Honorable Members of the House Judiciary Committee,

3. HB 1349 Aligns with National Privacy and Airspace Concerns

• While FAA regulations govern national airspace, states retain the right to regulate privacy violations and property intrusions.

- Many other states, including California, Florida, and Texas, have enacted similar laws restricting drone surveillance to protect residents from harassment and privacy invasion.
- Maryland should **join these states in setting clear protections for its citizens** without conflicting with federal aviation regulations.

4. HB 1349 Strikes a Balance Between Security and Innovation

- The bill ensures that drones remain a valuable tool for commercial and recreational use while protecting against bad actors who misuse drone technology.
- Protecting property rights **enhances public trust in drone operations**, supporting the responsible growth of the industry.

Conclusion

House Bill 1349 is a reasonable, necessary, and well-balanced approach to modernizing privacy protections in response to evolving drone technology. It ensures that lawful drone users can continue operating responsibly, while protecting Maryland residents from harassment and unauthorized surveillance.
