HB 641 – Election Law – Curbside Voting – Pilot Program

Disability Rights Maryland (DRM) is the Protection & Advocacy agency in Maryland, federally mandated to advance the civil rights of people with disabilities. DRM advocates for Marylanders with disabilities to fully participate in the electoral process by ensuring equal and equitable access to the ballot box

DRM supports House Bill 641, which creates an opportunity for individuals with certain disabilities and older adults to cast their ballots on Election Day without having to exit their vehicles. This bill would serve to provide an accommodation for those who have difficulty walking or standing. The bill requires the State Board of Elections (SBE) to establish a curbside voting pilot program in three Maryland counties. The SBE will analyze data and community feedback from these counties to assess the feasibility of expanding curbside voting statewide in future elections. By increasing accessible voting methods, this bill broadens voting opportunities for voters with disabilities and mobility challenges.

Curbside voting is not a new concept; it has been successfully implemented in numerous states as a means to promote inclusivity in elections.¹ This pilot program will provide valuable data on how curbside voting can be effectively integrated into Maryland's electoral system. Mobility impairments are the most common disability among voters with disabilities. Providing additional accommodations to ensure these individuals can physically access a polling location is essential to preventing discrimination and ensuring full participation in our democracy. The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) require that voting be accessible to all individuals, yet traditional voting methods still create obstacles. By implementing curbside voting, Maryland will be taking a significant step toward eliminating these barriers and upholding the fundamental right to vote.

Although House Bill 641 is a strong starting point for curbside voting in

Maryland, we understand that the National Federation of the Blind of Maryland (NFB) is proposing amendments to this bill. DRM supports the Committee's consideration of NFB's amendments and supports all efforts to ensure maximum accessibility and privacy for individuals with disabilities when voting.

In addition, we would like to note that curbside voting is not a substitute for any other voting method and must not be used to shift the responsibilities of the State's obligations to ensure accessible and private voting. Physical polling places must remain fully accessible to all voters, and the State should continue to explore and expand accessibility across all voting methods to accommodate the needs of people with all disabilities. Ensuring that every Marylander can vote privately, independently, and securely must remain a priority in all election policies. Equitable access to voting is a bipartisan issue that strengthens our democracy.

For these reasons, DRM requests a favorable report on House Bill 641.
