Chairperson, Vice Chair, and Members of the Judiciary Committee,

My name is James Orman, and I am an Autistic adult and an advocate for neurodivergent rights. I am here today in **strong support** of House Bill 940 because a truly just legal system must take the **whole person** into account—including disability when determining accountability and consequences.

I run an organization for Autistic adults and other neurodivergent people, and I have listened to the experiences of many neurodivergent individuals who have faced **inequitable treatment** simply because their disabilities were not understood or accommodated. I have heard from individuals who were penalized for **Autistic traits such as difficulty with verbal communication, sensory overload, or differences in social interaction**. I have heard about families who struggled to get courts to recognize how a person's disability **directly influenced their actions**—and how, too often, the system responded with **punishment rather than support**.

House Bill 940 is not about excusing criminal behavior. It is about **ensuring fairness** and allowing the courts to **recognize when a defendant's actions were a direct manifestation of their disability**. This bill ensures that individuals with Autism or intellectual disabilities are given a **more equitable chance at rehabilitation**, rather than being funneled into a system that was never designed with neurodivergent people in mind.

The justice system already considers **mental health**, **trauma**, **and youthfulness** as mitigating factors. Disability must be part of this conversation, too. Ignoring its impact leads to disproportionately harsh outcomes for those who simply process the world differently.

I urge this committee to pass House Bill 940 and take a meaningful step toward making Maryland's justice system **more just, more humane, and more equitable for all**. Thank you for your time and consideration.
