Subject: Request FAVORABLE Report – HB0248 – Motor Vehicle Registration – Fee Exemption – Unemployable Disabled Veterans

Dear Chair Korman and distinguished members of the Environment and Transportation Committee:

On behalf of the members of the Maryland Military Coalition (MMC), I write to recommend a FAVORABLE report on HB0248 – Motor Vehicle Registration – Fee Exemption – Unemployable Disabled Veterans, sponsored by Delegate Mike Griffith. This bill would exempt from registration fees one vehicle that is either owned, leased, or personally used by an unemployable disabled veteran.

This legislation recognizes the sacrifices made by unemployable disabled veterans and the financial burden that registration fees place upon them. It includes them with other veterans who, as designated or classified by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, have lost the use of a hand, arm, or leg, are totally disabled; have permanent vision impairment; or are the surviving spouses of a deceased disabled veteran.

The Maryland Military Coalition strongly supports HB0248 and asks for a FAVORABLE report from the Environment and Transportation Committee. These unemployable disabled veterans deserve this exemption.

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HB248 Motor Vehicle Registration – Fee Exemption- Unemployed Disabled Veterans FAVORABLE Environment and Transportation Committee January 30, 2025

Good afternoon, Chair Korman and Members of the Environment and Transportation Committee. I am Karen Kalla, AARP Maryland volunteer legislative aide and resident of Montgomery County. AARP Maryland represents more than 850,000 members statewide and is the largest nonprofit, nonpartisan organization advocating for Marylanders aged 50 and older, as well as their families. AARP has four area of focus serving members of the military: caregiving, fighting fraud, helping with career and employment opportunities though the Veterans and Military Spouse Job Center, and access to benefits. AARP Maryland supports HB248 Motor Vehicle Registration – Fee Exemption – Unemployed Disabled Veterans. We thank Delegate Griffith for sponsoring this bill.

What HB248 Does

- Exempts from Maryland vehicle registration fees, one vehicle owned by, or leased to and personally used by a veteran who is unemployable due to a service-connected disability.
- Exempts from Maryland vehicle registration fees, one vehicle owned and personally used by an individual who is the surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran.
- HB248 will take effect October 1, 2025.

Why This Matters

Veterans serve our country and people, putting their lives and livelihoods in jeopardy to protect and preserve our democracy and quality of life. As they transition to civilian life, many will be unable to work due to injuries sustained in the line of duty. In 2023, Maryland had approximately 348,459 veterans living in the state. Of those, 83,978 or 23.8% had a service-connected disability.

It is incumbent upon our local, state, and national governments to make sure that we acknowledge the sacrifices of our veterans by providing them with benefits lost because of their service to our country. In this case, the lost benefit is that of certain abilities and employment to support themselves and their families.

 An exemption for vehicle registration fees might be the difference in a disabled unemployed veteran affording to own their own vehicle and means of transportation, taking some burden off publicly subsidized or other forms of transportation. • Knowing they will be adequately supported upon return to civilian life, provides greater incentive for individuals to enlist in military services.

Broader Context - Service-Connected Disability Status

The Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs 2022 Report states:

- According to the US Census, compared to civilian counterparts, veterans today are more likely to suffer from trauma-related injuries, substance abuse, and mental health disorders.
- Compared to veterans of other service eras, Post 9/11 veterans have a significantly higher chance (43%) of having a service-connected disability and to have a rating of 70% or higher (39%).
- Among all veterans, men are no more likely to have a disability than women, but women are more likely to have a rating of 70% or higher.
- According to the VA, in December 2022 Post 9/11 veteran claims made up 24% of the total inventory, Gulf War made up 36%, and combined Vietnam, peacetime, and other eras made up 44%.

While the costs of HB248 might seem problematic in the short run, the benefits gained from those who have militarily served our country are incalculable. AARP believes we must honor the service and acknowledge the sacrifice of our veterans. HB248 does so, by providing greater economic viability for disabled, unemployable veterans and their dependents.

The Maryland Joint Veterans Committee (JVC) **OPPOSES** HB0248 / SB0179 Motor Vehicle Registration – Fee Exemption – Unemployable Disabled Veterans for the following reasons:

- The bill's new language specifically calls out UNEMPLOYABLE veterans can only receive exemption for 1 vehicle and it must be service related
- This bill discriminates against UNEMPLOYABLE veteran because they are being deprived the same benefits their counterparts who can work
 - Only focuses on individuals who are unemployable and restricts them to exemption of 1 vehicle registration fees
 - Individuals who lost the use of a hand, arm, leg, sight or are 100% disabled but able to work are unlimited in the number of vehicles exempt from fees
- The VA categories of Total disability individual unemployability means the individual cannot work and is on a fixed income
 - UNEMPLOYABLE disabled veterans may require more than 1 vehicle to assist the unemployable veteran
- One reason some disabled veterans have remained in Maryland is due to this benefit

The JVC encourages an **UNFAVORABLE** vote.

Additionally, we would like to bring your attention to the Maryland Department of Transportation's implementation of this law in regards to veterans. Per their 2024 written testimony on HB0716, MDOT said "The MVA requires a customer present a letter from Veteran Affair (VA) confirming the customer's 100% disabled status in order to issue the license plate set." In doing so, MDOT has placed great restrictions on veterans to obtain this benefit than the law provides. If you lose use of a hand, arm or leg due to service, this does not mean the VA will rate you 100% disabled. We recommend you review the processes and procedures established by MDOT in relation to this code to ensure the veterans are receiving the benefits prescribed by MD law.

Dear Chair Korman and Members of the Environment and Transportation Committee-

The Maryland Department of Veterans and Military Families (DVMF) is committed to leading veterans and their families through life's transitions, making Maryland the best state for the military-connected communities. DVMF fulfills its mission through five core programs: the Service and Benefits Program, which helps veterans access federal, state, and local earned benefits; Charlotte Hall Veterans Home, offering assisted living and skilled nursing care; the Cemetery and Memorial Program, providing dignified resting places and maintaining memorials honoring Maryland's veterans; the Communications, Outreach, and Advocacy Program, fostering connection and awareness; and the Maryland Veterans Trust Fund, offering financial assistance to veterans and their families in need. These programs reflect Maryland's commitment to honoring and empowering its military-connected community.

This letter provides information and context on the number of Maryland veterans classified by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs as "unemployable." We hope that this letter will help to inform the Committee about the relatively small fiscal and operational implications of House Bill 248.

The latest data available from 2023 shows 3,997 Maryland veterans are currently classified as unemployable. This designation refers to an individual who cannot maintain a steady source of income that supports them financially (known as substantially gainful employment) due to their service-connected disability. In addition, at least one of the following criteria must be true:

• They have at least 1 service-connected disability rated at 60% or more disabling, or

• They have 2 or more service-connected disabilities, with at least 1 rated at 40% or more disabling and a combined rating of 70% or more

It is important to note that even though this classification of veterans might have been awarded a disability compensation rating of less than 100%, they continue to feel a significant impact from their service-connected disabilities that prevents them from being able to maintain employment. DVMF recognizes the enormous challenges that unemployable veterans with service-connected disabilities face on a daily basis.

Dear Chair Korman and Committee Members:

The Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) takes no position on House Bill 248 but offers the following information for the Committee's consideration.

HB 248 would extend registration fee exemptions from the existing 100% disabled veteran requirement to veterans who are unemployable due to a service-connected disability as defined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

Currently, the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) processes exemptions for disabled veterans and offers free registration and free "Disabled Veterans" license plate sets to eligible customers. The MVA requires a customer to present a letter from the VA confirming the customer's 100% disabled status to issue the license plate set. Under the requirements of this bill, the MVA would be able to accept a VA letter confirming those individuals who have been granted an unemployable rating and accordingly qualify for exemptions from vehicle registration fees. Unlike 100% disabled veterans, this proposal will limit eligible vehicles to just one personally used vehicle that is owned by or leased to an unemployable veteran. The Maryland Department of Veterans and Military Families indicated there are just under 4,000 Marylanders that would qualify for this exemption.

For these reasons, the Maryland Department of Transportation respectfully requests that the Committee consider this information when deliberating House Bill 248.
