

House Bill 519 - Public Health - Hospitals - Parking for Patients

Position: Oppose February 12, 2025 House Health and Government Operations Committee

The University of Maryland Medical System respectfully submits this letter of opposition to House Bill 519 – Public Health – Hospitals – Parking for Patients. House Bill 519 ("HB 519") would require each hospital in the State to provide free parking to each inpatient for the duration of their inpatient stay, and each outpatient for the duration of their appointment.

The University of Maryland Medical System (UMMS) provides primary, urgent, emergency and specialty care at 12 hospitals across the state. The UMMS network includes academic, community and specialty hospitals that together provide 25% of all hospital-based care in Maryland. Our acute care and specialty hospitals are located in 13 counties and Baltimore City, and serve urban, suburban and rural communities.

Parking varies significantly across the hospital system. In several of the suburban and rural hospitals, where the cost of land is substantially lower, parking is available free-of-charge to any visitor, including patients receiving inpatient or outpatient care. In more densely populated areas, such as the campus of the University of Maryland Medical Center in downtown Baltimore, parking is extremely limited and existing parking structures must accommodate thousands of students and faculty in addition to staff, patients and visitors. Finally, in multiple locations, including UM Capital Region Health in Largo, parking is owned and operated by the county or municipal government rather than the hospital.

UMMS estimates that the fiscal impact of the bill would be at least \$4 million in annual revenue loss across the system. This revenue is used to pay any mortgage or lease associated with the parking garage, as well as maintain, repair, and staff each parking garage. There would also be a significant, but indeterminate cost to operationalize a system to allow for free parking (e.g., technology upgrades to integrate with our patient records system, staffing costs for parking management and validation, renegotiation of contracts with third-party parking vendors that manage the facilities, developing and installing signs, etc.).
