RE: Homeschool Students in Maryland – Right to Play

To Whom it May Concern:

My name is Macrina Zdobysz, and I am a homeschooler in Maryland at the high school level. I was recently informed that there is a bill being presented to the Maryland state legislature that would require Maryland public high schools to allow homeschoolers within their residing district to participate in public school sports. As a homeschooler, I fully support this action for the following reasons:

First, this would allow homeschoolers to create and maintain good overall lifestyles. Participation in sports programs can contribute to the mental and physical growth of students. Mental growth includes sports analogies that can relate to school. For example, when your team is down by a few points, you will want to strive and play your best to help your team win. This relates to school because students will then want to strive to be their best on a personal level, thereby working hard to increase their grades to achieve a "win". Physical growth can lead to a healthier and more active individual. For example, allowing participation in Maryland public school sports at a high school level would allow homeschoolers to strive to take better care of their overall health. I truly believe that a healthy and active society leads to a more productive society.

Second, passing a bill to allow homeschoolers to participate in public school sports would widen the horizon of opportunities available to these students. Many college scouts attend high school games to see how specific students/players perform. Depending on the performance of that student/player, that college might consider offering them a scholarship. Because homeschoolers are currently not permitted to play in public school sports programs, the chances for this opportunity are decreased.
