**Testimony for Senate Bill 98
Baltimore County School Board Nominating Commission – Membership – Alterations
Before the Education, Energy, and Environment Committee
February 18, 2026**

Good afternoon, Chair Feldman and members of the committee.

Senate Bill 98 is a new bill expanding our School Board Nominating Commission and staggering the terms of the Commission's members.

The Baltimore County School Board Nominating Commission is responsible for requesting applications, reviewing candidates, and ultimately nominating candidates for the Board of Education.¹ Eight members of the Commission, one from each legislative district, are appointed by the Governor, and one at-large member is appointed by the County Executive. But because the Board of Education touches every facet of the education system, there are currently 10 members appointed by organizations like the Teachers' Association of Baltimore County, Towson University, and the Baltimore County Branch of the NAACP, to name a few.

Although the Baltimore County Chamber of Commerce was one of those organizations appointing a member of the Commission, it unfortunately closed operations in August of last year.² To maintain a connection with the business community, SB 98 replaces that organization with the Greater Baltimore County Chamber of Commerce as an appointing organization.

SB 98 also proposes adding two new members to the Nominating Commission, one appointed by the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Local 3 Council 434 and one by the Citizens' Advisory Council for Gifted and Talented Education.

AFSCME Local 434 represents Baltimore County Public Schools employees in roles like food service, transportation, and building operations. Their perspectives based on day-to-day operations

are crucial to evaluating Board of Education candidates who understand exactly what it takes to deliver high-quality education to over 100,000 students³ every single day.

The Citizens' Advisory Council for Gifted and Talented Education is a community group supporting the County's gifted and talented educational efforts. They share resources, provide forums for discussion, and advocate for programs that enable students to develop to their full potential.⁴ Their presence on the Nominating Commission would represent the interests of gifted and talented learners across the County.

SB 98 would also stagger the terms of the members of the Nominating Commission. Currently, all members serve concurrent four year terms. Under SB 98, half of the members' terms would terminate in 2028, and the other half in 2030. Preventing complete turnover, this staggering preserves the institutional knowledge of the Commission and maintains stability.

I urge the committee to issue a favorable report on Senate Bill 98.
