

Testimony in Support of HB1430

Maryland Public Charter School Program – School Facilities – Funding

House Appropriations Committee

March 11, 2026

Good afternoon, Chair and members of the committee,

My name is Martice White, and I am the parent/guardian of a student at Phoenix International School of the Arts La Plata, MD. Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support of HB1430**.

My family chose our charter school because we wanted an opportunity for our son to grow academically and express his passion for music. We also appreciate the smaller learning environment. We appreciate the Phoenix International School of the Arts vision to envision a generation of informed and highly capable youth taking equal stake in the global economy and community no matter their background. For my child, this school has been wonderful helping him grow academically and socially. The book club has been an incredible help with my child's reading scores.

Public charter schools provide families like mine with meaningful educational opportunities and access. They give parents the ability to choose a learning environment that truly fits their child's needs.

But while charter schools are public schools serving public school students, they often do not receive the same support for facilities that traditional public schools receive.

That means many charter schools must pay for building costs out of the same funding meant for classroom instruction.

School leaders are often forced to make difficult choices between investing in students and maintaining the building. Sometimes the decision becomes whether to repair the roof or buy new library books, whether to upgrade heating systems or invest in science equipment, or whether to improve classrooms or pay for basic building maintenance.

That is not a choice any school should have to make.

The \$1,600 per pupil facilities funding proposed in HB1430 would help create a more equitable system. It would ensure charter schools have dedicated support for maintaining safe, functional learning spaces so more resources can go into the classroom rather than toward the classroom building.

For families like mine, this bill is about fairness and opportunity. Charter school students deserve the same access to safe, appropriate facilities as any other public school student in Maryland.

When schools are not forced to spend classroom dollars on building costs, they can invest more in teachers, learning materials, student programs, and academic support.

Every child deserves a school environment that supports their learning and their future.
