SB 101 - Higher Education - Loan Repayment and Scholarships for Correctional Officers

Position: Favorable

The Maryland Association of Community Colleges (MACC), representing Maryland's 16 community colleges, supports **SB 101**. This bill expands eligibility for existing State loan repayment and scholarship programs to include correctional officers, recognizing their important role in Maryland's public safety workforce and supporting their access to higher education and career advancement.

Maryland's community colleges educate and train many students pursuing careers in corrections and related public safety fields, as well as individuals already employed in these professions who seek additional credentials or degrees. Correctional officers often juggle demanding work schedules with family responsibilities while pursuing education, and access to financial aid can be a key factor in their ability to enroll and complete postsecondary programs. Expanding these programs for correctional officers helps reduce financial barriers and supports ongoing professional development within the corrections workforce.

Expanding eligibility for these programs also supports recruitment and retention efforts in correctional facilities by offering educational incentives that encourage long-term service and workforce stability. SB 101 builds on well-established scholarship and loan repayment structures and extends them in a manner consistent with current State policy. Accordingly, MACC urges the Committee to issue a **FAVORABLE** vote on **SB 101**.

Chairman Barnes, Vice Chair Kaiser, and the Honorable Members of the Appropriations Committee,

The Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC) respectfully requests a favorable report on Senate Bill 101 — Higher Education – Loan Repayment and Scholarships for Correctional Officers. This legislation expands existing State loan repayment and scholarship programs for public safety professionals to include correctional officers, recognizing their essential role in maintaining public safety and supporting community stability

Senate Bill 101 would amend current law to make correctional officers eligible for the Maryland Loan Assistance Repayment Program (LARP) for Police Officers and Probation Agents and the Maryland Police Officers and Probation Agents Scholarship Program. By extending these important financial incentives to correctional officers, the State strengthens recruitment and retention in a field that is critical to the safety and well-being of Maryland communities.

Public safety personnel, including correctional officers, serve on the front lines of justice and rehabilitation, often under challenging conditions. Access to loan repayment and scholarship support can lower barriers to entering and remaining in these careers, ultimately contributing to a more effective and stable public safety workforce.

MHEC supports the intent of Senate Bill 101 and appreciates the opportunity to expand access to existing scholarship and loan-repayment programs for correctional officers. To ensure successful implementation, the Commission notes the following considerations:

- Effective and timely implementation will benefit from additional staffing and system resources to support expanded eligibility, maintain program integrity, and ensure accurate and equitable award administration.
- Expanding eligibility to include an additional career pathway increases the number of individuals who may apply for existing scholarship and loan repayment programs. While Senate Bill 101 does not increase the total funding available for the scholarship or LARP,



expanding eligibility may increase demand and competition within the existing funding structure.

These considerations are provided to facilitate a smooth implementation and to maintain efficient, transparent program administration for all eligible applicants, without resulting in long-term fiscal operating costs.
