Fatal Outcomes (Suicides): a 2.1% rate increase was seen from 2021 to 2022 • 49,476 suicides highest ever for the USA • 14.8 rate (and for 2018) highest since the 1930s

- Average of 1 person every 10.6 minutes killed themselves—1 male every 13.4 minutes, 1 female every 51.5 minutes
- Average of 1 older adult every 50.4 minutes killed themselves; Average of 1 middle aged adult every 33.6 minutes
- Average of 1 young person every 1 hour and 27.0 minutes killed themselves. (If the 502 suicides below age 15 are included, 1 young person every 1 hour and 20.3 minutes)

- 11th ranking cause of death in U.S.—3rd for **young**
- 3.85 male deaths by suicide for each female death by suicide

- Suicide ranks 11th as a cause of death; Homicide ranks 16th

Nonfatal Outcomes (Attempt Survivors§) (figures are estimates):

- 1,236,900 annual attempts in U.S. (using 25:1 ratio) or one attempt every 25.5 seconds
- 2022 SAMHSA study: 1.6 million adults (age 18 and up) and 953,000 adolescents (12-17 years old)
- Translates to 1 every 19.7 seconds for adults and 1 every 33.1 seconds for adolescents
- 25 attempts for every death by suicide for nation (one estimate); 100-200:1 for young; 4:1 for older adults
- 3 female attempts for each male attempt

Postvention (Exposure and Survivors of Suicide Loss)

Exposed (“Affected”) – those who “know” someone personally who has died by suicide † (figures are estimates)

◦Recent (Cerel et al., 2019) research-based estimate suggests that for each suicide death → 135 people are *exposed* (for 2022, 6.7 million annually) – among the exposed there are subgroups with a variety of effect levels (see Cerel et al., 2014) – as many as 40-50% of the population have been exposed to suicide in their lifetime based on a 2016 representative sample’s results (Feigelman et al., 2017)

Suicide Loss Survivors (those bereaved of suicide - definition below): † (figures are estimates) [Subgroup of “Exposed” above]

◦Survivors of Suicide Loss = experience high levels of distress for a considerable length of time after exposure (Jordan & McIntosh, 2011)

◦Among those exposed to a death by suicide, *more than 6* experience a major life disruption (loss survivors; a low, non-research based estimate see Cerel et al. 2020)

- *If each suicide has devastating effects and intimately affects > 6 other people, there are over 296,000 loss survivors a year*
- Based on the 967,031 suicides from 1998 through 2022, therefore, the number of *survivors of suicide loss* in the U.S. is *more than 5.8 million* (1 of every 57 Americans in 2022); number grew by more than 296,856 in 2022
- If there is a suicide every 10.6 minutes, then there are *more than 6* new loss survivors every 10.6 minutes as well
