Penalty (Sacred Places Safety Act)

FAVORABLE oral and written testimony

Good day, Chairman Clippenger, Vice Chair Bartlett, and Committee members,

My name is Angelica Marrero, and I am testifying on behalf of The Maryland Emergency Nurses Association <u>in favor</u> of **HB 1308 / SB 1010** Crime of Violence – Medical Facilities and Places of Worship – Penalty (Sacred Places Safety Act).

Thank you to the sponsors for this commonsense bill that supports **ZERO TOLERANCE** for violence in medical facilities and places of worship.

I would like to address violence in the medical facilities. Studies show that ER nurses and staff experience a violent event every two months. (1) Emergency room nurses often experience all forms of violence including emotional, verbal, physical and sexual. For example:

- Upon entering a patient's room, without warning, the patient suddenly and violently kicked a large plastic garbage can at me and began yelling and cursing at me.
- A patient threw their cell phone at my chest while I was walking past them, leaving me with a large purple bruise.
- A patient approached the triage nurse, without saying a word, punched her in the face.

HB 1308 / SB 1010 would establish respect for this sacred place where vulnerable patients come to receive health care. Nurses, the backbone of healthcare, need and deserve protection from violence while performing their live-saving work.

When violence in healthcare facilities occurs, it endangers everyone present. Staff, patients, and visitors get injured. The violence interferes with patient care and can cause detrimental delays. When violence happens in emergency rooms it is especially difficult for patients because these patients are already coping with the longest ER wait times of any state in the nation. (2)

Maryland's emergency nurses thank you in advance for a favorable bipartisan review.

## Prevalence of Workplace Violence in Health Care/Emergency Departments

Health care workers account for



EMERGENCY of violence-related injuries requiring missed work days.





ED workers are exposed to **significant rates** of **physical** and **verbal abuse**. Under-reporting of workplace violence in the ED is common and contributes to the difficulty in accurately tracking violence.\*\*





About 31 percent of hospital RNs said that they faced an increase in workplace violence during the pandemic.









- The estimated cost of workplace violence in health care is billion annually.

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
