House Bill 580 - Montgomery County - Voting Methods MC 1-26 - FAV

Dear Government, Labor, and Elections Committee Members:

On behalf of RepresentWomen, we urge your support for **HB 580**, *Montgomery County - Voting Methods MC 1-26*. We believe the time is right to allow Montgomery County to move forward with using new voting methods. Give county residents and leaders the power to choose what works best for them.

HB 580 is an enabling bill. It allows the county to take the next steps at the local level to explore a voting method that addresses issues that have happened repeatedly in county elections over the last decade.

Why HB 580 Matters

- Since 2014, every Democratic Primary County Executive race has been won with less than a majority of the vote.
- In 2022, 4 out of 7 Primary winners in district races won with less than a majority.

We may see split votes and non-majority winners in the upcoming 2026 primaries because of competitive races for county council and county executive. Voters want to turn down the temperature on negative politics and empower voters to have a stronger voice to elect and hold leaders accountable.

Give Montgomery County the ability to choose the best solution for their community.

We Have Strong Support

- The Montgomery County House Delegation voted unanimously in favor of HB 580 / MC 1-26.
- The bill is supported widely by county leaders, city leaders, community organizations, and residents.

No Impact on Current Elections

- HB 580 is enabling legislation. It does not mandate the use of a new voting method.
- HB 580 would go into effect in January 2027.



The benefits of ranked choice voting are proven and clear at the local and state level. We support ranked choice voting and we hope we can have productive discussion at the local level to move the best reform forward for the county. [RepresentWomen](#) tracks electoral outcomes for women in jurisdictions with ranked choice voting, and **ranked choice voting is a proven strategy that enables more women to seek and win elected office. Women hold 52% of seats in jurisdictions with ranked choice voting – almost twice the norm in places without RCV.**

In both theory and practice, RCV eliminates the barriers women face in plurality, or winner-take-all elections, creating more opportunities for women to run successfully. Our research finds that women have better opportunities to run in and win RCV elections because RCV eliminates the issue of multiple women candidates splitting the vote. RCV elections also provide an incentive for candidates to find common ground, as they seek “rank-me-second” votes from their opponents’ supporters, which in turn can lead to more civil campaigns. We also find that when voters can express their true preferences rather than vote strategically, more women win.
