This bill answers a threefold call:

- 1. It restores dignity to veterans by granting them the opportunity to achieve an essential educational milestone.
- 2. It highlights the universal importance of education as a tool for empowerment and opportunity.
- 3. It levels the playing field for all who choose to serve, ensuring their sacrifices are honored equally.

HB0587 seeks to honor those who served in military conflict acknowledging that they left school to ensure that other citizens are allowed the freedom to attend school..... It's monumental.

While I support the spirit of HB0587, I feel it can be enhanced. As a former correctional officer for our nation's only max security military run prison. I can tell you that, sometimes soldiers fall off their path, they make poor judgement....oftentimes because they entered this disciplined space from areas that are disadvantaged. The military isn't for everyone, some have trouble adjusting, some encounter systematic barriers, situations out of their control that forced them out of service. But they served. So my request is that this opportunity for a high school diploma be extended to ALL who attempted to give up their freedom and school attainment in service for the freedom of all citizens. I ask that you consider a general language (removal of the word honorable) that acknowledges any soldier that left high school to serve during the military conflicts listed (serving during the conflict means those who left basic training and served at a duty station.

Because really only 1 percent, some say 7 percent of Americans enter service and giving up life for another isn't a small task. Thank you for thinking of the human that existed before putting on the uniform and honoring the soldier. Whether through draft or volunteer, citizens leave their families, jobs, hopes and promises made to self and others. They come home to new people, some whole and others missing parts of themselves, bodies and mind. While they don't often come back the same as they were before. One thing we do as soldiers is think...we think a lot....good times, challenging times, veterans are full of memories of what life could have been like. HB0587 is an opportunity to ease their minds about one milestone, it gives them one less could have, should have, would have, thing to think about.
