

I write to you today on behalf of the Maryland State Fair in support of HB650, legislation that will provide a stable and permanent funding source for the Maryland State Fair and other agricultural fairs and shows across the state that desperately need this funding. This bill is essential to maintaining and strengthening the agricultural heritage, education, and community engagement that these events provide.

Historically, the Maryland State Fair has received funding annually from the special fund, a sum tied to the 42 racing days we transferred to the state after discontinuing our summer horse race meet. Additionally, we, as well as many other fairs and shows, receive funding annually through the Maryland Agriculture Fair Board to support ribbons, awards, and other critical programming. These funds are vital to ensuring the success of our fair and the many other fairs and agricultural and community events across Maryland.

The special fund, primarily financed through unclaimed pari-mutuel tickets from horse racing, has become an increasingly unstable revenue source due to the decline in racing and wagering. Each year, we experience significant reductions in funding, creating uncertainty and making it difficult to budget for the programs and opportunities we offer. HB650 will provide a much-needed solution by reinforcing the intended financial commitments in the original statute and

ensuring a predictable funding stream for Maryland State Fair and the numerous other Maryland fairs and shows.

Agricultural fairs, including the Maryland State Fair, serve as vital educational and economic drivers in our communities. They offer hands-on learning experiences for youth, promote local agriculture, and provide a platform for small businesses, vendors, and entertainers. Without consistent funding, these contributions to our communities are at risk. By passing HB650, the General Assembly will help sustain these time-honored traditions and provide much-needed financial stability.

I respectfully urge the committee to give HB650 a favorable report to safeguard the future of the Maryland State Fair and the many other fairs and shows that enrich our state. Thank you for your time and consideration.

The Rural Maryland Council supports House Bill 650 – Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Fund - Establishment (Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Act). This bill establishes the Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Fund as a special, non-lapsing fund aimed at advancing agricultural fairs and education in the state. It requires that any interest earnings from the fund be credited back to it. Additionally, the bill allocates \$1,450,000 from the state lottery proceeds—before any funds are directed to the General Fund—to the Promise Fund. Lastly, it repeals the previous requirement that a specific amount of annual proceeds from the state horse racing special fund be used to promote agricultural fairs and education in the state.

Maryland's agricultural education and agricultural fairs play a vital role in the state's economy and community engagement.

Agricultural education in Maryland provides essential knowledge and skills to students and individuals interested in pursuing careers in agriculture, environmental science, and related fields. On behalf of the nearly 8,000 member families of the Maryland Farm Bureau, I submit written testimony in favor of HB650 Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Fund - Establishment (Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Act). This legislation would establish the Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Fund as a special, non-lapsing fund to advance agricultural fairs and education in the State.

Agricultural education plays a crucial role in shaping the next generation of leaders, farmers, and informed consumers. Programs such as 4-H, FFA, and agricultural education in schools provide hands-on learning experiences that connect students to the agricultural industry while also teaching them valuable life skills. Through participation in these programs, young people develop leadership abilities, teamwork, problem-solving skills, and strong work ethic—qualities that benefit them regardless of their career paths. Additionally, agricultural education fosters a deeper appreciation for the role of farming in our economy, food supply, and environmental sustainability, helping to build a well-informed citizenry that supports and understands agriculture's significance.

Currently, the Maryland Agricultural Fair Board, the Maryland State Fair, and the Maryland Agricultural Education Foundation depend on funding from a non-lapsing special fund, which has traditionally been sustained by unclaimed racing mutuals. These funds have been instrumental in supporting agricultural fairs, youth programs, and hands-on educational experiences that inspire and educate the next generation. However, with the rapid expansion of online gambling, the revenue generated from unclaimed racing mutuals has dwindled, resulting in a significant shortfall in available funding. Consequently, many programs that rely on these funds to operate effectively have seen reductions in resources, limiting their ability to provide opportunities for students and communities.

Ensuring the continued success of agricultural education programs is essential not only for the students who directly benefit but also for the broader agricultural industry and local economies. These programs contribute to workforce development, fostering a pipeline of skilled individuals who will drive innovation and sustainability in agriculture. Without adequate funding, access to agricultural education and hands-on learning experiences will decline, potentially leading to long-term consequences for industry and rural communities. To maintain and expand these critical programs, alternative funding solutions must be explored, and policymakers must prioritize investment in agricultural education. Supporting these initiatives is

not just about preserving tradition, it is about securing a strong future for Maryland's agricultural sector and ensuring that young people have the knowledge and skills to succeed in an ever-changing world.

The Maryland Lottery and Gaming Control Agency ("MLGCA" or "Agency") provides the following information regarding House Bill 650, Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Fund - Establishment (Maryland Fair and Agricultural Education Promise Act).

Bill Summary:

HB 650 proposes establishing the Maryland Fair and Agricultural Promise Fund. The fund would provide grants to advance agricultural fairs and education in the State. The fund would consist of revenue distributed to the fund under § 9-120 (B)(1)(XIV) of the State Government Article.

Background:

The allocation of funds from the State Lottery Fund to special funds decreases the amount of money transferred to the General Fund. Allocating any additional revenue from the State Lottery Fund will place the State's AA Bond Rating at risk of being downgraded. The Board of Revenue Estimates (BRE) considers total lottery revenues and makes projections based on the revenues less the current distributions. Table 1 reflects the projected distribution of lottery funds as well as the coverage amounts for mandated disbursements. The coverage amount is determined by dividing the total lottery revenue by the total mandated disbursement. When the coverage amount is 3.1x or lower, the bond rating can be downgraded. BRE has projected, based on current allocations, that the coverage amount will be 3.1x in FY26 and 2.9x in FY27 and FY28. Adding an additional allocation of \$1.45 million reduces the coverage further leaving Maryland at risk of having its AA Bond rating downgraded.
