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SB 114 - Maryland Department of Labor - Licenses - Notation of Veteran Status and Eligibility for Benefits

I am Senator Bryan Simonaire presenting SB 114.

I worked with the **Department of Labor** and **the military community** on this <u>consensus legislation</u>. It basically <u>allows a veteran</u> to put a '<u>Veteran notation' on their **professional Labor license**.</u>

First, let me say this is **<u>enabling legislation</u>** for all its departmental licensing boards, and <u>setups the</u> <u>framework</u> if the Department <u>implements it on one or more of its boards</u>.

I have **worked with the Department** and **flexibility is key** to success and <u>this bill provides that</u> <u>flexibility</u>.

This bill does two main things:

- 1) Enables one or more of the Department's licensing boards to issue a <u>professional license or</u> <u>certificate</u> with the "Veteran" <u>notation placed</u> on it, and
- If enabled, it establishes an outreach to the veteran if they want the Veteran notation and the <u>applicant consents</u> to being contacted by appropriate Executive Branch agencies regarding the applicant's eligibility for State or federal veterans' benefits.

<u>This may sound familiar</u> as this is what is done for the **MVA driver licenses.** Driver license applicants can have a veteran's notation <u>placed on their driver license</u> and be <u>contacted by the Department</u> of Veterans and Military Families regarding available <u>veteran benefits</u>.

The only difference is that this **legislation is enabling**.

<u>The advantage</u> to this approach is the <u>Department knows</u> which boards this would work on best and could even <u>pilot it on a few</u> before <u>rolling it out</u> on more or all their boards.

While the **MVA program has been hugely popular**, Maryland has a long way to go to reach our veterans as **less than 50%** of our <u>veteran population is taking advantage</u> the MVA program.

That's why it is imperative we **use as many methods** as possible to reach out to our veterans. This legislation provides <u>one more tool</u> to <u>reach out to veterans</u> while also <u>providing additional benefits</u> to the veteran community.

Additionally, in Maryland, we are looking to do everything we can to help **reduce veteran suicide**. One of the key factors is avoiding **isolation**.

This legislation provides multiple benefits, including reducing isolation:

- 1. This will help with **networking and reducing isolation** as more people including other veterans will <u>see these licensees</u> are veterans and hopefully reach out more to them.
 - a. One of the many factors of veterans' suicide is isolation especially as it pertains to a veterans' own service and experiences. This will allow for public awareness of veterans through <u>thanking them</u> for their service, other veterans seeing it and <u>talking with them</u> and re-enforcing they are not alone.
- 2. It provides **another tool to reach out** to our veteran population with their <u>consent</u> through using their contact information to share eligible benefits with them,
- 3. It is another avenue for the public to **show appreciation** for their service, and
- 4. Lastly, it also provides **potential financial benefits** to our veteran as many customers are <u>more likely to hire a veteran</u>, <u>repeat as a customer</u> or just give a <u>bigger tip for their service</u>, <u>where applicable</u>.

If you think about it, you can't beat this is a low-cost investment with all its potential benefits.

For all these reasons, I ask for your favorable consideration.
