

Dear **Members of the Judiciary Committee,**

This testimony is being submitted by Showing Up for Racial Justice Baltimore, a group of individuals working to move white folks as part of a multi-racial movement for equity and racial justice in Baltimore City, Baltimore County, and Howard County. We are also working in collaboration with Out for Justice. I am a resident of District 46. I am a community association board member, workforce development civil servant, and volunteer who cares deeply about my Baltimore community. **I am testifying in support of SB483 - the Clean Slate Act.**



Showing Up for Racial Justice

In principle, eligibility for criminal-record expungement expanded with the Maryland General Assembly's passage of the Justice Reinvestment and REDEEM Acts. In practice, however, an overwhelming majority of people who could have their charges expunged never petition the courts for expungement. They may be unaware they are eligible, or they may be unable to navigate the process in an overburdened court system. The result is that only a tiny percentage of Marylanders whose convictions are eligible for expungement—less than 10%—actually get their records expunged within 5 years of becoming eligible.¹

This does lasting damage. Charges that people could have had expunged may instead remain on their records permanently, which can make them unable to rent an apartment, obtain employment or work credentials, gain admission to college or to programs that help pay for college, keep custody of their children, access some government services, or vote in elections.² These avoidable consequences don't merely limit the lives of the people directly affected; they weaken entire communities, and the entire state, by shutting out people who want to participate meaningfully.

SB483 would protect people from the stigma of unexpunged convictions by ensuring that expungeable cases are shielded, or removed from public view, automatically. This ensures that a "clean slate" is available not just in principle, but in practice, for any Marylanders who are eligible. The benefits accrue to all of us.

It is for these reasons that I am encouraging you to vote **in support of SB483- the Clean Slate Act.**
