House Bill 0459: Health Insurance - Cancer Screening for Professional Firefighters - Required Coverage

(James "Jimmy" Malone Act)

On behalf of the Maryland Rural Health Association (MRHA), I am writing in strong support of **HB0459**: **Health Insurance – Cancer Screening for Professional Firefighters – Required Coverage (James "Jimmy" Malone Act)**. This critical legislation is an important step forward in safeguarding the health and well-being of the dedicated professional firefighters who serve our communities across Maryland.

Firefighters are at an increased risk for certain types of cancer due to their exposure to toxic substances during fires. Unfortunately, rural communities often face the added challenge of limited access to healthcare services, including specialized cancer screenings.
