Delmarva Chicken Association (DCA) is the trade association representing the meat-chicken growers, companies, and allied business members on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, Delaware, and the Eastern Shore of Virginia. Collectively, we contribute more than \$5.4 billion to Maryland’s economy and pay more than \$254 million in state and local taxes. SB 849 would establish critical consumer protection requirements for agricultural equipment, benefiting farmers and consumers across the State. As such, we support SB 849 and respectfully urge a favorable committee report.

Our growers rely on a wide variety of equipment to maintain lawful, efficient, and productive operations. This includes fans, feeders, heating apparatus, and watering systems. Even temporary malfunctions or defects of this equipment can result in massive mortality events, as flocks are extremely susceptible to changes in temperature. This can result in a substantial loss of income for farmers.

SB 849 establishes necessary protections and recourse for Maryland’s chicken growers and agricultural community who require reliable, functional equipment for their income and animal health and welfare. The Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA) respectfully submits this letter in support of *Senate Bill 849 - Consumer Protection - Agricultural Equipment Warranties*.

Modern agricultural operations rely on increasingly sophisticated and costly machinery to maintain productivity. Senate Bill 849 offers critical protections that will provide parity to vehicle “lemon law” and offer farmers confidence in their substantial investments into advanced and expensive equipment. While a vast majority of agricultural equipment, similar to motor vehicles, do not run into issues with faulty manufacturing defects, this bill enables farmers to collect damages and avoid extensive downtime in an extremely time-sensitive industry.

In agriculture, a mechanical failure during peak planting or harvest windows can result in devastating financial losses that extend far beyond the cost of the repair itself. By establishing a clear statutory framework for equipment warranties, this legislation ensures that Maryland producers have the same consumer protections as any other vehicle owner, safeguarding the high-capital investments necessary to keep our state’s number one industry moving forward.

For these reasons, the Maryland Department of Agriculture urges a favorable report on SB 849.

The Consumer Protection Division of the Office of the Attorney General submits the following written testimony to support Senate Bill 849 submitted by Senator Jason C. Gallion. Senate Bill 849 creates a lemon law for new agricultural equipment and provides that, if repairs under the warranty are needed for something that substantially impairs the value of the equipment, and the manufacturer is unable to make repairs, it shall replace the equipment or refund the purchase price, less a reasonable allowance for use of the vehicle and any damage caused by the consumer.

A lemon law for new agricultural equipment is designed to protect farmers and ranchers when newly purchased machinery repeatedly fails to perform as warranted. Unlike many other consumer products, farm equipment is mission-critical and time-sensitive. Planting and harvesting operate within narrow weather windows. If a new tractor, combine, or planter fails repeatedly, it may cause losses that far exceed the equipment's daily rental value. In addition, agricultural equipment is very expensive, so farmers typically finance these purchases, making it difficult to obtain a replacement in the event the equipment fails.

The remedies currently provided under agricultural manufacturer warranties are often insufficient. Repairs may not permanently solve the defect and downtime compensation is usually inadequate. In addition, there is an imbalance of power since manufacturers generally

have greater legal resources as well as greater control over diagnostic tools and parts. Generally, individual farmers lack comparable leverage, leaving them unable to easily repair or replace a faulty product.

A healthy agricultural environment supports economic stability. Equipment failures can ripple beyond a single farm - local suppliers, seasonal labor and food supply chains are all negatively affected when a farmer is unable to properly tend to their crops. However, strong consumer protections in this sector will help maintain broader economic stability.

For the reasons set forth, the Consumer Protection Division requests that the Finance Committee issue a favorable report on this bill.

The Maryland Grain Producers Association (MGPA) represents the interests of grain farmers who grow corn, wheat, barley, and sorghum throughout Maryland. MGPA strongly supports Senate Bille 849, which would provide critical protections for Maryland farmers who rely on agricultural equipment for their operations.

Senate Bille 849 mandates that manufacturers of agricultural equipment must replace or accept the return of equipment if a material defect is identified during the warranty period and the manufacturer is unable to repair or correct any defect or condition that substantially impairs the use and market value of the equipment.

Agricultural equipment is costly, and the expenses associated with its operation and maintenance have increased by 41% over the past two decades. This equipment is vital to nearly every aspect of farming, including field preparation, planting, treatment, harvesting, and hauling. While new equipment is typically covered by a manufacturer's warranty, farmers are often required to have repairs performed by the manufacturer's designated service providers, who are not always readily accessible. Farming is a time-sensitive industry, and farmers should not be burdened with having to continue using defective equipment simply because they cannot afford to replace it.

Senate Bille 849 would provide much-needed protections for farmers, similar to the "lemon law" protections available to vehicle owners. It ensures that farmers are not stuck with faulty equipment that hampers their productivity and profitability.

MGPA urges lawmakers to support Senate Bille 849 and ensure that Maryland farmers have the necessary protections to keep their operations running smoothly.
