captioned showtimes on all films that have a full, daily show schedule as follows:

- Cinemark Egyptian 24 Hanover Sunday afternoons and Wednesday evenings.
- Cinemark Towson 15 Towson Saturday afternoons and Monday evenings.
- Cinemark Snowden Square 14 Columbia various times.

Horizon Cinemas

Horizon Cinemas will schedule open caption shows upon advanced request through the accessibility page on their website at. site: https://horizoncinemas.com/about--contact. locations include:

Landmark Theatres

Landmark Theatres Bethesda location provides two open-captioned showings per week (Friday thru Thursday) of each new movie with open captioning available for the first two weeks of a movie's release.

- At least one of these two open-captioned showings for every movie during each of the first two weeks will be scheduled during weekend peak movie hours, which are showtimes beginning after 5:59 p.m. and finishing before 11:01 p.m. on Friday; or, showtimes beginning after 11:59 a.m. and finishing before 11:01 p.m. on Saturday or Sunday.
- The other open-captioned showing may be scheduled at the theater's discretion.
- Beginning in the third week of a movie's release, the theatre will provide at least one open-captioned showing of that movie per week. The open-captioned showing will be scheduled at the theater's discretion.
- If a movie has seven or fewer scheduled showings in a week, may not provide open-captioned showings for that movie.

Old Greenbelt Theatre

With a robust deaf and hard of hearing community, and its proximity to Gallaudet University, the Old Greenbelt Theatre in Greenbelt, MD plays an open captioned show every Sunday around 2pm if the film is available with open caption.

RC Theatres

RC will schedule open caption shows upon advanced request through the accessibility page on their website at https://www.rctheatres.com/page?id=12302. Participating locations include:

- R/C Lexington Exchange Movies 12 California

Regal Cinemas

Regal has instituted open captioning programs in the following Maryland locations:

- Regal Royale 14 Hyattsville

The weekly open captioning lineup features the top three titles per week according to gross. The top-grossing film will play three times a week on a Friday evening, a Sunday matinee, and a Wednesday matinee. The second highest-grossing film in each week will play with open captions during a Saturday matinee and a Tuesday evening. The third film will play in matinee slot on Mondays and Thursdays.





Warehouse Cinemas

Warehouse Cinemas has a long-standing partnership with local deaf and hard of hearings advocates in Frederick, and representatives from the Maryland School for the Deaf. Each week, they work together to select films and showtimes to offer open captioned shows. They have two locations participating as follows:

- Warehouse Cinemas Frederick 10 Frederick Seven to ten open captions shows per week on films selected by feedback.
- Warehouse Cinemas Hagerstown 10 Hagerstown At least three open caption shows per week. The number of showtimes will increase with demand and additional film product.
- Warehouse Cinemas Rotunda 7 Baltimore At least three open caption shows per week. The number of showtimes will increase with demand and additional film product.

ALL LOCATIONS

Marketing of Open Captioned Films

NATO members are clearly displaying which showtimes offer open captioning in each of their theatres when patrons purchase a ticket on a theatre's website or at the box office.

Open Captioning Programs Framework

NATO members operating in Maryland are committed to instituting voluntary open captioning programs on a theater-by-theater basis. A "one-size-fits-all" approach does not reflect the individualized operations of each theater or the markets in which they operate. Consequently, theater operators are seeking to develop open captioning programs that meet or exceed the demands of the market in which they operate and have developed varying programs to meet those goals.

The current open caption programs will run indefinitely, but no less than at least a year from April 1, 2022. Note, based on consumer feedback and the needs of individual companies, the parameters of these programs may change from time to time to reflect the marketplace.
