**SB 37: Maryland Disability Service Animal Program – Participant Disqualifications -
Revisions**

Position: **Support**

The Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council (DD Council), a statewide public policy organization led by people with developmental disabilities and their families, creates change to make it possible for people with developmental disabilities to lead the lives they want with the support they need.

Service animals can play an important role in the lives of people with disabilities, especially children – eliminating barriers, creating opportunities, and promoting independence. Service animals are different from therapy animals or support animals because they are trained differently, perform different kinds of tasks, and have access to public places at different levels.

A service animal is “any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability.”¹ For example, a service animal may safely guide a person who is blind or deaf; alert others to medical emergencies, like seizures, or pull a wheelchair.

It is costly to provide the training and support necessary for service animals and for the people that need them – many of whom have developmental disabilities. As such, the Council supported the establishment of the Maryland Disability Service Animal Program, and appreciates the efforts by the Sponsor to ensure the language aligns with the Americans with Disabilities Act.
