

Thank you for this opportunity to speak on HB488. This topic - congressional district boundaries - has motivated me to participate because I believe gerrymandering, by both parties, is the root evil cause of the current state of politics, which is best characterized as a winner take all environment, where compromise with the quote “enemy” is uniformly applauded as unacceptable and a sign of mutual failure.
