BILL: SB0263 - Board of Heating, Ventilation, Air-Conditioning, and Refrigeration

Contractors – Application for License Restoration

MDL POSITION: Support

This proposal extends the grace period for renewal of HVACR licenses, extending the time allowed for license renewal from 90 days to 4 years. This extension will provide greater flexibility for HVACR professionals while maintaining the necessary regulatory oversight to ensure public safety and industry standards.

The current 90 day grace period is inconsistent with the policies of other Boards within the Mechanical Licensing Unit (e.g. Electricians, Plumbing), as most Boards allow for a re-examination period of two to four years. Under the current system, an individual whose license has expired for 91 days is treated the same as someone whose license has expired for five years.

The selection of 4 years is not arbitrary as it aligns with the adoption of the industry code cycles. An individual whose license expired less than four years ago will have been working within the current code cycle, meaning their training and knowledge are still up-to-date. However, for those whose licenses have expired for more than four years, it is important to ensure they are brought up to speed with the latest code updates and requirements and thus requiring them to undergo all of the licensure requirements is justifiable.

The process for renewing an expired license can be time-consuming, involving several steps that can result in significant delays, particularly for those working a full-time job. MD Labor feels that providing additional flexibility in the renewal process brings parity to this profession, provides adequate time for the skilled professional to complete the renewal, and still ensures industry safety and oversight.

Under Maryland's current statute, individuals are required to retake the licensing exam if their HVACR license has expired for more than 90 days, regardless of the reason for expiration. The process begins when an individual applies to the Board's testing vendor, PSI Exams, as though

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the Board for evaluation. However, the Board's Application Review Committee only meets once a month. If an application arrives just after a meeting, it could remain in limbo for up to another month before it is reviewed. Once the Board has reviewed and approved the application, they notify PSI Exams, and the applicant can then schedule their exam at one of the six testing sites in Maryland. Due to limited availability at these sites, applicants often experience delays in securing an exam slot, further extending the timeline.

Step two involves the applicant taking and passing the exam, after which they must return to the Board to apply for license renewal. While the renewal application is submitted online, it requires additional steps before it is finalized, including a process to release the license for printing. This additional step adds even more time to an already lengthy process.

By extending the renewal period from 90 days to four years, individuals who are currently employed can return to work within days, rather than facing months of delay. This change benefits both technicians and their employers. Employers, who may otherwise be reluctant to wait for the lengthy renewal process, could be at risk of losing valuable personnel if a technician's license lapses. Similarly, technicians may face difficulties securing new employment due to the invalidity of their licenses. The proposed extension addresses both challenges by ensuring a more efficient and timely renewal process.

To that end, MD Labor respectfully requests the Committee consider a favorable report on SB0263.

The Maryland Building Industry Association, representing 100,000 employees statewide, appreciates the opportunity to participate in the discussion surrounding SB263 Heating, Ventilation, Air–Conditioning, and Refrigeration Contractors – License Restoration. MBIA **Supports** the Act in its current version.

Senate Bill 362 would extend from 90 days to 4 years the time period during which an individual who has held a heating, ventilation, air-conditioning, and refrigeration contractor license may apply for license restoration after expiration.

The industry is in support of any legislation that would increase or aid in increasing the number of trade jobs in the state of Maryland. Of the over 400,000 HVAC contractors in the United States, just 7,000 work in Maryland and that number is expected to grow over the next ten years but not at a rate to keep up with economic growth and construction in the state.

While, it is critical for the state to attract new heating, ventilation, air-conditioning, and refrigeration contractors it also as so to retain those who currently hold these licenses. The extension timeline proposed in SB263 will allow sufficient time for current heating, ventilation, air-conditioning, and refrigeration contractors whose licenses are about to expire or are going to, sufficient time to submit a renewal application.

For these reasons, MBIA respectfully requests the Committee give this measure a favorable report. Thank you for your consideration.

House Bill 92 / Senate Bill 263 recognizes the realities faced by many hardworking HVACR professionals. Whether due to unforeseen personal challenges, such as health issues or financial hardships, the current 90-day reinstatement period does not provide sufficient flexibility for licensees to regain their credentials without unnecessary burdens. By extending the reinstatement period to four years, this bill aligns Maryland's policies with those of other mechanical licensing boards and offers a fair opportunity for skilled workers to continue contributing to the industry without having to restart their licensing process entirely.

Additionally, this legislation will help ensure a steady workforce in the HVACR sector, which is critical to Maryland's economy and the well-being of its residents. Skilled HVACR technicians are

essential to maintaining safe and efficient heating and cooling systems in homes, businesses, and public facilities. HB 92 / SB263 supports workforce retention by preventing qualified professionals from being sidelined due to administrative hurdles.

The extension of the reinstatement period will also reduce administrative burdens on the State Board of HVACR Contractors by decreasing the volume of initial applications and examination requirements for those who simply need to renew their expired licenses. On behalf of the Mechanical Contractors Association of Metropolitan Washington (MCAMW), I am pleased to submit testimony in strong support of House Bill 92 and Senate Bill 263. MCAMW represents 200 mechanical construction contractors employing approximately 10,000 workers and 1,000 apprentices across the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia (DMV) region. Our member contractors work in partnership with local unions, hiring halls, and apprenticeship training centers of the Mid-Atlantic Pipe Trades Association throughout Maryland. Collectively, our economic footprint contributes approximately \$2 billion annually and generates \$500 million in state, federal, and local tax revenues each year.

House Bill 92 and Senate Bill 263 propose a crucial extension of the period during which Heating, Ventilation, Air-Conditioning, and Refrigeration (HVACR) contractors may apply for license restoration after expiration—from the current 90-day limit to four years. This legislative change is a practical and necessary measure that will allow qualified contractors to remain in compliance without facing undue hardship, particularly those who may have faced unexpected life events such as medical emergencies or logistical challenges in accessing the licensing system.

Under current law, contractors who fail to renew their licenses within the 90-day period must undergo the full initial application process, including retaking examinations and meeting stringent qualification criteria. This requirement creates unnecessary obstacles for skilled professionals who have already demonstrated their competence and commitment to the industry. By aligning the restoration timeline with other Maryland mechanical licensing boards, HB92 and SB263 provide a fair and consistent approach across the sector.



Furthermore, extending the reinstatement period will benefit Maryland's construction industry by ensuring a stable and experienced workforce, preventing disruptions in the labor market, and supporting ongoing infrastructure projects without delays caused by licensing lapses. This legislation also mitigates the administrative burden on both

contractors and regulatory agencies by reducing the number of individuals forced to requalify unnecessarily.

For these reasons, we urge the committees to issue a favorable report on House Bill 92 and Senate Bill 263 to support Maryland's HVACR professionals and the broader construction industry.
