IN SUPPORT OF **HB 556 DECRIMINALIZATION OF PARAPHERNALIA**

Chair Clippinger, Vice Chair Bartlett, and Honorable Delegates, thank you for reading my brief statement.

I strongly support of HB 556 because it will help save lives.

I heartily commend Delegate Simpson for sponsoring HB556 because changing the law to protect the lives of persons with substance abuse disorders remains so profoundly hard. Even in 2025, too many people do not see the humanity of persons who have been stigmatized as "drug addicts" or "junkies" for so long.

This bill will decriminalize sterile equipment that is used to ingest drugs and thus substantially reduce the risk of infection from HIV and hepatitis.

Not only will enabling persons with substance use disorders to possess this sterile equipment without the fear of arrest and prosecution (saving the costs of unnecessary criminal justice processing), this bill, if enacted, will reduce public expenditures for health care by reducing the number of persons who suffer from these diseases.

The legal availability of sterile injection equipment dose not encourage people to continue patterns of addiction.

I urge a favorable report.
