Dear Chairwoman Atterbeary, Delegate Delegate Bernice Mireku-North, Delegate Denise Roberts, Delegate Kent Roberson, Delegate Chao Wu, and Delegate Jessica Feldmark,

I am Alita-Geri Carter, the mother of two disabled children, a pediatric nurse practitioner, and the owner of Qualequity Access, LLC a consultancy that advocates for quality, equity, access, and accessibility in healthcare and education. I write to express my **support for House Bill 0504** with necessary **amendments** to address the significant **decrease in perpupil funding**, which will have broad consequences for all students in Maryland's public schools but will **disproportionately impact students with disabilities and special education services**.

According to the US Department of Education's Dispute Resolution Dashboard, Maryland ranks 9th in the nation for the highest number of special education-related litigation, state complaints, and requests for mediation. These disputes often stem from challenges in securing adequate supports and services for students with disabilities, an issue that would likely worsen with reduced funding per pupil.

Moreover, Maryland ranks **20th in the nation for reading proficiency**, according to a January 29, 2025, press release from Maryland Matters. This data underscores **systemic challenges** within our state's general and special education systems, which would only be exacerbated by further funding reductions.

Specifically, **Prince George's County** is one of the districts facing the greatest disparities. Data from the University of Wisconsin's Population Health Institute on school funding adequacy for 2024 shows that **Prince George's County would need to spend nearly an additional \$10,000 per pupil** to reach the U.S. average in student test scores. **A decrease in the target per-pupil foundation amount would only widen this gap and further disadvantage the state's most vulnerable students.** 

While HB 0504 includes important provisions for advancing **educator recruitment and retention**, the **decline in per-pupil funding** risks undermining these efforts by straining school resources, reducing the availability of individualized supports, and **compromising** 



special education services mandated under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

For these reasons, I urge you to **amend Bill HB 0504 to ensure that per-pupil funding remains adequate and equitable**, especially for students with disabilities who rely on specialized services to access their education fully. Maryland must prioritize funding strategies that support **inclusive education**, **intervention programs**, **and evidence-based literacy initiatives** to improve outcomes for **all students**.

Thank you for your time and leadership on this critical issue. I appreciate your consideration and look forward to your support of amendments that will ensure Maryland's public schools can fulfill their mission to serve **every student equitably**.

Thank you for your time and consideration. I ask for a favorable disposition with amendment for this bill. I welcome the opportunity to discuss this matter further and urge you to stand with Maryland families supporting education investments and impactful legislation.
