

**Testimony on:** HB1323 Education – Public Schools – Asian American History Teacher Professional Development and Resources

Chair Atterbeary, Vice Chair Wilkins, and the members of the Ways and Means Committee,

My name is Oorja Munot and I am representing the Asian American Progressive Student Union to write and express our strong support for Maryland HB1323, which seeks to enhance professional development opportunities for educators by incorporating Asian American history training programs into the state's Continuing Professional Education Development program. This initiative is a crucial step toward ensuring that Maryland's educators have access to high-quality, vetted resources that will enrich the curriculum and provide students with a more inclusive and accurate understanding of American history.

Learning and growing up as an Asian American student in Maryland, I often felt a disconnect between my identity and the history I was taught in school. The textbooks rarely mentioned the struggles and contributions of Asian Americans, and when they did, it was often reduced to a few paragraphs at best. No student should have to seek out their history on their own and I truly believe it should be an integral part of what we all learn.

It is vital that our students learn about the past of all of our American people. The teaching of US history is not complete without the inclusion of the Asian Americans that helped build this country into what it is today. Without the inclusion of Asian American studies in school curriculums, Maryland students grow up unknowing of the many contributions that Asian Americans have had on our country, including their involvement with the advancement of Civil Rights. Students also fail to learn about many important historical events, such as the internment of Japanese Americans, the massacre of Chinese immigrants in Los Angeles, and the Chinese Exclusion Act.

Studies show that a diverse and inclusive curriculum leads to higher student engagement, improved academic outcomes, and a greater sense of belonging for students from all backgrounds. By investing in educator training, we can ensure that future generations develop a broader, more accurate understanding of our nation's diverse history.
