

I am writing to express and offer my support for the proposed "Eric's ID Law" that we expect will assist in the identification of individuals with "invisible disabilities" in circumstances where they may encounter law enforcement or first responders. As a law enforcement leader, I recognize the potential for misunderstanding between public safety professionals and individuals who may have physical, mental, and/or neurological conditions that are not visible from the outside but may limit or challenge their response during an encounter with law enforcement or first responders.

The JCRC has a long history of prioritizing the needs and rights of people with disabilities. Since our agency's inception in 1938, we have been committed to supporting policy measures to empower individuals with disabilities to achieve maximum independence and break down barriers to inclusion.

House Bill 707, known as Eric's ID Law, would create a **voluntary** designation (butterfly logo) on a Maryland license, identification card, or moped operator's permit for those with non-apparent disabilities such as intellectual and developmental disabilities. The purpose of the bill is to enhance the safety of people with disabilities and provide an additional resource for law enforcement and first responders, helping them recognize and respond appropriately to individuals with non-apparent disabilities during interactions.

HB 707 has addressed previous concerns including requiring expedited training for law enforcement so that all officers are aware of the new designation and learn how to interact with an individual with a non-apparent disability. Additionally, this version of the Bill specifies that the Maryland Vehicle Administration may **not** use this information as grounds for referral to the Medical Advisory Board, nor as part of a records request by insurance companies. By creating this **voluntary** designation, we strive to ensure the health and safety of individuals with disabilities and their families, prevent stigma, and protect against targeted victimization. For these reasons, we support House Bill 707.

I would like to tell you my story about how I began "ERIC's ID LAW". When George Floyd was killed. My mother sat down with me to have a talk if I ever get stopped by the Law Enforcement. My mother told me if the police ever stop me to put my hands up! Yell out "I have Autism!" and yell out "someone call my mom!" Yell out my mother's phone number! She told me DO NOT TRY TO GRAB MY PHONE! Because the police may think I am reaching for a gun.

I said Mom! – I can do that but the police would shoot my friends. I started to cry telling my

mom "WE GOTTA DO SOMETHING NOW!" My mother said – Let's think about this! My mother contacted former Chief of Police Robert J. Contee and we decided to meet with Chief Contee about doing a workshop with the police to teach people about autism/invisible disabilities.

I went to my mom and asked her to please take me to congress to meet with the former House Speaker, Mrs. Nancy Pelosi. I wanted to talk with her about my ideas for laws for people like me and my friends that have autism, brain injury, bipolar, hearing impaired and other hidden disabilities. My mother told me she is very proud of me and she would do her best to get me to congress so I can tell them about my ideas for laws.

We met with Montgomery County Councilmember Will Jawando, Evan Glass, Kate Stewart, Andrew Friedson, Dawn Luedtke, Prince George's County State's Attorney, Aisha Braveboy, Mayor Casheena Cross of Glenarden Maryland, Prince George's County Sheriff John Carr, Montgomery County Sheriff Maxwell Uy, Montgomery County Chief of Police Marcus Jones, Senator, Chris Van Hollen, Delegate Kym Taylor, Delegate Lesley Lopez, Senator Nick Charles, Senator Michael Jackson, Congressman David Trone, President Darryll Pines of UMD and Montgomery College. ALL of these people Approved of AKA "ERIC's ID LAW - BILL for SB0618 - Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law). (THIS WOULD BE A VOLUNTARY SELECTION)

On July 10, 2023 me and my mother met with our Maryland State Senator Will C. Smith. I told him about my concerns. If I ever get stopped by the police, I may not be able to communicate well when they tell me what to do. I told him about my friends that have autism and their autism is different for each one of my friends. One of my friends I am really concerned about his autism is very different and I am worried about his safety. Because if the police ever stop him, he would run and hide because he is scared. You cannot tell when you look at him that he has autism. I don't want the police to hurt him. I don't want my other friends that have autism to be scared and run because the police may hurt them.

This is when I told my mother I wanted to put logos for autism, mental hearing, hearing impaired and hidden disabilities on the ID and driver license. Because when the police stop someone with an invisible disability this may make it safer for the person that has an invisible disability. When I told my story to Senator Will C. Smith, He said to me and mother that he is going to write the BILL for aka "ERIC"s ID LAW". BILL for HB0707- Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law). (THIS WOULD BE A VOLUNTARY SELECTION). I would like to ask that this Law have the OPTION FOR VOLUNTARY SELECTION. Because I have researched that more people of color are more likely to being diagnosed with hidden disability than Caucasian people. According to Autism Speaks, Disabled individual are seven times more likely than others

to interact with police, and 53% of autistic adults in 2019 study reported having had four or more interaction with police in their lifetime.

I hope "ERIC"s ID LAW" will save lives for every race. It's not just about black people it's for ALL PEOPLE! I have noticed that some people that are NOT OF COLOR have tried to oppose this BILL. 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

Optional driver's license or ID card designations - Iowa DOT

lowa allows individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) to add an optional indicator to their driver's license or ID card to help avoid miscommunication and negative interactions:

- Indicator: The word "autism" can be added to the front of the card.
- Visibility: The indicator is also visible in the database used by law enforcement.
- Voluntary: The indicator is not a restriction on driving privileges.
- Request: The request can be made during an in-person or online issuance transaction.

The state of Iowa also allows individuals with ASD to add a Medical Alert designation to their license.

This designation appears in red bold letters on the bottom right corner of the license. The individual can choose how to share this information. While some individuals with ASD may face challenges while driving, it is achievable with proper training and preparation.

This is a voluntary indicator and is not a restriction of driving privileges.





Michigan

URIBUS IL Michigan residents with autism can add a voluntary communication impediment designation to their driver's license, state ID, or vehicle registration:

What it is

The designation informs law enforcement about communication needs in the event of a traffic stop or emergency. It appears on the Law Enforcement Information Network, but not on the driver's license or ID. Who can apply

Anyone with autism, deafness, hearing impairment, or another medical condition that makes communication UEBUK difficult can apply.

How to apply

Complete the BFS-250 form and have it certified by a Michigan-licensed medical professional. The form can be mailed, faxed, emailed, or processed in person at a Secretary of State office. There is no fee.

Benefits

The designation can help create safer interactions with law enforcement. For example, police can be more understanding and use sensory-friendly approaches, such as less light and sound, and more distance. It can also be important in a medical emergency, as medical professionals may be more cautious about triggers and sensory concerns. sensory concerns.

Missouri

In Missouri, a "permanent disability indicator" can be added to a driver's license or non-driver ID upon request, appearing on the back of the card, signifying that the holder has a permanent disability; to obtain this indicator, a medical statement from a licensed healthcare professional is required.

Key points about Missouri disability indicators on driver's licenses

How to add it:

When applying for a new, renewal, or duplicate license, you can request to have the disability indicator added.

Medical verification:

A physician, physical therapist, occupational therapist, or other authorized licensed healthcare practitioner must complete a medical statement to verify the permanent disability.

No additional cost:

Adding the disability indicator does not incur extra fees.

This indicator is intended to alert emergency personnel about a person's permanent disability.

New Hampshire

- To add the indication, you can complete the Medically Recognized Disorder Indication form on the New Hampshire DMV website.
- A licensed physician must sign the form.
- You can drop off the form at a New Hampshire DMV dropbox.
- There is no additional cost to add the indication during a renewal.
- If you add the indication outside of a renewal period, there is a \$3 fee for a replacement license or ID card.
- If the name of the disorder is longer than 25 characters, only the abbreviation will appear on the ID.

North Carolina

North Carolina will allow a voluntary driver's license designation for people with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

The Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) will enter the designation into the driver's license record, instead of a unique symbol on the license.

The applicant must provide verification or documentation of their ASD diagnosis.

Law enforcement will receive training on the designation and how to interact with people with ASD.

There will be a process for voluntarily removing the designation.





AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 707

(First Reading File Bill)

AMENDMENT NO. 1

On page 1, in line 10, after "notation;" insert "requiring the Administration to delete a certain record about an applicant's nonapparent disability notation under certain circumstances;"; in line 12, strike "to" and substitute "in a"; and in the same line, strike "entities" and substitute "manner under certain circumstances".

AMENDMENT NO. 2

On page 3, in line 29, strike "AND".

Dear Colleagues,

I am pleased to present House Bill 707, Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law).

Eric's ID Law would create a voluntary designation on a Maryland license, identification card, or moped operator's permit for those with non-apparent disabilities, such as intellectual and developmental disabilities. The bill aims to enhance the safety of people with disabilities and provide an additional resource for law enforcement and first responders, helping them recognize and respond appropriately to individuals with non-apparent disabilities during interactions.

In 2013, Ethan Saylor, a young man with a developmental disability, was killed by off-duty police officers who used excessive force to remove Ethan from a movie theatre. As a result of Ethan's tragic death, the Ethan Saylor Alliance was passed in April 2015. The Ethan Saylor Alliance aims to enhance training for law enforcement and public service entities regarding the specific needs of individuals with developmental and intellectual disabilities.

Building on this critical and ongoing work, Eric's ID Law would allow those with an intellectual or developmental disability to have an extra resource readily available when interacting with law enforcement and other first responders. This designation would allow law enforcement and other first responders to recognize that they would need to interact differently with an individual with this designation. I urge the committee to give a favorable report for House Bill 707, Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law).

Thank you, Chair and members of the Committee. My name is Kyla Clark, Council Member and Council President for The City of Laurel, and I am here today to urge your support for Eric's ID Law, HB707.

Every day across Maryland, individuals with non-apparent disabilities face moments of crisis where they're unable to explain their condition to law enforcement or first responders. These are moments where confusion can quickly escalate to tragedy.

Now, think about someone you know with an intellectual disability being pulled over for a routine traffic stop, all of a sudden, their anxiety starts making it difficult for them to follow commands. Or better yet, consider your neighbor or parent experiencing a medical emergency, unable to effectively communicate their needs to first responders.

Eric's ID Law creates a simple, voluntary designation on Maryland licenses and ID cards that could provide critical information in these moments of crisis. What makes this bill remarkable is its thoughtful approach – it protects privacy, ensures there's no cost barrier, and requires immediate training for law enforcement.

I want to emphasize – this isn't just about adding a symbol to an ID card. This is about giving our law enforcement and first responders the tools that they need to better serve our community, while adding an additional layer of protection for loved ones during critical interactions.

The City of Laurel, that I'm proud to represent, recently shared a powerful example. We described someone that we know with Progressive Supranuclear Palsy who appeared physically capable but couldn't comply with an officer's commands or explain why if they needed to. These are the real-life situations where this designation could make all the difference.

In closing, this bill represents our collective opportunity to make Maryland the state that we love, safer and more inclusive for everyone. So, I urge you, I urge you, to vote in favor of HB707. Thank you for your time today.

I am a single mother of an amazing 20-Year old son Eric Blessed Carpenter-Grantham who is highly functioning autistic. We also have our own non-profit titled: THE BLUE RUNWAY FOR AUTISM. We partner with MACY's and Law Enforcement to host fashion shows for people with autism/special needs. We also have our "DRESSED IN BLUE" workshop where we engage with the police on interacting with a person with invisible disabilities like autism, mental health and hearing impaired/special needs.

When George Floyd was killed. I realize that I have an African American son with an invisible disability that cannot be seen. Should my son be stopped by Law Enforcement could be very concerning for his life. There is always the possibility that my son may not be able to follow the command that would be given to him at that time. Depending on his ability to comprehend fully and being fearful at that time. Eric also has sensory issues, which means his hearing, touch, taste and smell are heightened.

This means that if other high pitch noises, lights, smells and touching could redirect his attention away from the command that is being requested at that time. Eric also has heart disease. He had heart bypass surgery April 13, 2016 and He has asthma. Whenever he gets

high stress levels he will complain of chest pains, heart skipping beats and sometimes feeling a little short of breath. This is also concerning should he be stopped by Law Enforcement and become fearful.

When creating a scenario for Eric to understand telling him if Law Enforcement should stop him. Put your hands up, don't reach for your cell phone to call me (his first instinct is to call me for everything) YELL OUT! – I HAVE AUTISM! YELL OUT CALL MY MOTHER! – YELL OUT MY CELL PHONE NUMBER! – Eric's reply was "Mom – I can do that! But the police would shoot my friends"

Eric started to cry. He said with such urgency "Mom – We Gotta DO SOMETHING! Because Eric has always had a passion for GOD and Politics. He asked me to take him to congress to speak with former House Speaker Mrs. Nancy Pelosi. He said he wanted to talk with her regarding laws that would protect himself and his friends that have autism/invisible disabilities. I told him I am very proud of him and that I would do my best to get him there.

Eric said "Mom! I have an idea." Can I put the logo on the ID and Driver's license for Autism, Mental Health, Hearing Impaired and the Butterfly for Hidden Disabilities. We drew the art work of the (A-for Autism, Silhouette of the Head with a lighter green heart, Ear with sound bars, Butterfly with Black Border and distinctive colors in the wings that represent the colors for invisible disabilities in the ribbon. I contacted Senator Chris Van Hollen's Office. We met with the Senator March 29, 2023 and he loved the idea. He appointed his legislative aid Ijeoma Egekeze to assist us with writing the proposal for the future **BILL for HB707-Vehicle Laws -Licenses, Identification of Nonapparent Disability AKA "ERIC's ID LAW**". I contacted Prince George's County State's Attorney Aisha Braveboy to meet with her March 21, 2023 and hear what she thought about "ERIC's ID LAW". She was very supportive. She stated "ERIC's ID LAW" could be used in her line of work.

I also contacted Prince George's Sheriff John Carr, Montgomery County Sheriff Maxwell Uy, Montgomery County Chief of Police Marcus Jones, Montgomery County Councilmembers Will Jawando, Kate Stewart, Andrew Friedson, Evan Glass and Congressman David Trone. They were ALL in agreement with "ERIC's ID LAW".

I contacted our Maryland State Senator Will C. Smith to request a meeting with him regarding this becoming a BILL. We met on July 10, 2023 Senator Smith was very positive about this becoming a BILL. Eric explained to him why this was very important, that He and his friends that are people of color and have autism, they need to have something on their

ID that states they have an invisible disability should they be stopped by Law Enforcement. Eric explained to the Senator how concerned he is for all people but especially people of color being stopped by Law Enforcement and having autism/invisible disabilities. How many people of color with invisible disabilities are being hurt, harmed and killed by Law Enforcement.

Senator Will C. Smith was excited to inform me and Eric that he would write the BILL for BILL for HB707-Vehicle Laws -Licenses, Identification of Nonapparent Disability AKA "ERIC'S ID LAW".

I scheduled a meeting with Ms. Jessica Mettles for May 18, 2023 at 11am. At Maryland Motor Vehicle Administration to discuss the possibilities of MVA applying "ERIC's ID LAW Logos to the Maryland State ID and Driver's License. The attendees were Linda Carpenter-Grantham, Eric Carpenter-Grantham, Prince Georges County Sheriff John Carr, MVA Staff Jessica Mettle, April King, Adrienne Diaczok and Joseph Hargrove. April King, Director of Legislative Affairs, was not open to this request. She informed us that they are using their BLUE CARD for Developmental Disabilities that they implemented in 2020.

Her request to me was if I could hold off on "ERIC's ID LAW" and give them a chance to get the BLUE CARD out due to covid. It was a true insult to ask me to hold off on my son's mission to save lives for people like himself and others like him until she could get the BLUE CARD completely out.

We also met with the Secretary of Disabilities Carol Beatty, Rachel London, Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council, Ethan Saylor Alliance Steering Committee on October 11, 2023 at 10am. Attendees for that meeting were Ms. Saylor, Stephanie Jones, Sdolamore, Katherine Follin, Robert Wagner, E Benevides, Tomgene Curtis, My Three Wheels, KendallF, Kimberly McKay, Jennifer Eastman. Pathfinder for Autism.

Eric and I presented "ERIC's ID LAW" to everyone who attended the meeting. I explained in detail how this is a voluntary selection. Eric explained how important this is to him for himself and his friends and others in the world to be safe should you get stopped by law enforcement.

I remember the question being asked "What is we want from them"? I said "We would love your support for "ERIC's ID LAW". We can ALL work together to help save lives. NO ONE said anything! This is when I knew "ERIC's ID LAW" was NOT welcomed with this group who happens to be ALL Caucasian people.

This was a moment that really hurt and was very disappointing. I never taught my son Eric to see color. I teach him to see character. GOD's word says love your neighbor! He didn't say Love your black neighbor or gay neighbor! – He said your NEIGHBOR! That means ALL

PEOPLE!

I pray this BILL is passed for "ERIC's ID LAW" to help save lives for ALL people that have an encounter with Law Enforcement. I also hope that it serves as a communication tool within the community. I hope that any place that you requires ID will be able to serve the person that needs assistance with "ERIC's ID LAW".

I want my son to feel a sense of security with this being on his ID that he will get the help that is needed to assist him. I am asking the favorable choice to pass this BILL because it is definitely needed.



Optional driver's license or ID card designations - Iowa DOT

lowa allows individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) to add an optional indicator to their driver's license or ID card to help avoid miscommunication and negative interactions:

- Indicator: The word "autism" can be added to the front of the card.
- Visibility: The indicator is also visible in the database used by law enforcement.

- Voluntary: The indicator is not a restriction on driving privileges.
- Request: The request can be made during an in-person or online issuance transaction.

The state of Iowa also allows individuals with ASD to add a Medical Alert designation to their license.

This designation appears in red bold letters on the bottom right corner of the license. The individual can choose how to share this information. While some individuals with ASD may face challenges while driving, it is achievable with proper training and preparation.

This is a voluntary indicator and is not a restriction of driving privileges.





Michigan

Michigan residents with autism can add a voluntary communication impediment designation to their driver's license, state ID, or vehicle registration:

What it is

The designation informs law enforcement about communication needs in the event of a traffic stop or emergency. It appears on the Law Enforcement Information Network, but not on the driver's license or ID. Who can apply

Anyone with autism, deafness, hearing impairment, or another medical condition that makes communication difficult can apply.

How to apply

Complete the BFS-250 form and have it certified by a Michigan-licensed medical professional. The form can be mailed, faxed, emailed, or processed in person at a Secretary of State office. There is no fee.

Benefits

The designation can help create safer interactions with law enforcement. For example, police can be more understanding and use sensory-friendly approaches, such as less light and sound, and more distance. It can also be important in a medical emergency, as medical professionals may be more cautious about triggers and sensory concerns. RCHMSPI

Missouri

In Missouri, a "permanent disability indicator" can be added to a driver's license or non-driver ID upon request, appearing on the back of the card, signifying that the holder has a permanent disability; to obtain this indicator, a medical statement from a licensed healthcare professional is required.

Key points about Missouri disability indicators on driver's licenses

How to add it:

When applying for a new, renewal, or duplicate license, you can request to have the disability indicator added.

Medical verification:

A physician, physical therapist, occupational therapist, or other authorized licensed healthcare practitioner must complete a medical statement to verify the permanent disability.

No additional cost:

Adding the disability indicator does not incur extra fees.

North Carolina will allow a voluntary driver's license designation for people with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).





I am writing to express my support for House Bill 707, Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law). The legislation would require that certain applications for a license, identification card, or moped operator's permit provide the option for an applicant to choose to indicate on the document the applicant's nonapparent disability. The term can be defined as a physical, mental, or neurological condition that is not easily apparent or detected by others. The bill directs the Motor Vehicle Administration to include a certain notation of the disability and requires the Administration to do public outreach efforts about its availability. Further, the bill includes a prohibition concerning the disclosure of certain information about an applicant.

An increasing number of states are considering measures to offer an applicant seeking a driver's license or government-issued ID card the option of adding a discrete marker identifying the individual as having a nonapparent or invisible disability. The symbol would be recognized by first responders as an indicator of an individual who may need an accommodation to avoid misunderstandings that could lead to a potentially confrontational interaction.

At the local level, Montgomery County Department of Police has recognized the issue of invisible disabilities by working collaboratively with Pathfinders for Autism, a Maryland-based organization founded by parents of children with autism, on a traffic stop program called the Blue Envelope Initiative. Police know about the traffic stop toolkit that includes an envelope listing the steps to follow on one side, and tips about autism for the officer of the other side. The Hidden Disabilities Sunflower organization is another non-government entity with a growing global campaign to raise awareness and support for individuals with invisible disabilities. While these efforts are laudable, they are not enough.

I am pleased to support HB 707 – *Eric's ID Law* – named for Montgomery County resident, Eric Carpenter-Grantham. Colorado and Alaska have passed similar nonapparent disability identification laws. I would urge Maryland to follow their lead, and respectfully request the Committee's adoption of a favorable report on House Bill 707.

Permits the Department of Motor Vehicles, upon the request of the applicant and presentation of a signed statement by a licensed physician confirming the applicant's condition, to designate an intellectual disability or autism spectrum disorder on the applicant's driver's license and to designate hearing or speech impairment, insulin-dependent diabetes, or an intellectual disability or autism spectrum disorder on the applicant's special identification card. Current law allows the designation of a hearing or speech impairment or a condition of insulin-dependent diabetes on a person's driver's license.

A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 46.2-342 and 46.2-345 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding a section numbered 46.2-203.2, relating to designation on driver's licenses and special identification cards of intellectual disability or autism spectrum disorder; emergency contact program.

Patron—McEachin

Referred to Committee on Transportation

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That §§ 46.2-342 and 46.2-345 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 46.2-203.2 as follows:

§ 46.2-203.2. Emergency contact information program.

- A. As used in this section, "emergency contact" means a person 18 years of age or older whom the customer may designate to be contacted by a law-enforcement officer in an emergency situation.
- B. The Department may establish an emergency contact information program to assist law-enforcement personnel in emergency situations. To establish such a program, a person who currently holds a learner's permit, temporary driver's license, driver's license, commercial driver's license, or special identification card issued by the Department or completes an application for the same may voluntarily submit emergency contact information for inclusion in his customer record with the Department. Such emergency contact information may include the name, relationship to the customer, address, and telephone number for an individual the customer designates as a contact in the event of an emergency situation.
- C. Any person voluntarily submitting emergency contact information to the Department for inclusion in the applicant's customer record is responsible for maintaining current emergency contact information with the Department. Each applicant submitting emergency contact information to the Department shall certify in his application that he has notified the person he has designated as an emergency contact that such information will be supplied to the Department. The Department shall provide a method by which applicants submitting emergency contact information to the Department may submit such information electronically pursuant to § 46.2-216.1. Customers may add, modify, or delete information at any time. Such modifications or deletions will overwrite all previously provided information.
- D. In the event of an emergency situation, the Department shall make emergency contact information in customer records electronically available to a law-enforcement officer who in the exercise of his official duties requires assistance in reaching a customer's emergency contact. Emergency contact information provided to the Department by the customer shall not be considered a public record subject to disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act and shall only be disclosed as permitted in this section.
- E. In the absence of gross negligence or willful misconduct, the Department, its employees, and law-enforcement officers shall be immune from any civil or criminal liability in connection with the maintenance and use of emergency contact information voluntarily provided by customers for use in an emergency situation.

§ 46.2-342. What license to contain; organ donor information; Uniform Donor Document.

A. Every license issued under this chapter shall bear:

- 1. For licenses issued or renewed on or after July 1, 2003, a license number which shall be assigned by the Department to the licensee and shall not be the same as the licensee's social security number;
 - 2. A photograph of the licensee;
 - 3. The licensee's full name, year, month, and date of birth;
 - 4. The licensee's address, subject to the provisions of subsection B of this section;
 - 5. A brief description of the licensee for the purpose of identification;
 - 6. A space for the signature of the licensee; and
 - 7. Any other information deemed necessary by the Commissioner for the administration of this title. No abbreviated names or nicknames shall be shown on any license.
- B. At the option of the licensee, the address shown on the license may be either the post office box, business, or residence address of the licensee, provided such address is located in Virginia. However, regardless of which address is shown on the license, the licensee shall supply the Department with his residence address, which shall be an address in Virginia. This residence address shall be maintained in

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the Department's records. Whenever the licensee's address shown either on his license or in the Department's records changes, he shall notify the Department of such change as required by § 46.2-324.

C. The Department may contract with the United States Postal Service or an authorized agent to use the National Change of Address System for the purpose of obtaining current address information for a person whose name appears in customer records maintained by the Department. If the Department receives information from the National Change of Address System indicating that a person whose name appears in a Department record has submitted a permanent change of address to the Postal Service, the Department may then update its records with the mailing address obtained from the National Change of Address System.

D. The license shall be made of a material and in a form to be determined by the Commissioner.

E. Licenses issued to persons less than 21 years old shall be immediately and readily distinguishable from those issued to persons 21 years old or older. Distinguishing characteristics shall include unique design elements of the document and descriptors within the photograph area to identify persons who are at least 15 years old but less than 21 years old. These descriptors shall include the month, day, and year when the person will become 21 years old.

F. The Department shall establish a method by which an applicant for a driver's license or an identification card may designate his willingness to make an anatomical gift for transplantation, therapy, research, and education as provided in Article 2 (§ 32.1-289.2 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 32.1 and shall cooperate with the Virginia Transplant Council to ensure that such method is designed to encourage organ, tissue, and eye donation with a minimum of effort on the part of the donor and the Department.

G. If an applicant designates his willingness to be a donor pursuant to subsection F, the Department may make a notation of this designation on his license or card and shall make a notation of this designation in his driver record.

H. The donor designation authorized in subsection G shall be sufficient legal authority for the removal, following death, of the subject's organs or tissues without additional authority from the donor, or his family or estate. No family member, guardian, agent named pursuant to an advance directive or person responsible for the decedent's estate shall refuse to honor the donor designation or, in any way, seek to avoid honoring the donor designation.

I. The donor designation provided pursuant to subsection F may be rescinded by notifying the Department. In addition, the Department shall remove from the driver's license or identification card any donor designation made pursuant to subsection F, if, at the time the applicant renews or replaces the license or identification card, the applicant does not again designate his willingness to be a donor pursuant to subsection F.

J. A minor may make a donor designation pursuant to subsection F without the consent of a parent or legal guardian as authorized by the Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift Act (§ 32.1-291.1 et seq.).

K. The Department shall provide a method by which an applicant conducting a Department of Motor Vehicles transaction using electronic means may make a voluntary contribution to the Virginia Donor Registry and Public Awareness Fund (Fund) established pursuant to § 32.1-297.1. The Department shall inform the applicant of the existence of the Fund and also that contributing to the Fund is voluntary.

L. The Department shall collect all moneys contributed pursuant to subsection K and transmit the moneys on a regular basis to the Virginia Transplant Council, which shall credit the contributions to the Fund.

M. When requested by the applicant, and upon presentation of a signed statement by a licensed physician confirming the applicant's condition, the Department shall indicate on the applicant's driver's license that the applicant is (i) is an insulin-dependent diabetic, or (ii) is hearing or speech impaired, or (iii) has an intellectual disability, as defined in § 37.2-100, or autism spectrum disorder, as defined in § 38.2-3418.17.

N. In the absence of gross negligence or willful misconduct, the Department and its employees shall be immune from any civil or criminal liability in connection with the making of or failure to make a notation of donor designation on any license or card or in any person's driver record.

O. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, the Department shall continue to use the uniform donor document, as formerly set forth in subsection F, for organ donation designation until such time as a new method is fully implemented, which shall be no later than July 1, 1994. Any such uniform donor document shall, when properly executed, remain valid and shall continue to be subject to all conditions for execution, delivery, amendment, and revocation as set out in Article 2 (§ 32.1-289.2 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 32.1.

P. The Department shall, in coordination with the Virginia Transplant Council, prepare an organ donor information brochure describing the organ donor program and providing instructions for completion of the uniform donor document information describing the bone marrow donation program and instructions for registration in the National Bone Marrow Registry. The Department shall include a copy of such brochure with every driver's license renewal notice or application mailed to licensed

121 drivers in Virginia.

§ 46.2-345. Issuance of special identification cards; fee; confidentiality; penalties.

- A. On the application of any person who is a resident of the Commonwealth or the parent or legal guardian of any such person who is under the age of 15, the Department shall issue a special identification card to the person provided:
- 1. Application is made on a form prescribed by the Department and includes the applicant's full legal name; year, month, and date of birth; social security number; sex; and residence address;
- 2. The applicant presents, when required by the Department, proof of identity, legal presence, residency, and social security number or non-work authorized status;
- 3. The Department is satisfied that the applicant needs an identification card or the applicant shows he has a bona fide need for such a card; and
- 4. The applicant does not hold a driver's license, commercial driver's license, temporary driver's permit, learner's permit, or motorcycle learner's permit.

Persons 70 years of age or older may exchange a valid Virginia driver's license for a special identification card at no fee. Special identification cards subsequently issued to such persons shall be subject to the regular fees for special identification cards.

- B. The fee for the issuance of an original or renewal special identification card is \$5. The fee for the issuance of a duplicate or reissue of a special identification card is \$5. Persons 21 years old or older may be issued a scenic special identification card for an additional fee of \$5.
- C. Every special identification card shall expire on the last day of the month of birth of the applicant in years in which the applicant attains an age exactly divisible by five. At no time shall any special identification card be issued for less than three nor more than seven years, except under the provisions of subsection B of § 46.2-328.1 and except that those cards issued to children under the age of 15 shall expire on the child's sixteenth birthday, thereafter the special identification card may be renewed on or before the last day of the month of birth of the applicant and shall be valid for five years, expiring in the next year in which the applicant's age is exactly divisible by five, except under the provisions of subsection B of § 46.2-328.1. Notwithstanding these limitations, the Commissioner may extend the validity period of an expiring card if (i) the Department is unable to process an application for renewal due to circumstances beyond its control, (ii) the extension has been authorized under a directive from the Governor, and (iii) the card was not issued as a temporary special identification card under the provisions of subsection B of § 46.2-328.1. However, in no event shall the validity period be extended more than 90 days per occurrence of such conditions.
- D. A special identification card issued under this section may be similar in size, shape, and design to a driver's license, and include a photograph of its holder, but the card shall be readily distinguishable from a driver's license and shall clearly state that it does not authorize the person to whom it is issued to drive a motor vehicle. Every applicant for a special identification card shall appear in person before the Department to apply for a renewal, duplicate or reissue unless specifically permitted by the Department to apply in another manner.
- E. Special identification cards, for persons at least 15 years old but less than 21 years old, shall be immediately and readily distinguishable from those issued to persons 21 years old or older. Distinguishing characteristics shall include unique design elements of the document and descriptors within the photograph area to identify persons who are at least 15 years old but less than 21 years old. These descriptors shall include the month, day, and year when the person will become 21 years old.
- F. Special identification cards for persons under age 15 shall bear a full face photograph. The special identification card issued to persons under age 15 shall be readily distinguishable from a driver's license and from other special identification cards issued by the Department. Such cards shall clearly indicate that it does not authorize the person to whom it is issued to drive a motor vehicle.
- G. Unless otherwise prohibited by law, a valid Virginia driver's license may be surrendered for a special identification card without the applicant's having to present proof of legal presence as required by § 46.2-328.1 if the Virginia driver's license is unexpired and it has not been revoked, suspended, or cancelled. The special identification card shall be considered a reissue and the expiration date shall be the last day of the month of the surrendered driver's license's month of expiration.
- H. Any personal information, as identified in § 2.2-3801, which is retained by the Department from an application for the issuance of a special identification card is confidential and shall not be divulged to any person, association, corporation, or organization, public or private, except to the legal guardian or the attorney of the applicant or to a person, association, corporation, or organization nominated in writing by the applicant, his legal guardian, or his attorney. This subsection shall not prevent the Department from furnishing the application or any information thereon to any law-enforcement agency.
- I. Any person who uses a false or fictitious name or gives a false or fictitious address in any application for an identification card or knowingly makes a false statement or conceals a material fact or otherwise commits a fraud in any such application shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. However,

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where the name or address is given, or false statement is made, or fact is concealed, or fraud committed, with the intent to purchase a firearm or where the identification card is obtained for the purpose of committing any offense punishable as a felony, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 felony.

J. The Department may promulgate regulations necessary for the effective implementation of the provisions of this section.

K. The Department shall utilize the various communications media throughout the Commonwealth to inform Virginia residents of the provisions of this section and to promote and encourage the public to take advantage of its provisions.

L. The Department shall electronically transmit application information to the Department of State Police, in a format approved by the State Police, for comparison with information contained in the Virginia Criminal Information Network and National Crime Information Center Convicted Sexual Offender Registry Files, at the time of issuance of a special identification card. Whenever it appears from the records of the State Police that a person has failed to comply with the duty to register or reregister pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the State Police shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person made application for the special identification card.

M. When requested by the applicant, and upon presentation of a signed statement by a licensed physician confirming the applicant's condition, the Department shall indicate on the applicant's special identification card that the applicant has any condition listed in subsection M of § 46.2-342.

2. That the provisions of this act shall become effective on July 1, 2014, except that § 46.2-203.2 created by this act shall become effective on January 1, 2015.

Dear Chair Korman and Committee Members:

The Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) supports House Bill 707 as an important customer service and safety reform.

HB 707 would require the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) to collaborate with certain groups to design a designator indicating a nonapparent disability on a Maryland driver's license, identification card, or moped operator's permit (DL/ID). The designator would be available to any applicant who chooses to voluntarily request it for the DL/ID issued by the MVA, so it is visible on the product when the holder displays it or hands it to another person.

According to an American Association of Motor Vehicles Administrators (AAMVA) survey in April 2024, at least 12 states and the District of Columbia offer DL/ID holders in those jurisdictions the option to place an indicator for a nonapparent disability on the DL/ID. Utah also offers a sticker that can be placed on a DL/ID. AAMVA does not presently have a set design standard for a nonapparent disability indicator but regularly updates a "best practices" design guide in addition to federal guidelines and requirements for certain design elements required or recommended for DL/ID issuance in the United States.

HB 707 will provide a valuable indicator for Marylanders who choose to add the indicator to their DL/ID while providing flexibility to the MVA for design and future updates potentially needed. It further ensures the MVA will not refer those requesting an indicator for review by the Medical Advisory Board, while still allowing an individual to self-report.

The legislation further prohibits the MVA from sharing information related to the nonapparent disability indicator with an insurance company or the Maryland Insurance Administration. This will require the MVA to create an insurance-only version of a driving record to comply. As written, HB 707 does not otherwise restrict use of disability information in a driving record for any other use required or authorized under § 4-320 of the General Provisions Article. As a physical indicator placed on a DL/ID, the designator will also be visible to any person or place of business that requires verification or viewing of the physical product.

My name is Richard Keith Kaplowitz. I am a resident of District 3, Frederick County. I am submitting this testimony in support of HB#/0707, Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law)

The word 'disability' might call to mind an image of someone who uses a wheelchair, crutch or other mobility devices. Why? Because these mobility devices are visual indicators that a person is disabled. But many disabilities are not visually discernible. In fact, the *majority* of disabilities are non-apparent. And yet, this kind of non-visible disability, known as a non-apparent disability, is a concept unfamiliar to much of the nondisabled population. Consequently, people with non-apparent disabilities face discrimination just as those who are visibly disabled do.

Some of the most common non-apparent disabilities are Alzheimer's, anxiety and/or depression, arthritis, Inflammatory Bowel Disease, Deafness, diabetes, epilepsy, fibromyalgia, post-traumatic stress disorder, attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder/attention deficit disorder (ADHD/ADD), traumatic brain injury, Usher syndrome, bipolar disorder, cystic fibrosis, and multiple sclerosis. ¹

This bill will ensure equal non ableist treatment of persons with non-apparent disabilities by both law enforcement officers, and in some cases, by members of the general public during interactions with people with this condition.

It will accomplish this goal by requiring that an original and renewal application for a license, an identification card, or a moped operator's permit allow an applicant to choose to indicate on the document the applicant's nonapparent disability. The process for notification to someone viewing those documents will be satisfied by requiring the Motor Vehicle Administration to ensure that a certain license, identification card, or moped operator's permit include a notation of a nonapparent disability. It will increase public safety for non-apparent disabled individuals through requiring the immediate implementation of training for law enforcement concerning interactions with persons with nonapparent disabilities.

We've created an inclusive and supportive environment where individuals can Live, Grow, Work, and Thrive.

Humanity and empowerment are the questions that are put forth before you. Every individual should have the right to identify their disability if they choose and to have supportive documentation to include them in their independent living. With this opportunity, individuals who choose to have the notation can feel safe and respected.



The National Children's Center (NCC), a unique non-profit organization established in 1958, serves over 600 infants, children, and adults with and without disabilities in the Silver Spring metropolitan region. Our comprehensive programs span from infancy to senior years and aim to bridge education, poverty, and health gaps. Over 70% of our participants are diagnosed with a disability, and our programs provide crucial support through our Early Learning and Intervention Center and Community Support Programs.

At NCC, 15% of individuals utilize transportation for school and employment, while 85% participate in the Community Day Program as part of the person-centered approach to addressing their needs. Persons supported can engage in employment readiness services, which include career assessments and step-by-step job support along their journey.

The Community Support Services, including residential and Day Programs, provide services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. They are matched with a dedicated Direct Support Professional to aid in their daily activities, enhancing their sense of well-being and independence. Individuals in our residential housing program learn life skills, such as how to safely utilize public transportation.

Persons Supported and their families look to our expertise concerning advocacy outreach efforts related to accessibility and accommodations. We respect each person's right to decide how their abilities are documented. However, systemic ableism can create barriers for individuals not given the choice to have their disability identified. We want to ensure that dignity and accuracy are at the forefront of challenging these barriers and encourage empowerment for individuals to say how their disabilities (invisible) are acknowledged through documentation.

On behalf of NCC, I am grateful for the opportunity to speak before you today. I would also like to express our deep appreciation for the Maryland General Assembly, which has been instrumental in ensuring access to services and programs for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities to have a meaningful and quality life. The Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland offers its strong and favorable support for House Bill 707 (HB 707) - Eric's ID Law. This bill ensures that individuals with non-apparent disabilities can voluntarily indicate their condition on their driver's license, identification card, or moped operator's permit. It mandates that the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) include this notation upon request, prohibits the disclosure of this information to insurance companies, and requires law enforcement training on interacting with individuals with such disabilities. HB 707 is a necessary step toward improving public safety, disability awareness, and equitable access to accommodations in law enforcement and emergency situations. HB 707 is a 2025 legislative priority for the Black Caucus.

Studies have consistently shown that Black Americans face disparities in healthcare access and disability recognition, leading to underdiagnosis and inadequate accommodations for conditions such as autism, ADHD, PTSD, and other non-apparent disabilities. According to the National Institutes of Health (NIH), Black children are five times less likely to receive early intervention services for developmental disabilities compared to their white counterparts, despite similar prevalence rates. Additionally, a report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) found that Black individuals are more likely to experience misdiagnosis or delayed diagnosis for conditions such as epilepsy, traumatic brain injuries, and mental health disorders, which can impact their interactions with law enforcement.

In Maryland, the Governor's Office of Crime Prevention and Policy reported that Black individuals make up 32% of the state's population but 43% of traffic stops, some of which escalate due to misunderstandings linked to cognitive or sensory disabilities. Ensuring that law enforcement officers are trained to recognize and appropriately interact with individuals with non-apparent disabilities is critical for preventing miscommunication, unnecessary escalation, and wrongful detainment. The notation provided under HB 707 can serve as a de-escalation tool, offering officers essential context while protecting individuals' rights.

Moreover, research from the Maryland Department of Disabilities shows that Black Marylanders with disabilities face higher rates of unemployment and economic hardship, making access to proper accommodations—including in transportation and identification—a matter of racial and economic justice. By allowing individuals to voluntarily disclose their non-apparent disabilities, HB 707 ensures that they receive appropriate considerations in situations where their disability might not be immediately recognizable, such as traffic stops or emergency medical responses. For these reasons, the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland strongly supports HB 707.

My name is Katie York (they/them), and I am a community advocate and organizer. I have worked in higher education for over fifteen years. However, my proudest title is that of "parent." Both my child and I have a non-apparent disability.

I am Autistic. I personally understand how scary it can be to worry that your normal behavior might look suspicious to those who do not know you, especially police. It is heartbreaking to think someone might mistake my not looking them in the eye as a sign I am lying to them, or that my "stimming" (behaviors meant to calm me when I am nervous or stressed, like rocking or tapping my hands) might signal to someone I am under the influence or otherwise a danger to myself and/or others. I sometimes misunderstand what people say, or as clarifying questions that might be perceived as non-compliance.

However, I worry that putting information about an intellectual or developmental disability (IDD) on a license or state ID can open that individual up to additional discrimination. This proposed law is often described in the context of an interaction of a person with an IDD and law enforcement. But individuals may be asked to show a license or state ID in many other situations, such as during the employment process, getting into secure locations (like government buildings here in Annapolis but also their child's school), while traveling, or when opening a bank account. In these types of situations, people viewing the license or ID will not necessarily have any additional training on IDD, but, depending on the final design of the designator, may now know this individual in front of them has an IDD.

Additionally, I believe the true focus should be on providing funding for better training for emergency personnel, especially law enforcement, who across the US are known to harm and kill Disabled people at a higher rate than non-disabled people¹, especially if the individual also holds another historically marginalized identity. For example, Black and other People of Color are more likely to be harmed and killed because of interactions with law enforcement, especially if they are also Disabled. However, I support individual choice and autonomy and understand that despite my personal reservations, people should have the option to include this designator on their license or ID if they wish.

I am requesting the following amendments:

• Clarify in writing that only the individual or their parent/legal guardian can request the IDD designation be added on an ID/license

- Clarify in writing that the designation can be removed from the license at *any time* (not just upon 18th birthday) at the request of the applicant or their parent/legal guardian and there is no fee to get a corrected document if there are no other changes
- Work with existing groups, such as the Ethan Saylor Alliance and self-advocacy groups like People on The Go, to hire multiple people with developmental disability and intellectual disability from various backgrounds to both deliver and regularly update/revise the training
- Require this training annually for all emergency personnel, not just police

While I am suggesting amendments, I want to make it clear that I strongly support the core intent of this bill, which ultimately is keeping people safe and possibly save lives. As one person noted last year in testimony for a previous version of this bill, if this law can safe one person's life, it will be worth it. Thank you for your consideration of both my concerns and proposed amendments to HB0707: Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law). I urge you to return a favorable report.

HB 707: Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law)

Position: Support with Amendments

The Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council (Council) creates change to make it possible for people with developmental disabilities to live the lives they want with the support they need. The Council is led by a diverse group of people with developmental disabilities and family members of people with developmental disabilities.

The Council seeks to ensure that people with developmental disabilities have the same rights, opportunities, choices, and protections as other citizens. We absolutely prioritize the need for people with developmental disabilities to be protected and respected by law enforcement. In fact, our Five-Year State Plan that guides our work, includes two objectives and a variety of activities to support that priority.

There are many strong and diverse opinions about this issue and this bill among people with developmental disabilities and their families. Arguments range from the identification of a disability on a license or identification card will protect people with disabilities by providing necessary information to law enforcement during interactions with people with disabilities, to the deeply held belief that it is not possible to ensure adequate protections or safety for people with disabilities without more training and accountability for law enforcement.

Therefore, the Council can only support HB 707 which allows a person to indicate a nonapparent disability on their license, government identification, or moped operator's permit **IF the following amendments are included:**

- 1. Ensure a person has the ability to remove the indication from a license or government issued identification at any time, and that the information provided cannot be used as the basis for referring someone to the Medical Advisory Board. We appreciate that this is included in the legislation, but we understand the current system used by the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) creates an electronic record, and the information about a person's disability will be forever stored in the system once any information is collected. So, for example, if a parent chooses to indicate a child's nonapparent disability, that information remains on the child's record even as they age and remains even if, at the age of 18, the person no longer wants that information indicated.
 - In 2020, the Maryland General Assembly passed SB885/HB1118 (Ch. 427) to require the Maryland MVA to provide voluntary Developmental Disability Self-Disclosure Cards. These cards may be used by someone with a developmental disability to self-disclose a disability to police. The cards are kept with a person's government issued identification or driver's license. On one side of the card, the person with disabilities can include information about their disability, how they communicate, and any other pertinent information to share with

law enforcement personnel. The cards are designed to signal to officers that the driver has a disability and that they may need to communicate differently. The MVA now has these cards available upon request.

- 2. Include more mandatory training for law enforcement that is consistent across the entire State. In 2015, the Maryland General Assembly passed legislation to create the Ethan Saylor Alliance (ESA) for Self Advocates as Educators. The ESA provides training for members of law enforcement and other public service entities on specific needs of those with developmental and intellectual disabilities. Under the ESA, people with disabilities take the central role in educating and informing law enforcement about the specific needs of those with disabilities and how to safely and supportively interact with people with disabilities. By allowing people with disabilities to lead the trainings, ESA is following best practices in creating change with law enforcement. More needs to be done to fund this best practice and promote people with disabilities to lead trainings with law enforcement.
- 3. **Establish and include specific accountability measures of law enforcement.** Once the required training is completed, the law enforcement officer should be expected to engage with Marylanders with disabilities as they were trained. If they are in violation, penalties or disciplinary measures should be implemented.

The amendments are important to the members of the Council. Our members feel strongly about the need to preserve the rights of people with disabilities so we avoid stigma and targeted victimization. Finally, <u>our members feel strongly that we need to protect people with disabilities who choose not to self-identify. That means if a person with disabilities does not want to use a disability notation on their ID, they should be treated with the same compassion, understanding, and respect as other Marylanders.</u>

Honorable Chairperson, and distinguished members of the Environment and Transportation Committees:

People On the Go of Maryland (POG) is a statewide self-advocacy organization, run for and by those with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities (IDD), and our mission is to promote self advocacy throughout the state.

POG respectfully offers this written testimony opposing HB0707, because the idea that someone's disability information would be documented on their vehicle permit or other form of identification, is disturbing to us.

- 1. It is important to note that, although a non-apparent disability designation is voluntary in theory, once information is on someone's permanent record, it is there permanently.
- 2. We understand the most current version of this bill proposes an option to allow for somebody to delete this designation upon their request. However, it is not clear whether or not the Motor Vehicle Administration's system has been updated to allow for such a deletion. In the past, this information has been permanently kept on the individual's record.
- 3. The MVA is not the only consideration: One must also consider what may happen if this law is passed, and a future legislature decides that all people with disabilities, apparent or not, must have a designation on their drivers license or other identification.
- 4. We understand that the intentions of the supporters of this bill are good. People with disabilities want to have positive interactions with law enforcement, as well as other first responders. However, we believe that passing legislation of this type is not the way to accomplish this.
- 5. We are now living in a time where individuals and minority communities are being targeted and their privacy is being violated. People in our community may

be subjected to greater predatory behavior, if it becomes known by members of the general public that somebody has a designation on their drivers license or ID. Having this information out in the open could potentially create harmful scenarios for people with disabilities.

- 6. According to the research done by POG and other disability rights groups in states where similar laws exist, no data has tracked whether such laws have any positive impact whatsoever in how police and other entities interact with people with disabilities.
- 7. Should this bill become law, police and first responders will expect people with disabilities to have designations on their identifications. People with disabilities who choose not to have a designation on their Driver's license or ID cards, will be treated differently.
- 8. Instead of this legislation, it would be more appropriate to provide additional training for police and other first responders on how to properly interact with the disability community. While the bill, as presently worded, does propose training, the specific training requirements are not outlined, and people with disabilities are not required to be part of the training.
- 9. Finally this legislation is unnecessary, because the MVA blue card legislation, already passed by the general assembly in 2019, allows for an individual to obtain a blue card from the MVA that they can fill out with their details and give to a police officer or first responder in the event of an interaction, without keeping their information in a database and exposing them to further stigma. There also exist alternative forms of identification similar to the blue card, that a person with a disability may buy on their own.

Once again we acknowledge the positive intention of the bill's sponsors, but this is not the solution. We hope you will consider the potential consequences before passing such a bill into law.

Therefore People on the Go advises an unfavorable report on HB0707. Thank you for your time and consideration.

Chair Korman, Vice Chair Boyce, and Members of the Environment and Transportation Committee, please be advised that the Baltimore City Administration (BCA) would like to provide a **letter of information** on House Bill (HB) 707 - Vehicle Laws - Licenses, Identification Cards, and Moped Operator's Permits - Notation of Nonapparent Disability (Eric's ID Law).

HB 707 would provide individuals the option to notate on their licenses, identification cards, or moped operator's permits that they have a nonapparent disability, be that developmental or intellectual. HB 707 would require the administration to conduct outreach and engagement regarding the availability of the notation. The legislation also provides for protections for individuals who elect the notation to not be penalized by insurance providers.

Proponents of HB 707 believe that the bill will provide greater protections during interactions with law enforcement officers. This is because nonapparent disabilities are not immediately perceptible by officers; therefore, self-identification may limit confusion or escalation amongst officers by immediately communicating the challenges faced by or accommodations needed by a member of the public.

Conversely, disability rights advocates who are hesitant towards HB 707 argue that notation may result in individuals living with nonapparent disabilities being unnecessarily judged, discriminated, or defined by a constant public disclosure of their disability. Additionally, the selective notation of disabilities may result in individuals, who choose not to self-identify, being disbelieved by law enforcement officers in encounters where they notify the officer of their disability. Finally, discretionary identification of nonapparent disabilities could transcend into required identification, should law enforcement prefer and advocate for the expansion of the proposed notation system. This may foster further opportunities for discrimination and identification of marginalized identities under the pretext of public safety.

For the above stated reasons, the BCA respectfully request consideration of its <u>letter of information</u> on HB 707, believing the benefits and drawbacks of the legislation must be adequately accounted for. The BCA believes it may be suitable to establish a workgroup to survey the perception, concerns, and needs of various disability advocacy organizations prior to the establishment of the notation system.
