

#### Testimony on SB 575 Election Law - Local Public Campaign Financing - Board of Education Ho. Co. 3-25 Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs

**Position: Favorable** 

Common Cause Maryland supports SB 575, which would provide Howard County Council the option to expand their public campaign finance program, the Citizens' Election Fund, to cover their board of education.

The Campaign Finance Reform Act (CFRA) of 2013 included language that provided county governments the authority to establish local public campaign financing programs for county council and county executive. Six counties and Baltimore City have since established programs. In 2016, a majority of Howard County voters voted in favor of creating a local program, now called the Citizens' Election Fund. Common Cause Maryland worked in coalition with partners to assist with the implementation of this program and continues to support the local government and Committee as they prepare for the 2026 election cycle.

In 2023, our partners at Maryland PIRG released a <u>report</u> analyzing data from the 2022 election cycle, specifically the first use of Howard County's Citizens' Election Fund. They found that small donors provided 97% of the funding for qualified candidates in Howard County, while only providing 8% of the funding to candidates who did not participate in the program. Also, that candidates who qualified for the program received an average contribution of \$139 compared to non-participating candidates who received an average donation of \$778. Qualifying candidates received on average 94% more contributions from individuals and nearly tripled their average contributions using matching funds. This demonstrates that as candidates gain experience using the programs and counties get through the hurdles of properly implementing these programs – they work as intended.

Public campaign financing continues to gain popularity in Maryland for a simple reason: particularly since the Citizens United decision, Americans across the political spectrum feel that our campaign system is disconnected from the populace, and that LLCs and wealthy individuals render regular Marylanders' voices meaningless in the current campaign finance environment. Small dollar public funding programs, on the other hand, lift up regular Marylanders' voices, and empower those with community-supported ideas who may not have connections to deep-pocketed interests.

While CFRA allows counties to address this problem for county council and executive candidates, the problem exists at every level of government. Common Cause Maryland supports lifting the voices of regular Americans in every election for every office, and so we request a favorable report on SB 575

SB0575: FAVORABLE

Howard County - Public Campaign Financing - Board of Education Ho. Co. 3-25

The Board of Education of Howard County (the Board) supports **Howard County - Public Campaign Financing - Board of Education Ho. Co. 3-25** for the opportunity to create robust participation in governance of the Howard County Public School System (HCPSS) through availability of public campaign funds for Board candidates.

In Howard County, the Board is composed of seven members, two of which are at-large, and a student member elected by students for a one-year term. The Board is responsible for a more than one-billion-dollar budget and sets local education policy consistent with state and federal laws governing public education. Members of the Board play a vital role in engaging student, parent, and community member voice in the oversight and management of the HCPSS.

Candidates for the Board, however, cannot currently take advantage of public campaign financing that is authorized for executive and legislative positions elected to provide similar representation to the citizens of Howard County. Aiming to remedy this prohibition, SB0575 allows the governing body of Howard County to establish a system of campaign financing specific to Board elections. The system must follow existing law related to establishments of such financing. The Board supports public campaign financing as a measure often used to diversify candidate pools for elected office as well as lessen the influence of large/special interest donors.

For these reasons, we urge a FAVORABLE report of SB0575 from this Committee.
