Dear Honorable Members of the General Assembly,

My name is Hugh McMahon and I am a racehorse trainer at Laurel Park. I have been an employer there since 2010 and many of my employees have remained with me since the start of my business. As an employer of twenty people, who mostly live on the racetrack grounds, I understand their spiritual, emotional, and physical needs. Ron Singh also identifies their needs and for the past twelve years has volunteered, walking the barn areas, meeting with people, winning their trust, as he offers them prayers, encouragement, counselling. Ron has also made connections with local churches and food pantries and makes regular deliveries to the back stretch, meeting food and clothing needs. Most back stretch workers are Latino, they live on site, they have Catholic Christain backgrounds and have left home and family for better employment. These people have no church replacement except for the service hosted by Chaplain Ron on Wednesdays in the Rec Room. This meeting is regularly attended by over sixty people, which fills the room to capacity. This has brought much needed community and connection.

Ron's role at the racetrack is unique as he is a daily presence, making himself available to the people there. The track community have an established relationship with Ron and he is a comforting figure, especially in times of grief and injury. Ron often visits track workers when they are sick or hospitalized. Although Ron does not have a designated space at the track, he makes himself available 24/7.

Ron's ministry is also welcomed on race days as he leads the jockeys and starting gate crew in prayer and scripture reading before the first race. This brings everyone together and promotes community. That sense of community plays a key role in healthy competition during racing. The nature of the business at the racetrack can lend itself to aggressive and overly competitive behaviors, as winning and losing translate as success and failure. Ron's presence is also important for jockeys who may be facing difficulties and mental health challenges in a sport that is isolating, stressful and physically demanding.

The need for an established chaplaincy in Maryland is urgent. This vital role is recognized by all the other racetracks throughout the United States which are under the

umbrella of the Racetrack Chaplaincy of America. Maryland stands alone, entirely dependent on volunteer efforts.

Dear Chair Guzzone, Vice-Chair Rosapepe, and members of the committee,

Thank you for your hard work each and every day for our great state and thank you to Delegate Lehman for sponsoring this legislation. As the District 4 Anne Arundel County Councilmember, I represent Laurel Race Course and its surrounding areas. I also Chair the Laurel Race Course Impact Fee Advisory Committee that makes annual grant recommendations for projects benefiting the communities within a 3-mile radius of the racetrack.

Within this 3-mile radius is the racetrack and its facilities, thus it includes hundreds of racetrack employees, many of whom live on the property. With the temporary closure of Pimlico, additional track workers such as grooms, hotwalkers, and jockeys, have relocated to Laurel. Many of these workers are in need of additional physical and mental health services, drug and alcohol support and treatment, transportation, and nutrition and wellness programs. While our current committee recommends approximately \$350,000 funding for programs and projects around the track each year, the added workers and specific needs of the track employees are greater than this allocation can address. Our funds already go for important community services such as food relief, outreach to the elderly and people with disabilities, afterschool enrichment programs, park enhancements, and support for the fire department. While we recognize and wish to assist the needs of the track workers, we already must deny numerous applications a year because of funding limitations.

This legislation would authorize additional funding specifically for the backstretch workers at Laurel Race Course for the next couple of years until Pimlico reopens and the track employees relocate to new facilities. I ask that you support this bill so that our community may better serve the needs of these workers who are experiencing uncertainty and relocation over the coming years as horse racing evolves in the state of Maryland. While \$500,000 may not seem like much in the context of a \$67 billion state budget, it would have a huge impact on a group of workers vital to the horse racing industry.

Dear Chair Guzzone, Vice-Chair Rosapepe, and Members of the Budget and Taxation Committee,

The Anne Arundel County Food Bank (AACFB) strongly supports SB 595, which aims to provide \$500,000 in supplemental local impact aid to Anne Arundel County, Howard County, and the City of Laurel to meet the growing demand for supplemental food, medical assistance, and other vital services to support race track-based backstretch workers employed at Laurel Race Course and residents living in the 20724 postal zip code.

For the past 39 years, AACFB has provided critical services such as food, emergency supplies, and other necessities free of charge to our extensive network of partners and the neighbors we serve throughout Anne Arundel County. Last year, in collaboration with our 76 Network Partners, we distributed 4.1 million pounds of food and essential supplies like baby diapers and feminine hygiene products, including 1.3 million pounds of fresh produce and lean proteins.

Due to increasing housing costs, fluctuating food prices, and the expiration of pandemic public assistance, including the expanded Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, requests for emergency food assistance remain higher than before the pandemic and show no sign of abating. SNAP benefits (if a family is eligible) do not cover the entirety of a household's monthly food expenses. Further, items such as diapers and wipes are not covered under SNAP.

Currently, Anne Arundel County's <u>food-insecure population is 61,640</u>. That number is 10.5% of our community's residents, up from 47,260 (8.1%) just last year. According to <u>the most recent ALICE Report</u>, of the 226,285 Anne Arundel County households, 33% (74,655) are below the ALICE (Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed) threshold. Twenty-six percent are, however, deemed to be above the federal poverty line and, therefore, may not qualify for federal assistance programs, including SNAP benefits. According to the most recent U.S. Census data, 9.8% of Laurel-area residents live in poverty.

With these statistics, it is unsurprising that our community's need for supplemental food remains alarmingly high. Last year, in Anne Arundel County's fourth district, which includes the 20724 postal zip code, AACFB distributed food through our network partners at 16 locations, collectively providing over 68,000 instances of assistance to our neighbors experiencing food insecurity, which is 198 percent more than the year prior. The Anne Arundel County Food Bank is currently averaging more than 51,000 instances of assistance monthly across our entire network of partners. This is 6% more than last year and 19% more than two years ago. Even more staggering, it is 85% higher than 2019, one year before the pandemic.

Between July and December 2024, 6,800 individuals received food and/or diapers at an AACFB-supported pantry in the 20724 postal zip code. AACFB received \$50,000 through the Laurel Race Course Impact Grant program



for the current fiscal year to purchase food and diapers to be distributed through network partner pantries near the Laurel Race Course. These funds were fully expended within the first four months of the fiscal year. While AACFB has some funding from other sources to assist Laurel-area residents throughout the remainder of the year, additional resources are essential to meet the continued high demand for services in this area.

Supplemental local impact aid to Anne Arundel and Howard Counties and the City of Laurel to provide free food, vital programming like medical and dental services, and other necessities to backstretch workers employed at Laurel Race Course and low-income families living within one mile of the Laurel Race Course ensures they do not have to choose between having enough to eat and paying for other essentials such as rent, heat, or transportation to and from work. As such, we thank you for your consideration and urge a favorable report on SB 595.

MY NAME IS MARY KAYE VAVASOUR and I am appearing in support of SB 595 the State Lottery Fund—Laurel Race Course—Local Impact Aid.

I have been a resident of the Laurel/Beltsville area for almost 30 years and have been active in local civic affairs as the President of my Homeowners Association and member of the Vansville Heights Civic Association.

I grew up around thoroughbred racing—my family is from the Saratoga Springs area, and I spend August there with family and friends who are active participants as owners and breeders.

I have been an active advocate for thoroughbred aftercare since 2007, on both the national and state level. I have twice testified in the House of Delegates in support of legislation to provide funding for aftercare, and I take care of a Maryland-bred mare who I rescued in 2017 —she lives at The Foxie G Foundation in Union Bridge and I am active in fundraising for them.

Despite all of that involvement with racing for over 50 years, I came to an awareness of the needs of the backstretch community by happenstance.

Last August, I visited Chuck Simon, a former trainer and friend at Saratoga Hospital. Chuck had only recently been diagnosed with colon cancer and was days away from dying. While not nationally known, Chuck was highly regarded in racing for his horsemanship and his candid opinions about the sport, which he shared in his "Going in Circles" podcast.

Several well-known trainers got their start in Racing as assistant trainers to Chuck, including Breeders Cup winners Cherie DeVaux and Phil D'Amato, as well as Danny Gargan, who trained Dornoch, last year's Belmont Stakes winner.

His hospital room was a clearinghouse of famous trainers, owners, jockeys and sports media figures—as well as many grooms, hotwalkers and other modest participants in the sport.

Over the 4 days that I visited him, I asked him what advice he would give to the team that was reinventing racing in Maryland—he had two suggestions

- 1. Make sure you have enough race days because thoroughbreds need to race in order to learn how to be racehorses
- 2. Take better care of the backstretch workers.

He introduced me to Nick Karas from the NY Racetrack Chaplaincy, and Nick connected me to the Maryland Racetrack Chaplain, Pastor Ron Singh.

Pastor Ron invited me to his Wednesday night service for backstretch workers and it was a revelation. Since then, I've spent many hours visiting with backstretch workers and advocates, talking to trainers and industry participants about the current situation ---of a sport in transition, with significant challenges, both regulatory, financial, and competitive with other forms of gambling... but the one thing everyone is in agreement on is the NEED TO TAKE BETTER CARE OF THE PEOPLE WHO TAKE CARE OF THE HORSES. It is not an exaggeration to say the sport cannot exist without them. Very few are aware of the difficulties they overcome to do that—and how indebted we are to them for their willingness to make it their life's work.

MTHA and its Foundation, along with The Maryland Jockey Club provide significant support to the backstretch community but there is great competition for their limited funds.

With this bill and the efforts of MTROA to build a world-class thoroughbred training facility at Shamrock Farm, including modern facilities for backstretch workers, I believe Maryland has an opportunity to demonstrate to the industry and the general public that caring for this segment of the thoroughbred racing workforce is an essential component to

making Maryland racing a healthy and successful sport, one in which the state of Maryland has made an enormous financial investment. In fact, it is not an exaggeration to say that "Maryland is now in the Racing business". I urge you to reaffirm Maryland's commitment to these essential workers in that business and pass SB 595.

Storehouse Ministries dba:

The Racetrack Chaplaincy of Maryland is a non-profit organization based in Maryland. As a retired jockey, I recognized the need for support within the horse racing community, and now I work closely with the Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association (MTHA) to provide essential services. In 2021, Storehouse Ministries also became affiliated with the Racetrack Chaplaincy of America, operating under the direction of a board of directors to offer support services to backstretch workers, support personnel, jockeys, and other stakeholders. Chaplaincy under the umbrella of 'The Racetrack Chaplaincy of America" is an established presence on most racetracks around the country. Its primary focus is the spiritual, emotional, physical, and social needs of its people living and working on a racetrack.

There is currently a rotating residential workforce of 300 plus and another 1000 plus others that work but live off track.

The Chaplaincy currently provides the following services:

- Collaboration with local church food pantry" Love Wins Pantry" to provide pantry supplies at the track so no one should ever go hungry. We want to reach everyone on our track.
- Hosts a weekly church service with a full meal for attendees. We feed about 40 but would like to reach so many more as no cooking is allowed on the racetrack.
- Provides transportation for medical and social services.
- Performs interdenominational Christian services: Weddings, funerals/memorial Services, baptisms, bible studies, worship services and hospital visits
- Chaplain advice and spiritual Support
- Mental Health Support with referrals to professionals

- Assistance with sign-up for Health Insurance through the Maryland Health Exchange.
- Host on track AA meeting. To date in 2024, the racetrack has lost 3 workers from alcohol/health related issues.
- ESL Second Language
- Physiotherapy, (PT) and massage therapy services to assist with pain management. without medication.
- Tax preparation clinic.
- Immigration services clinic
- Pathway to citizenship counseling.
- Advice & translation related to Social Services. Immigration, Social Security office, IRS, banks, banking, and civil services

We express our support for this bill as it will allow the Racetrack Chaplaincy of Maryland to expand on current services and provide new needed services so desperately needed by our community.

With the advantage of having a Chaplain directly involved with its people by walking the grounds daily we are fortunate enough to meet people at their point of need, and with being interactive at a grass roots level, we can ensure everyone needs are met no matter how small the request.

The advantage the Chaplaincy has is that the Chaplain goes to the people. With a visible presence, people are inclined to reach out and ask for help in times of need. I've been approached by individuals with a toothache and link them to the services available to rectify their problem.

With a Chaplain walking the grounds consistently the Chaplaincy takes on the role of first responders, in-times of trouble we are the first ones they see and reach out to, and we provide the help and make referrals as needed. Oftentimes a handshake, a hug, or a prayer is all they need to get through that day.

The Chaplain was a defining figure in my life as he presented the gospel message to me and baptized me. The life changes that have occurred since then have been significant. I have been able to walk alongside other struggling jockeys and encourage them with the hope and assurance that I now have. The mental and physical pressures of riding races are not insignificant, and it is easy to let the job define you and allow depression to creep in during the difficult times. Such struggles can turn to tragedy as seen in the suicide of my fellow jockey, Avery Wiseman in Maryland 2023.

Prayer before races is something all of the jockeys look forward to before racing. It is encouraging, helps us focus energy before the races, and it's a time for sharing the word, and time to dedicate focus and life towards God.

Chaplain is so necessary. Ron's availability is a daily reminder that someone is there, person to person every day.

Position: FAVORABLE WITH AMENDMENTS

Anne Arundel County **SUPPORTS WITH AMENDMENTS** Senate Bill 595 – State Lottery Fund - Laurel Race Course - Local Impact Aid. This enabling Bill would direct \$500,000 annually in supplemental local impact aid to the community around the Laurel Race Course in Anne Arundel County, Howard County, and the City of Laurel.

For the past several years, Anne Arundel County has received \$357,143 annually in local impact aid to be used within the three mile radius of the Laurel Race Course. By executive order, Anne Arundel County created a Laurel Race Course Impact Advisory Committee (LRCIAC) to recommend to the County Executive the use of the funds each year. The LRCIAC is made up of nine county residents within the 3 mile radius, one representative of the Laurel Race Course, the County Councilmember representing Councilmanic District 4, and the Senator and three Delegates representing Maryland Legislative District 32.

The LRCIAC process ensures funding is distributed in an open and transparent process. All meetings are open to the public, the deliberation process includes an integrated public comment period, and funding decisions are posted on the LRCIAC webpage as well as in the annual County budget book.

The LRCIAC has been instrumental in guiding funding decisions within the three mile radius over many years. Thanks to the efforts of the committee, the 198 corridor has a landscaped median, fire and rescue equipment has been updated, and additional library services have been launched. Grants have supported local students and a heritage festival, and addressed food insecurity, security needs, road beautification.

Anne Arundel County is appreciative of the local impact aid we are able to invest in the communities around the Laurel Race Course each year. We support SB 595 to increase funding to a community with needs that undoubtedly exceed current funding availability. However, we respectfully request that the use requirements specific to Anne Arundel County for the supplemental local impact aid be streamlined to allow a distribution process parallel to the one already established. Streamlining of these requirements will avoid the need for duplicative administrative processes.

Anne Arundel County urges a FAVORABLE WITH AMENDMENT report on SB 595.

The Maryland Lottery and Gaming Control Agency (Agency) submits the following for informational purposes.

Bill Summary:

Senate Bill 595 proposes supplementing local impact aid to Anne Arundel County, Howard County, and the City of Laurel from the proceeds of the Racetrax® Lottery Game. Doubling the amount of local impact aid to these jurisdictions is expected to support increased programs and services to the communities surrounding Laurel Race Course, including health and wellness, counseling, addictions services, social services, nutrition and wellness, and transportation services. The Agency currently provides \$500,000 in local impact aid via funds from Video Lottery Terminals (gaming revenues).

Background:

- For decades, the Lottery Fund was primarily used to make allocations to the Maryland Stadium Authority and in 2015, it began to be used to make allocations to other special interests.
- Lottery funds have not typically been used for local impact grants for jurisdictions or for venues related to horse racing, as this industry receives a contribution directly from casino gaming revenue.
- Senate Bill 595 would double the amount provided via local impact aid by allocating funds from Racetrax®.
- Racetrax® is a computer-animated Lottery game that offers the thrill of horse racing and the payout and prizes of a Keno style game.
- In FY24, Racetrax generated \$315.1 million in sales, accounting for 11.5% of total lottery sales
- Racetrax® accounted for \$64.7 million (9.2%) of the Lottery's FY24 profit.

Rationale:

The allocation of funds from the State Lottery Fund to special funds decreases the amount of money transferred to the General Fund. Allocating any additional revenue from the State Lottery Fund will place the State's AA Bond Rating at risk of being downgraded. The Board of Revenue Estimates (BRE) considers total lottery revenues and makes projections based on the revenues less the current distributions. Table 1 reflects the projected distribution of lottery funds as well as the coverage amounts for mandated disbursements. The coverage amount is determined by dividing the total lottery revenue by the total mandated disbursement. When the coverage amount is 3.1x or lower, the bond rating can be downgraded. BRE has projected, based on current allocations, that the coverage amount will be 3.1x in FY26 and 2.9x in FY27 and FY28. Adding an additional allocation of

\$500,000 reduces the coverage further leaving Maryland at risk of having its AA Bond rating downgraded.
