Testimony of Delegate Marlon Amprey in Support of House Bill 1407 NO FAKES Act of 2025

Dear Chair Wilson, Vice Chair Crosby, and Committee Members,

According to Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore's music industry alone generates \$20 million annually, with 67% of music professionals working independently. For these artists, their voice and likeness are not just personal attributes—they are their brand, their livelihood, and their legacy.

Al is already reshaping industries, from medicine to the arts, and its potential benefits are undeniable. This legislation does not prohibit Al-driven creativity or innovation; it simply ensures that individuals have the right to decide if and how their likeness is used. Al has immense potential to benefit Maryland's economy and creative industries, but we must implement ethical guidelines that protect individuals from harmful impersonations and unauthorized use of their identity. The truth is that everyone is vulnerable to the ill uses of Al. Fraudulent scams using deepfake technology have already been used to manipulate and deceive seniors, who are often targeted by criminals impersonating family members or trusted officials. We've also seen deepfake pornography used without consent, violating privacy and dignity, particularly impacting women and young people. Additionally, politicians, community leaders, and public figures are at risk of having their likeness used to spread false information, undermining public trust and democracy.

However, this legislation does not prevent artists and creatives from engaging with Al—rather, it ensures they have the right to do so on their terms. As Maryland emerges as a leader in Al innovation, this bill sets a foundation for critical discussions on Al ethics, ensuring that technological advancements prioritize the well-being of Marylanders. By holding bad actors accountable, HB1407 affirms that individuals retain rights over their likeness even after death, with the ability to transfer these rights to family members or an estate.

In conclusion, the NO FAKES Act is a significant step toward protecting individual rights, preserving artistic integrity, and promoting ethical AI practices. While AI presents incredible opportunities, it also carries risks that demand proactive safeguards. By passing this bill, we can ensure that Maryland remains ahead of these challenges, fostering an environment where innovation and creativity flourish without compromising personal rights.
