## TESTIMONY

**Bill**: HB 907 – Property Tax Credit - Urban Agricultural Property – Alterations

**Position:** Oppose

## **Reason for Position:**

The Maryland Municipal League opposes House Bill 907, which would substantially alter the existing property tax credit uses for urban agriculture. The League has long supported the creation and use of optional tax credits. However, when existing optional tax credits are altered, they can have a significant impact beyond the uses envisioned when local governments enacted them. This is the case for HB 907.

The tax credit currently limited to crop production activities on at least one-eighth of an acre and not more than 5 acers would now be expanded to real property used in the production of value-added agriculture products – including wineries, breweries, and other commercial structures – on any parcel that isn't assessed as agriculture land.

Further, new provisions of the bill in (c)(2)(ii) would force a jurisdiction to provide the credit for these uses even if they wished to repeal the "optional" tax credit, by instituting a 1-year notice and appeals process (unclear how that would work).

MML believes it would be more appropriate to establish a new optional tax credit for the uses envisioned in HB 907, so that jurisdictions can weigh the pros and cons with constituents in local legislative chambers prior to their enactment.

For these reasons, the Maryland Municipal League respectfully requests an *unfavorable* report on House Bill 907.
