Testimony Prepared for the Appropriations Committee on

House Bill 37

January 28, 2025 Position: **Favorable**

Mister Chairman and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to support the dignity of human effort by supporting a right to organize and bargain collectively. I am Lee Hudson, assistant to the bishop for public policy in the Delaware-Maryland Synod, Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. We are a faith community with three judicatories in every part of our State.

Our community supports a human right to organize and bargain collectively in the interest of fair wages and safe and just working conditions. A 2017 message among us concerning human rights as principle and instrument affirmed a 1999 ELCA statement about this element of justice in the *oikos*, the economy (see *Human Rights*, ELCA 2017; *Sufficient*, *Sustainable Livelihood for All*, ELCA 1999).

We said this in 2017: Humans are economic beings and have the right to participate fully in an economy where resources are justly allocated with a view to sustainability. Humans may not be treated as commodities. The fundament of all human rights for us is a spiritual recognition of the dignity that inheres in humans as a gift of creation, the holy image proclaimed by God in the Genesis creation story of human life.

Among the pillars of economic justice, we've agreed is, (t)he principle of <u>participation</u>... (i.e) all are entitled to be heard and to have their interests considered when decisions are made. Support for the right to organize and bargain is in the written record of predecessor bodies of our church going back at least to the 1930s; it has been law in the United States since the passage of the National Labor Relations Act in 1935; and it is in the 1948 United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights (see especially Articles 23 and 25, most especially 23-4: Everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests).

We support an effort to make organizing and bargaining with other workers, collectively, a right stipulated by the Maryland Constitution. We support **House Bill 37** and ask your favorable report.
