



**TESTIMONY FOR SB0380 – Physicians – Licensing – Internationally Trained Physicians  
– FAVORABLE**

Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

My name is Jessica Gorski, and I am submitting this testimony in strong support of SB0380 on behalf of the Maryland Legislative Coalition. We are a statewide coalition of grassroots organizations representing more than 30,000 Marylanders across every legislative district. Our mission is to promote legislation that strengthens education, healthcare, public safety, environmental protection, and social justice—ensuring that every Marylander has access to the resources and opportunities needed to thrive.

SB0380 advances that mission by addressing a critical and growing challenge in Maryland’s healthcare system: the shortage of qualified physicians, particularly in underserved and rural communities.

This bill authorizes the State Board of Physicians, beginning in 2028, to issue a time-limited license—up to three years—to internationally trained physicians who meet rigorous educational, training, and professional standards. It also requires the Board to establish clear regulations and a pathway to full licensure, ensuring that Maryland maintains high-quality care while expanding access to experienced medical professionals.

These provisions are both necessary and urgent.

Maryland, like much of the nation, faces persistent physician shortages across primary care, behavioral health, and specialty fields. Internationally trained physicians constitute a highly skilled, deeply experienced workforce—many of whom already live in Maryland but are unable to practice because administrative and structural barriers do not align with their training or professional backgrounds.

SB0380 removes unnecessary obstacles while preserving strong safeguards. The bill requires that eligible physicians:

- Hold a medical degree from a World Health Organization–recognized institution,
- Have completed at least two years of postgraduate training equivalent to U.S. residency standards,
- Have practiced medicine for at least five of the past seven years,
- Maintain good standing with their home-country medical regulatory authority, and
- Hold a valid certification from the Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates.

These are not shortcuts. They are evidence-based, internationally recognized indicators of competence and professionalism.

By creating a structured, supervised pathway for internationally trained physicians to serve Maryland patients, SB0380 strengthens our healthcare workforce, reduces wait times, expands access to care, and improves health outcomes—especially in communities that have long struggled to recruit and retain physicians.

This bill aligns squarely with the mission of the Maryland Legislative Coalition. It promotes equitable access to healthcare, supports public safety by ensuring timely medical treatment, and reflects Maryland’s commitment to fairness, inclusion, and community well-being.

We urge the Committee to support this thoughtful, practical, and urgently needed legislation.
