Subject: HB-1024 Agriculture – Catastrophic Damage Caused by Deer

UNFAVORABLE

Dear Honorable Delegates:

I represent the Western Maryland Sportsmen's Coalition, Inc. The Coalition is comprised of many hunting clubs and sportsmen's associations and thousands of their individual members living in Garrett, Allegany, Washington, Frederick, and Carroll Counties. As President of the Coalition, I work together with the leadership of these Western Maryland Sportsmen's organizations for the recognition and benefit of the sportsmen and sportswomen of the five most western counties of Maryland.

On February 26, 2025, the Environment and Transportation committee will be hearing the advantages and disadvantages of **HB-1024** (Agriculture – Catastrophic Damage Caused by Deer).

I, as a private citizen of this state and as the elected representative of the Western Maryland Sportsmen's Coalition, Inc., strongly urge **you to vote unfavorable on this bill as written.**

DNR's Wildlife and Heritage Service is the agency within the Department of Natural Resources charged with the responsibility of managing wildlife species in Maryland. According to Brian Eyler, Associate Director of Wildlife and Heritage Services at the Department of Natural Resources, even though some people fear Maryland is being overrun by deer, that's not the case. The state's deer population is stable.

Hunting is Maryland's primary tool for managing the deer population. About 80,000 deer are killed during deer season. In much of the state, hunters can take 35 or more deer per year. In the suburban archery zone, hunters can take an unlimited number of antlerless deer. There's far more opportunity to harvest females than males because that's how you control the population.

The state offers permits to shoot deer for the protection of crops. These permits can be used any day of the year. According to Wildlife and Heritage, in 2022 just under 1,900 crop damage permits were issued; *almost 10,000 deer were killed although permit holders were authorized to take as many as 34,000.* The permits are generally underutilized.

HB-1024 is poorly written, without detail or specifics. It does seem, however, that the intent is to shift the responsibility of managing the state's deer herd to Agriculture with the intent to slaughter as many of the animals as possible utilizing non-defined methods. Would "extraordinary measures" perhaps include poison?

We are certain that the Department Natural Resources, working with the Department of Agriculture (Sportsmen and Farmers working together) can craft a reasonable and effective deer population control program, where needed. Let's work on that approach.

Together with the sportsmen and sportswomen of Western Maryland, I strongly urge you to vote against HB-1024 as written.
