RE: HB 1241 - Other Tobacco Products and Electronic Smoking Devices - Seizure and Wholesaler Licensure Requirements

POSITION: FAVORABLE

Dear Chairman Wilson,

I am writing to you as The Director of Youth Programs & Engagement, living, working and serving, within the 21217 neighborhood of Baltimore City, to express my support for HB 1241. I support this bill because I believe it will:

- **Protect** youth from harmful substances
- **Reduce** health disparities within African American and low income communities
- **Promote** positive holistic youth development
- Increase accountability and regulation within the tobacco, e-cigarette and wholesale industries

As a youth development professional and non-profit leader, I work closely with youth and teens preparing for college and careers. I've seen firsthand how vaping and tobacco products negatively impact their focus, health, and future aspirations. Many young people, especially in marginalized communities, are targeted by easy access to these products, often unaware of their long-term consequences. I've worked with students who struggle with nicotine addiction, which affects their academic performance and mental well-being. Strengthening regulations through HB1241 is a crucial step in protecting our youth, ensuring they have a healthier path toward success.

I am especially grateful to the Chairman of this committee for his historic support of legislation protecting our youth from tobacco, to Delegate Amprey for his sponsorship of



this legislation in the House, and to Chairwoman Beidle for her sponsorship of this legislation in the Senate.

Despite progress in tobacco control, the problem of youth access to tobacco products, particularly e-cigarettes, remains significant. Data indicates that over 48,000 Maryland high school students self-report that they use tobacco products, a number that likely falls short of the true total. The marketing strategies and new products like flavored e-cigarettes target and hook kids, Big Tobacco's next generation of customers.

The impact of youth tobacco use is both a public health and economic burden. Maryland incurs annual healthcare costs of approximately \$3.14 billion directly related to smoking, and 27.5% cancer-related Maryland deaths can be traced to tobacco use. We must act now to mitigate its influence on the health of our children and our communities at large.

HB 1241 proposes to grant the Alcohol, Tobacco, and Cannabis Commission the same seizure powers over e-cigarettes that it already has over other tobacco products like cigarettes, to make the Commission's oversight and enforcement authority across the tobacco market. The legislation also brings e-cigarettes in line with regulations for other tobacco products, notably by requiring records keeping for the sale of e-cigarettes. These steps are crucial for ensuring the same healthcare and public health strategies and enforcement that protect Maryland's youth from products like cigarettes are also available for e-cigarettes.

The need for this legislation is broadly recognized. In 2024, polling showed eighty-one percent of Maryland voters supported action against Big Tobacco to safeguard our children. I urge you to vote in favor of HB 1241, and continue your strong track record of protecting our children from the dangers of tobacco.
