POSITION: SUPPORT

The Maryland Chiefs of Police Association (MCPA) and the Maryland Sheriffs' Association (MSA) **SUPPORT HB 343.** This bill allows for certified technicians, along with already authorized law enforcement, to inspect recorded images produced by speed cameras and swear to and affirm the recorded violation's accuracy.

Under current law, only law enforcement officers are authorized to review speed camera images and sign citations. This is a timely process and requires law enforcement officers to perform administrative duties instead of being present in the field and available to respond to urgent emergencies. HB 343 seeks to find a balance of these duties by allowing authorized technicians, who complete the same reasonable training as law enforcement, to review these images and recordings and sign citations. Given the difficult state of officer recruitment and retention in the state of Maryland, law enforcement needs as many available officers as possible, and this bill can and will assist with that problem.

Additionally, civilian technicians have been permitted to review red light camera images and sign citations since 1997. This has proven to be very effective and HB 343 will create these same efficiencies.

Speed cameras are a proven tool to reduce speeding and decrease traffic related injuries. This bill will improve the efficiency of these critical traffic safety programs, create less administrative work for law enforcement officers, and allow law enforcement officers to use their time and resources in the field as needed.

For these reasons, MCPA and MSA **SUPPORT HB 343** and urge a **FAVORABLE** committee report.

Reason for Position:

The Maryland Municipal League (MML) supports House Bill 343 which will promote roadway safety by improving the efficiency and efficacy of local speed camera programs. The bill adds technicians to the list of individuals who may review speed camera images and sign citations and clarifies that citations signed by technicians are admissible in court. HB 343 also sets a training floor which currently does not exist. The bill does not require that a local government use a technician for speed camera image review, a police officer is still authorized to do so.

Adding trained technicians as an option for municipal governments to use for back-end review of speed camera images helps in two primary ways:

- 1. For municipalities without a police department, this change allows for the entire speed camera process to be done in house. Currently, municipalities without a police department must find a benevolent neighboring police department to take on the review portion of the process. This can often be difficult and costly; only three municipalities without a police department operate speed cameras.
- 2. For municipalities with a police department, this change provides an option to relieve officers of the administrative task of reviewing speed camera images, acting as a force multiplier. The technician would remain an employee of the police department but their role would allow the officers to resume more typical public safety duties.

Currently there are civilians involved in other critical aspects of a properly functioning speed camera program such as completing daily set-up logs, answering questions from the public, reviewing contested citations, defending a violation in court, and overseeing the vendor contract.

Police officers receive training on how to properly read speed camera images and the data contained on each and technicians would receive the same training. In fact, technicians have been authorized to review red-light camera images since 1997.

In 2009, the General Assembly first authorized state-wide use of speed cameras and provided significant revisions in 2014. Some opponents of the bill refer to the original intent of the speed camera program, but it has been 15 years since they were first authorized and it is time to ask whether more changes are needed.

As the County Executive of Frederick County, I urge the committee to give **HB 343 – Speed Monitoring Systems – Statements and Certificates of Violations** a favorable report.

This bill would allow local jurisdictions and municipalities to streamline the use of speed monitoring systems by permitting trained municipal personnel—along with law enforcement officers—to approve or deny speed camera citations.

Speeding through busy roads and pedestrian areas is a serious safety concern in many municipalities. Speed cameras have been proven to influence driver behavior, reducing vehicle speeds and improving safety for both pedestrians and drivers. Unfortunately, because of the current state requirement for all speed camera citations to be reviewed by a law enforcement officer, not all municipalities have access to this essential safety tool.

Currently, trained municipal personnel are allowed to approve or deny red-light and work zone speed camera citations. By expanding this authority to include speed cameras, all municipalities—including the nine in Frederick County without their own police force—will be able to implement speed cameras to enhance safety. This change would also ease the workload of county law enforcement agencies who currently handle the review of these citations.

I support this bill because it will help municipalities in Frederick County address the safety concerns of their residents more effectively, while reducing the burden on the Frederick County Sheriff's Office.

Thank you for your consideration of HB 343. I urge you to advance this bill with a favorable report.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony. We write on behalf of the 27 municipalities that make up the Prince George's County Municipal Association (PGCMA), which collectively represents more than 955,000 residents, to share our support of House Bill 343- Speed Monitoring Systems - Agencies - Statements and Certificates of Violations

HB343 would allow the hiring and employment of technicians to review and certify speed camera citations. Currently, only a law enforcement officer may make these certifications. The process of reviewing the footage of the violations for clarity and accuracy is largely an administrative task. Expanding the criteria in staff selection and hiring to allow for a technician who does not require the same credentials as an LEO would allow municipalities to more flexibly manage their budget decision and human resources. It can also free up those law enforcement officers to focus on other tasks.

Not all municipalities have police departments, HB343 will aid in being able to access the tools to help keep their community safe. The current law requires those without police departments to contract with an agency to review traffic violations which limits the ability of municipalities to be able to utilized all the tools available to keep their community. These agencies are often the County Police Department, shifting resources from the location most impacted by the violation to the full county.

There is a recruitment and retention challenge for law enforcement agencies around the state and at a national level. Municipalities with police departments would benefit from this legislation by being better able to hire for their needs, which follows job characteristics theory, a proven retention tool. Passing HB343 would allow Municipalities with and without a police department the opportunity to reduce costs that is essential during the current financial climate, while at the same time keeping their community safe.

Prince George's County Municipal Association (PGCMA) urges the committee to provide a Favorable Report on House Bill 343.

Chair Korman, Vice Chair Boyce, and Members of the Committee, please be advised that the Baltimore City Administration (BCA) <u>supports</u> House Bill (HB) 343.

HB 343 enhances the efficiency and reliability of speed monitoring enforcement by authorizing trained technicians, in addition to law enforcement officers, to review and certify speed monitoring system violations. Additionally, the bill establishes a reasonable training requirement for both law enforcement officers and technicians before they can certify violation certificates.

This legislation strengthens the integrity of automated speed enforcement by ensuring that those responsible for reviewing and certifying violations have received proper training. By allowing qualified technicians to perform this role, HB 343 alleviates the administrative burden on law enforcement agencies, enabling officers to focus on other critical public safety duties while maintaining the effectiveness of speed monitoring systems.

Currently, Baltimore City's photo enforcement citation undergo through three layers of verification prior to final issuance. They are first reviewed by the camera contractor, before proceeding to quality assurance analysts within the Baltimore City Department of Transportation. It is only after these steps are complete that citations are reviewed and certified by the Baltimore Police Department. These redundant steps are in place to ensure the quality and integrity of the program. As a result, we do not estimate any additional costs associated with processing citations with reduced Police involvement.

In Fiscal year 2023, sworn police officer overtime expenses relating to the review of traffic camera violations amounted to \$1.57 million. On average, the Baltimore Police Department uses 1,497 of overtime hours per month with an average overtime rate of \$74.90/hour.

Contingent on the passage of SB 500/HB 913, the City plans to add two additional speed cameras to Interstate 83; we estimate this would require the hiring of one additional quality assurance analyst by the Department of Transportation.

Speed monitoring systems have proven to be an essential tool in reducing speeding and improving roadway safety. The procedural improvements introduced in HB 343 ensure that the review and certification process remain precise, efficient, and transparent, maintaining public confidence in automated enforcement.

For the above stated reasons, the BCA respectfully request a **favorable** report on HB 343.

The Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) supports House Bill 343 as an important reform to support the continued successful deployment of speed monitoring system programs that reduce speeds and save lives.



The Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) **SUPPORTS** HB 343. This bill would allow county law enforcement agencies to add, as they see fit, a trained technician to the pool of employees who are able to sign the statement alleging a violation as evidenced by a speed monitoring system.

This bill gives law enforcement agencies the flexibility to have a sworn officer or a trained employee sign speed camera violation statements. This authority is already granted to local agencies when reviewing red light camera and school bus camera citations. In those circumstances, the ability to dedicate employees, sworn or otherwise, to tasks according to specific skill sets, time constraints, and need has improved efficiency. Additionally, vacancy issues within the public safety workforce are contributing to dangerously low numbers of officers available in the community. Civilian employees, with the necessary expertise to sign these statements, will leave more officers in the community at a time when all jurisdictions are experiencing precarious staffing shortfalls in public safety.

HB 343 would authorize law enforcement agencies to delegate tasks thoughtfully and effectively, enhancing workforce utility across the entire agency. For this reason, MACo **SUPPORTS** HB 343 and urges a **FAVORABLE** report.

I am Chief Linwood Alston of the City of Mount Rainier Police Department, and I submit this testimony in strong support of House Bill 343. This legislation is a critical step toward enhancing the efficiency, integrity, and effectiveness of speed monitoring systems in Maryland, ultimately contributing to public safety on our roadways.

Speeding remains one of the leading causes of traffic collisions, injuries, and fatalities across the state, including in the City of Mount Rainier. Testimony in Support of HB 343 Motor Vehicles - Speed Monitoring Systems Statements and Certificates of Violations

Testimony by Delegate Vaughn Stewart February 18, 2025 | Environment & Transportation Committee

What the Bill Does:

In Maryland, speed camera citations can only be reviewed and certified by a sworn police officer. This policy, however, is costly to many jurisdictions - especially small and rural communities - and places an undue burden on law enforcement resources and budgets. HB 343 would alter this requirement to allow speed camera citations to be reviewed by a trained technician.

Why the Bill is Important:

Maryland partly relies on speed cameras to improve traffic safety, reduce accidents, and enforce speed limits in high-risk areas such as school zones. Under current law, only police officers are authorized to review and certify citations, placing unnecessary burdens on law enforcement personnel and limiting the efficiency of the program.

Jurisdictions often have to pay police officers overtime to review citations - in some, like the City of Baltimore, the amount of money collected in speed camera fines totals the cost of overtime paid to officers for reviewing those citations. By tying up officers in the service of tasks which can easily and straightforwardly be performed by a trained civilian, the policy also diverts important law enforcement resources from their role in ensuring public safety and responding to emergencies in the community.

Expanding certification authority to trained staff ensures that law enforcement resources and officers can focus on more pressing public safety duties rather than administrative reviews. The addition of minimum training standards also guarantees that individuals reviewing citations are held to rigorous and transparent standards, preventing potential errors or inconsistencies in enforcement.

Why the Committee Should Vote Favorably:

HB 343 is a simple, common-sense fix that will ensure the continued effectiveness of Maryland's speed camera program while freeing up law enforcement resources to be used where they are most needed, in keeping local communities across Maryland safe. **I urge a favorable report.**
